## City Council Meeting February 1, 2021

The Fergus Falls City Council held a regular meeting on Monday February 1, 2021 at 5:30 pm in the City Council Chambers. Pastor Doug Dent of Federated Church gave the invocation and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Mayor Schierer called the meeting to order at 5:33 pm. Council members in attendance were Gustafson, Hicks, Fish, Hagberg, Kvamme, Rufer, and Thompson. Arneson was absent.

## Approval of the Agenda

A motion and second were made by Gustafson and Hagberg approving tonight's agenda with the addition of an update from Greater Fergus Falls (Board and Committee Reports) and the motion carried.

## **Giving Hearts Day Proclamation**

Mayor Schierer read a proclamation declaring February 11, 2021 as Giving Hearts Day. A video highlighting local organizations involved in these fundraising efforts was shared.

#### **Bicycle Friendly Award**

Wayne Hurley, representing Pedal Fergus Falls shared the City of Fergus Falls recently received a Bicycle Friendly Award. Fergus Falls is now in the nation's top ten list of bicycle friendly businesses from the League of American Bicyclists.

#### Consent Agenda

The following items were approved under Resolution #18-2021 by Fish: Motion approving the open and closed minutes for January 19, 2021 council meetings. A motion approving a <u>Metal Recycling</u> license for Lakes Iron & Metal, Inc. and a <u>Mechanical</u> license for Jerry's Heating & A/C. Resolution #19-2021 authorizing the Library Director to submit a National Endowment for the Arts Big Reads grant request. A motion directing the City Attorney to draft an ordinance amending allowed light industrial uses in B-5 and B-6 zones. The resolution was seconded by Thompson and was adopted.

#### Ordinance 10

Ordinance 10, Eighth Series, Amending allowed uses in B-5 and B-6 Shopping Center Business Districts was introduced by Hicks and was declared to have its first reading.

#### **Fire Relief Service Benefits**

Luke Draxten, representing the Fire Relief Association, asked the council to approve an increase in service benefits for retiring paid on call firefighters from \$5,150 to \$5,500 per year of active service. After analyzing the request, reviewing the funding ratio parameters and rate of their investment return, the Fire Relief Association recommended the increase. Kvamme offered Resolution #20-2021 approving an increase in service benefits for retiring paid on call fighters, which was seconded by Hagberg and was adopted.

#### **Lobbyist Services**

The Legislative Committee recommended retaining the lobbyist services of Joel Carlson for the 2021-2022 state legislative biennium. Mr. Carlson has worked as the city's lobbyist for the past 18 years and his efforts have been fruitful in providing state funding for local projects. Mr. Carlson has offered

to lower the rate of his contracted services for the work he will provide in 2021 due to the economic uncertainty of the state's budget situation. His contract for 2021 would be \$21,500 and the 2022 rate is \$43,000. Mr. Carlson will focus his efforts on the proposed sales tax items and losses related to the coal plant closure slated for later this year. Rufer and Fish commented on their support to retain Mr. Carlson's services and Hicks stated he is opposed to the principal of hiring lobbyists. Rufer offered Resolution #21-2021 approving the hiring of Joel Carlson as the 2021 and 2022 lobbyist for the City of Fergus Falls, which was seconded by Fish and the resolution was adopted with Hicks voting in opposition.

## Airport Manager/Fixed Based Operator

The city has been working through the process of hiring an Airport Manager/Fixed Based Operator (FBO) after the recent retirement of the previous manager. On January 25, the Airport Advisory Board made a recommendation on the new manager, but they have indicated their desire to have more time to discuss the issue. Mayor Schierer suggested giving them an additional two weeks of time to deliberate and bring forth a recommendation at the February 16 council meeting. A motion and second were made by Rufer and Hicks to hold off on making a hiring decision for two weeks to allow the Airport Advisory Board the time they requested to provide additional input and the motion carried.

John Decoster of Landrum Brown is the consultant hired by the city to oversee the Airport Manager/FBO process. Mr. Decoster provided a summary and timeline of the process the city used to solicit these airport services. Requests for Proposals (RFP) were sought to identify candidates that possessed the specifications sought by the Airport Advisory Board. The RFP was reviewed by the board and the position was publicly advertised from late November until December 30, 2020. Four proposals were submitted and Landrum Brown used their professional expertise and knowledge of the airport industry to score and rank the candidate proposals. A matrix of the criteria, scores and candidate proposals was provided to the board members. On January 25, the Airport Advisory Board unanimously voted to recommend Alexandria Aviation (dba Otter Aviation), but have now requested more time to consider their recommendation. This recommendation will be considered by the council at their February 16, 2021 council meeting.

## Greater Fergus Falls Services Contract

Late last year Steve Rufer, in his capacity as the Greater Fergus Falls President, sent a letter to the city requesting the Economic Development Services Agreement with the city be an amended. They requested the city continue providing them with the state statutory maximum amount of funding (\$50,000 per year) and discontinue the current agreement. If their professional services are needed, they could be provided for additional compensation. Mayor Schierer did not feel it is unusual to not have an agreement and he would be willing to discuss a partnership based from a professional services agreement. Council Member Tom Rufer nominated Krista Hagberg and Karoline Gustafson to meet with a few members of the Greater Fergus Falls board and start this discussion. He then advocated for the city continuing to work with Greater Fergus Falls as they have produced results. Hicks stated his preference for having a contract in place so the scope of work, obligations and roles are clearly defined. He was concerned the city would get charged for work that used to be provided under the contract and suggested the organization contact Otter Tail County for funding since they expanded their territory to a 10 mile radius outside of the city limits. T. Rufer felt there is great value in the services provided and the \$50,000 contribution to Greater Fergus would be less expensive than the city hiring an economic development staff member. There was a consensus with the council to have

Council Members Hagberg and Gustafson meet with representatives from Greater Fergus Falls and bring a recommendation back to the city.

## **Resolution of Accounts**

Fish offered a resolution authorizing the payments and claims in the amount of \$1,057,843.74, which was seconded by Hagberg and was adopted.

## Reports

The Mayor reported the Greater Fergus Falls annual report is complete and will be presented at the February 24 Committee of the Whole meeting. A new massage therapist has started a business downtown and was welcomed to the community.

The meeting adjourned at 6:20 pm.

## **Open Forum**

## Kevin Petron, 708 S Oak Street Apt 2

Mr. Petron spoke to the council at the open forum about his concerns with snowplowing and parking. He felt people are confused when the plows will be out and when to move their vehicles. The longer vehicles stay in place, the more snow that piles in the streets creating dangerous conditions on narrow streets. He also expressed concerns for the pedestrians who have to go into the street because of those who don't shovel their sidewalks. He advocated for the city to implement an odd/even parking system and to ticket and tow vehicles not in compliance.

Mayor Schierer felt it would be appropriate for staff to recap the city's snow removal system. Hicks suggested including reminders such as garbage cans being picked up within 24 hours, proper clearance between garbage and recycling containers and timely cleaning of sidewalks should be included in this review.

## **Recommendation:**

• Resolution of Support to submit the LRIP funding application for the Fir & Friberg Avenue intersection improvement

## Background/Key Points:

On March 16, 2020, the City and Otter Tail County initiated a joint agency effort to study round about design feasible in the City. The primary intersection of interest was the Fir Avenue and Friberg Avenue intersection. The intersections of Union and Tower Road were added to the study as it progressed.

In April, 2020 the City Council accepted comments from the public about the three conceptual designs. Of the three intersections, Union and Fir Avenue conceptual design appeared to be the most controversial based on property access concerns from adjacent owners. The Friberg preliminary conceptual design did not receive many objections other than requests to incorporate bike and pedestrians enhancements.

Although funding has not been identified to date, Otter Tail County has been exploring potential funding sources. Currently, the Local Roads Improvement Program (LRIP) is soliciting for projects to fund.

The Local Roads Improvement Program (LRIP) was established by the Minnesota legislature in 2002. The LRIP provides funding for capital construction costs only. Engineering, right of way, or other non-construction related costs are considered local matches. The LRIP has three types of accounts with a specific intent for the types of local road projects that can be considered for program. Otter Tail County and the City will be applying for the Rural Road Safety Account that funds capital safety improvement projects on County State Aid Highways (CSAH) primarily to reduce traffic crashes, deaths, injuries, and property damages. The maximum request for a single agency is \$1,250,000. Applications are due March 3, 2021.

The City and Otter Tail County intents on applying to the LRIP for the Fir & Friberg Avenue intersection. The application requires a resolution of support from all contributing agencies. I am requesting the City Council approve this request.

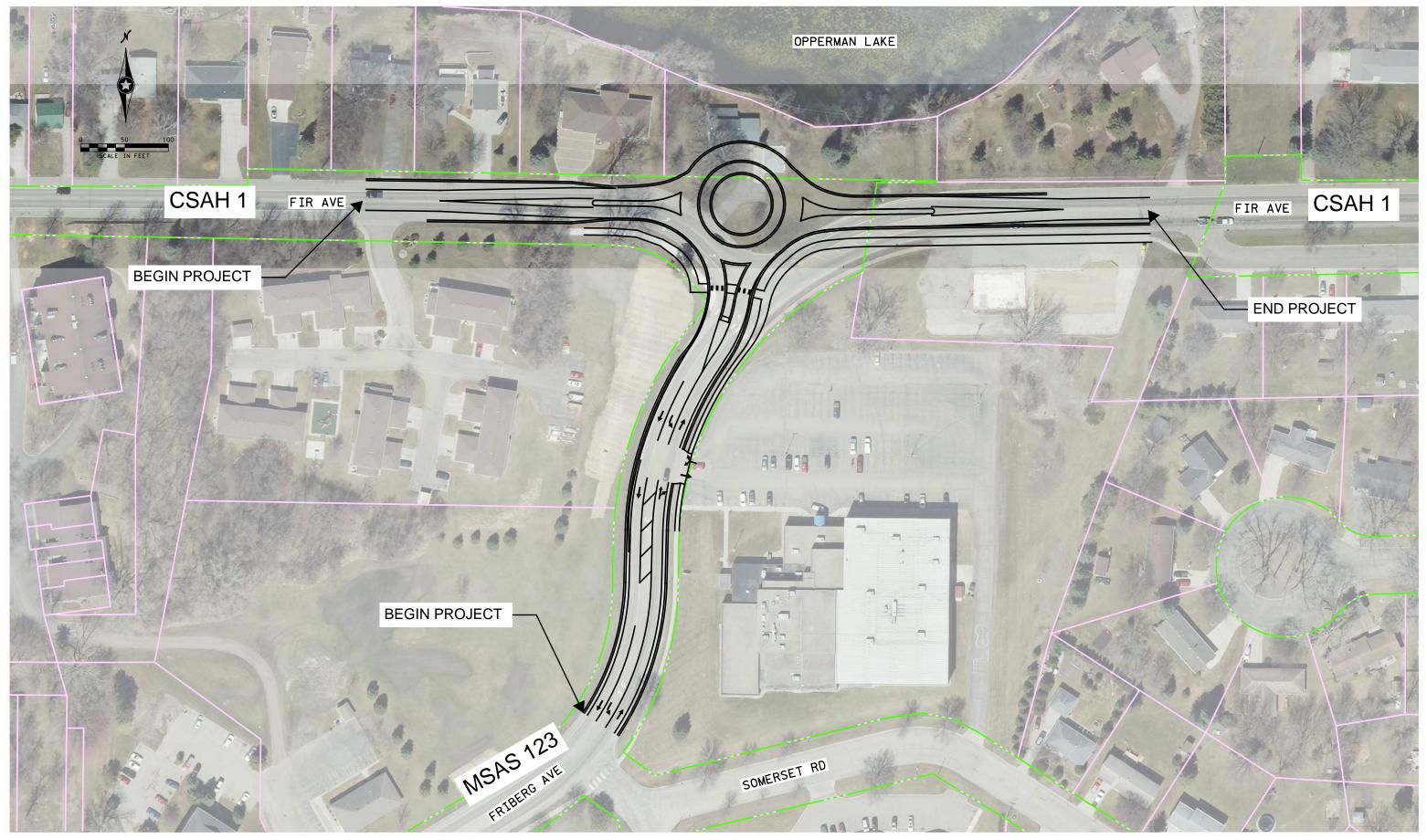

## **ORDINANCE NO. 10, EIGHTH SERIES**

## AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FERGUS FALLS, MINNESOTA, AMENDING CHAPTER 154.002 DEFINITIONS AND CHAPTER 154.040 B-5 AND B-6 SHOPPING CENTER BUSINESS DISTRICT OF THE CITY CODE.

## THE CITY OF FERGUS FALLS DOES ORDAIN:

<u>Section 1.</u> City Code Chapter 154.002 Definitions, Light Industrial, is hereby added to read as follows:

**LIGHT INDUSTRIAL.** Light Industrial means a category of uses that is capable of operation in such a manner as to control the external effects of manufacturing processes such as smoke, noise, vibration, soot, and odor. It includes limited intensity levels of manufacturing and assembly activities primarily from previously prepared or refined materials, or from raw materials that do not need refining, warehousing of produced products on site with limited direct public access, research and development, packaging, and associated offices and similar uses as determined by the City Planner within an enclosed building. This use category includes, but is not limited to, food processing, contractors, textiles, wood products, tool and die, printing, pharmaceuticals, machinery manufacturing or assembly, research and development, laboratories, but excludes basic industrial processing from raw materials or other heavy industrial uses.

Section 2. City Code Chapter 154.040 B-5 and B-6, Shopping Business District, (B)(2) is hereby amended to read as follows:

(2) B-6, Sub-Regional Shopping Center. Within a B-6, Sub-Regional Shopping Center Business District, no building or land shall be used, except for one or more of the following uses, subject to division (C)(2) below:

(a) Drive-in restaurants;

(b) Any uses as permitted and regulated in the B-3, General Business District; except that, no dwellings shall be permitted; and

(c) Indoor recreation – such as trampoline parks, skating and archery, etc.

<u>Section 3.</u> City Code Chapter 154.040 B-5 and B-6, Shopping Business District, (C) is hereby amended to add paragraph (10) as follows:

(10) Light Industrial Uses; subject to the following:

(a) There shall be no outside storage of materials or goods unless an allowed retail use is permitted in the zone in conjunction with the manufacturing business to sell a finished product.

b) There shall be no uses that produce fumes, exhaust, or other nuisance conditions outside of the structure.

Section 4. Effective date. The effective date of this ordinance shall be the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 2021.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 61, SIXTH SERIES**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FERGUS FALLS, MINNESOTA, AMENDING CITY CODE CHAPTER 2 ENTITLED "ETHICS IN GOVERNMMENT - CODE OF ETHICS" BY ADDING SECTION 2.90 RELATING TO A CODE OF ETHICS COVERING PUBLIC OFFICIALS, CITY EMPLOYEES AND ITS VOLUNTEERS, WHICH AMONG OTHER THINGS, CONTAINS PENALTY PROVISIONS.

#### THE CITY OF FERGUS FALLS DOES ORDAIN:

<u>Section 1.</u> The City Council of the City of Fergus Falls determines that Fergus Falls government exists to serve the people of Fergus Falls, in order to do so effectively, the people of Fergus Falls must have confidence and trust in the integrity of their city government. The public judges its government by the way its public officials and employees conduct themselves in the posts in which they were elected or appointed. City officials and employees hold positions of public trust under the scrutiny of public opinion, and their actions must be above suspicion. The public deserves elected and appointed officials, City employees and volunteers who maintain the highest ethical principles and avoid misconduct and conflicts of interest, apparent or real. The public has the right to expect that its city officials, employees and volunteers will conduct themselves in a manner that will preserve public confidence in and respect for government. Effective democracy depends on a government that is fair, ethical and accountable to the people it serves.

<u>Section 2.</u> The City Council of the City of Fergus Falls determines that it is in the best interests of the residents of the City of Fergus Falls In order to continue the public confidence and the integrity of government officials and to promote trust of the people in the objectivity of their public servants, this Code of Ethics for public officials, employees and volunteers of the City of Fergus Falls is adopted. This comprehensive Code of Ethics provides an ethical guide and specific rules that reflect the ethical values of the City of Fergus Falls. It is both inspirational and a basis for disciplinary action. This Code of Ethics defines levels of conduct below which no local official, employee or volunteer can fall without being subject to disciplinary action. The Code of Ethics is designed to promote high ethical standards and conduct, and to foster a healthy culture throughout City government. It is the touchstone for all who work with and for the City to assist them in fulfilling their responsibilities to the people of Fergus Falls.

Section 3. City Code Chapter 2 is hereby amended by adding a new Section 2.90 so as to read as follows:

#### § 2.90 ETHICS IN GOVERNMENT.

We put the public interest ahead of our own personal advancement and financial interests. We disclose conflicts of interest and refrain from participating in decisions where we have a financial interest. We avoid actions that might impair independence of judgment or give the appearance of impropriety or a conflict of interest. We do not use our position to gain privileges or special treatment and we do not use public property or personnel for private or personal purposes.

#### § 2.901 FIDUCIARY DUTY.

In the performance of their official duties, local officials, employees and volunteers shall act for the benefit of the City.

#### § 2.902 CONFLICTS OF INTEREST.

(A) Definition of Conflicts of Interest. A local official, employee or volunteer of the City, whether paid or unpaid, shall avoid any situation that might give rise to a conflict of interest. A conflict of interest is present when, in the discharge of official duties, a local official, employee or volunteer participates in a governmental decision,

action or transaction in which he or she has a financial interest, except when the financial interest is no greater than that of another member of his or her business classification, profession or occupation. A financial interest is any interest, including loans, which shall yield, directly or indirectly, a monetary or other material benefit to the local official or employee (other than monetary or material benefits authorized by the City). A financial interest of a local official's employer, employee's employer or volunteer's employer (other than the City of Fergus Falls), his or her associated business, or his or her spouse, domestic partner, or dependent, and their employers or associated businesses shall also be considered a financial interest of the local official, employee, or volunteer. The following assets shall not be considered a financial interest for purposes of this section: (1) ownership of shares in a diversified mutual fund; (2) membership in a pension plan or employee benefit plan; (3) deminimus ownership of bonds or publicly traded securities; (4) ownership of a whole life insurance policy.

- (B) Addressing Conflicts of Interest. To address conflicts of interest:
- (1) A local official, employee or volunteer shall not participate in making or attempt to use his or her position to influence any City governmental decision, action, or transaction in which the local official, employee or volunteer knows or has reason to know that he or she has a conflict of interest. To participate or participation means making the decision, taking action, entering into a transaction, providing advice or a recommendation, introducing, sponsoring, debating, voting on, approving, and investigating the decision, action, or transaction. Participation includes the direct and active supervision of the participation of a subordinate in the matter. Participation is more than official responsibility, knowledge, perfunctory involvement, or involvement on an administrative or peripheral basis.
- (2) A local official, employee or volunteer may participate in a City government decision, action, or transaction involving an organization or entity if the local official, employee or volunteer, or his or her spouse, domestic partner, or dependent is an officer, director, board member, or trustee does not have a financial interest in the governmental decision, action, or transaction. However, the local official, employee or volunteer must disclose his or her affiliation with the organization or entity as though it was a conflict of interest.
- (3) A local official, employee or volunteer may participate in a City governmental decision involving a related person, other than his or her spouse, domestic partner or dependent, if the local official, employee or volunteer does not have a financial interest in the governmental decision, action, or transaction. However, the local official, employee or volunteer must disclose his or her relationship with the related person as though it were a conflict of interest.

(C) Disclosure of Conflicts of Interest. If a local official, employee or volunteer, in the discharge of his or her official duties, recognizes that his or her participation would create a conflict of interest, the local official or employee shall disclose the conflict of interest as follows:

(1) The Mayor and members of the City Council shall disclose the conflict of interest to each other as soon as they become aware of the conflict. If such official becomes aware of a conflict during a meeting of the City Council, or one of its committees, the official shall immediately disclose the conflict of interest orally. The Mayor or City Council member shall also prepare, on a form prescribed by the City Administrator, a written statement describing the matter requiring action or decision and the nature of his or her conflict of interest. The written statement shall be distributed to the Mayor and the members of the City Council and filed with the City Administrator. After the first time the local official has orally disclosed a conflict of interest and filed the form, the elected official may subsequently orally disclose a conflict by referring to the form. Because the Mayor or City Council members may not attend all City Council or committee meetings, oral disclosure may consist of the written statement being read into the record by the presiding officer at the first regular meeting of the City Council after the form has been filed.

- (2) A department head shall disclose a conflict of interest to the Mayor and the City Council by preparing, on a form prescribed by the City Administrator, a written statement describing the matter requiring action or decision and the nature of his or her conflict of interest. The form shall be distributed to the Mayor and the members of the City Council and filed with the City Administrator.
- (3) A local official or employee who is not covered by paragraphs (1) and (2) above shall disclose a conflict of interest (a) orally to his or her supervisor; and (b) in writing as described below. If there is no supervisor, a local official or employee shall disclose a conflict of interest in writing as described below. A local official or employee who is required to disclose a conflict of interest in writing under this paragraph shall prepare a written statement, on a form prescribed by the City Administrator, describing the matter requiring action or decision and the nature of his or her conflict of interest. The written statement shall be distributed to the employee's immediate supervisor and department head, and filed with the City Administrator.
- (4) All initial written statements required by this section shall be filed and distributed within one week after the local official or employee becomes aware of the conflict of interest.
- (5) If the local official or employee has a supervisor, the supervisor shall assign the matter, if possible, to another person who does not have a conflict of interest. If they have no immediate supervisor, the local official or employee shall remove himself or herself from participating in the action or decision in question. If the local official is a member of the City Council or Mayor, the local official shall not participate in any discussion or vote on any matter involving the conflict of interest. Although the Mayor or City Council member must abstain from voting on the matter, he or she shall be counted present for purposes of a quorum.
- (6) A volunteer shall disclose a conflict of interest orally to the Committee Chairperson, if the volunteer is working on a Committee and said conflict of interest shall also be disclosed orally to the City Administrator. The oral disclosure of a conflict of interest shall include describing the matter requiring action or decision and the nature of the volunteer's conflict of interest. In all situations a volunteer shall remove him or herself from participating in any action or decision in question in which he or she has a conflict of interest.

#### § 2.903 Soliciting or Accepting Personal Gifts.

(A) A local official, employee or volunteer shall not solicit or accept any gift from any interested person, lobbyist, or principal who has a direct financial interest in a decision that the local official, employee or volunteer is authorized to make.

- (B) Exceptions. The prohibitions in this section to not apply if the gift is:
- (1) A campaign contribution as defined in Minnesota Statutes, Section 10A.01, Subd. 11;
- (2) A service to assist an official in the performance of official duties, including, but not limited to, providing advice, consultation, information and communication in connection with legislation, or services to constituents;
- (3) A service of insignificant monetary value; A service is of an insignificant monetary value if the monetary value of said service is less than \$50.00 (Fifty Dollars).
- (4) A plaque or similar memento recognizing services in a field of specialty or to a charitable cause;
- (5) A trinket or memento of insignificant value;

- (6) Informational material of unexceptional value;
- (7) Food or a beverage given at a reception, meal, or meeting away from the recipient's place of work by an organization before whom the recipient appears to make a speech or answer questions as part of a program;
- (8) Given because of the recipient's membership in a group, a majority of whose members are not officials, and an equivalent gift is given to the other members of the group; or
- (9) Given by an interested person, lobbyist, or principal who is a related person to the recipient, unless the gift is given on behalf of someone who is not a related person.

(C) A local official, employee or volunteer who receives any gift prohibited by this section shall return, dispose of, or request that the City Council accept the gift on behalf of the City.

#### § 2.904 Use of Official Position to Solicit Privileges or Special Treatment.

A local official, employee or volunteer shall not use his or her official position to solicit privileges or special treatment, unless the privileges or special treatment are for the benefit of the City.

#### § 2.905 Statements of Economic Interest.

(A) Minnesota Statutes, sections 10A.01 and 10A.09 require a local official who holds elective office in the City who is appointed or employed in a public position in the City in which the person has authority to make, to recommend, or to vote on as a member of a decision making body, major decisions regarding the expenditure or investment of public money to file a statement of economic interest. In accordance with these statutes and with the provisions of this ordinance, are elected officials, including the Mayor and Council members, shall file a statement of economic interest with the City Administrator on a form prescribed by the City Administrator. Within sixty days after the effective date of this Code of Ethics, every person subject to the disclosure requirements shall file with the City Administrator a disclosure statement indicating the following:

- (1) A list of interests in real property, except for the person's homestead, located within the City of Fergus Falls.
- (2) A list of interests in a business doing business with the City of Fergus Falls.
- (3) A list of interests in any business located within the City of Fergus Falls.
- (4) Current place of employment.

(B) Every person who files as a candidate for an elective city office must file with the City Administrator the statement required by Subd. (A) above at the time the affidavit of candidacy is filed.

(C) Material changes in local officials' real estate or business interest or place of employment shall be disclosed by filing an amended disclosure statement within thirty days after the new interest is obtained or the change of employment occurs.

(D) For purposes of this section "interest" shall mean a substantial financial interest through the ownership of stocks, bonds, notes, or other securities. "Doing business" shall mean engaged in any contractual relationship with the City of Fergus Falls or making application for such relationship or for any relief or benefit available from the City of Fergus Falls, including but not limited to variance, permit, license or plat approval.

(E) Individuals required to file a statement of economic interest are subject to the penalty provisions of Minnesota Statutes, section 10A.09 and this ordinance. All disclosure statements filed with the City Administrator pursuant to this section shall be public data.

(F) The provisions of filing a statement of economic interest does not apply to volunteers of the City unless said volunteer is, in fact, paid or appointed to serve in a public position of the City in which that person has the authority to make, or to vote on as a member of a decision making body, major decisions regarding the expenditure of investment of public money.

#### § 2.906 Post Employment Restrictions.

A former local official or employee shall not disclose or use any confidential, private, nonpublic, privileged or proprietary information gained by reason of his or her City employment or involvement with the City as a local official. The prohibitions of this section shall not apply to a local official or employee acting on behalf of the City, its departments, independent boards, commissions or committees, or another governmental agency unless such assistance or representation is adverse to an adopted policy or position of the City of Fergus Falls.

#### § 2.907 City Property.

A local official, employee or volunteer shall not engage in or permit the unauthorized use or destruction of City property.

## § 2.908 Required Reporting of Fraud; Unlawful Use of Public Funds or Property.

Whenever a local official or employee discovers evidence of fraud, theft, embezzlement, forgery, or unlawful use of public funds or property, the local official or employee shall promptly report the discovery in writing to the City Administrator and the Internal Auditor. If necessary under state law, the City Administrator shall forward the report to the Minnesota State Auditor.

#### § 2.909 Discrimination or Harassment.

A local official or employee shall not engage in discrimination or harassment in the workplace based on race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, affectional preference, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, disability, sexual orientation or age.

#### § 2.910 Use or Disclosure of Information.

(A) A local official, employee, volunteer or any other individual serving in any capacity with the City on a committee, board or commission, shall not use or disclose any information gained in the course of or by reason of his or her official position in any way that violates his or her fiduciary duty to the City of Fergus Falls or the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act.

(B) A local official, employee or volunteer shall not use or disclose privileged, nonpublic, confidential, private or proprietary information gained in the course or his or her responsibilities and duties in any way that could result in financial gain for the local official, employee or volunteer, or for their spouse, domestic partner, or dependents or for a person in a committed relationship with the local official or employee, or for any associated business of the local official, employee or volunteer, or the business of his or her spouse, domestic partner, dependent, or person with whom he or she has a committed relationship.

#### § 2.911 Avoiding Bias or Favoritism.

When making decisions on behalf of the City of Fergus Falls, a local official, employee or volunteer shall act for the benefit of the City of Fergus Falls, avoid bias or favoritism, and shall respect cultural differences.

#### § 2.912 Inappropriate Influence.

(A) The role of a local official or employee is to exercise his or her judgment to further the best interests of the City of Fergus Falls. For an appointed local official, employee or volunteer this may include making recommendations to elected officials and providing elected officials with multiple policy options and the advantages and disadvantages of these options. Once the City Council and/or the Mayor officially sets policy, the job of a local official, employee or volunteer of the City is to implement the policy in good faith, regardless of his or her personal views.

(B) An elected local official or an employee or business associate of an elected local official or volunteer of the City shall not inappropriately influence the exercise of professional judgment by the staff of the City of Fergus Falls. Examples of inappropriate influence by an elected official, or the employee of an elected official or volunteer, include asking or ordering an appointed local official or employee to:

- (1) Violate this Code of Ethics or an applicable code of professional responsibility under which the local official or employee operates; or
- (2) Do a special favor or make an exception for a constituent or other individual or organization contrary to existing law or adopted City policy; or
- (3) Misrepresent that local official's or employee's, business associate's or volunteer's recommendation to other elected officials.

## § 2.913 Code of Ethics Violations.

(A) A local official, employee or volunteer must report any conduct by other local officials, employees or volunteers that he or she believes violates this Code of Ethics either to the alleged violator's supervisor or department head or to the City Administrator. If the alleged violator is an appointed employee who is not a department head, all alleged violations must be reported to the alleged violator's supervisor and department head, or, the City Administrator. If the improper conduct relates to a department head or an elected official, all alleged violations must be reported either to the City Administrator, or, if the alleged violator is the City Administrator, said alleged violation must be reported to the City Attorney.

(B) Once a situation is reported under the above clause, the supervisor, department head, City Administrator or City Attorney, whichever is applicable, has a duty to immediately investigate the alleged violation and make appropriate recommendations to the Mayor, Council and/or the City Administrator.

#### § 2.914 Sanctions - Enforcement

(A) Any person who violates any provision of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. The City Administrator shall monitor compliance with this chapter and shall report all suspected violations to the City Attorney. The City Attorney shall review the report of the City Administrator and determine whether the validity of the complaint, and, if warranted, prosecute the action against any person who violates any provision of this chapter, on behalf of the City of Fergus Falls. It shall not be a conflict of interest for the City Attorney's Office to prosecute a local official, employee or volunteer of the City for any alleged Code of Ethics violations that constitute a crime pursuant to this chapter. If the City Attorney or a member of the City Attorney's office is suspected of having violated this chapter, the City Administrator shall employ outside special counsel to review the complaint and, if warranted, prosecute the action on behalf of the City of Fergus Falls.

(B) In addition to criminal sanctions, an appointed or classified employee or volunteer of the City of Fergus Falls who violates this Code of Ethics may also be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination of City employment, removal and termination of volunteer status as a volunteer of the City.

(C) The City Administrator shall review allegations of violations of this Code of Ethics by an elected official, a department head, or an appointed local official. In the event the City Administrator is the party alleged to have violated this Code of Ethics, the City Attorney shall review and investigate the allegations of violations of this Code of Ethics. Once the review is complete, the City Administrator or City Attorney, shall report its findings regarding an elected official to the Mayor and to the City Council. The City Council, as a whole, reserves unto itself to impose additional sanctions upon the local official including public reprimand and censure. Nothing in this section or any section shall be interpreted so far as to limit the public's right to petition for recall of any elected public official.

(D) The disclosure statement of economic interest required by this Code of Ethics shall be signed and certified as true by the person required to file the report. Any person who signs and certifies that a report or statement is true, which he or she knows contains false information or knows omits required information is guilty of a misdemeanor.

#### § 2.915 City Contract Compliance.

All City of Fergus Falls contracts shall include a provision requiring compliance with this Code of Ethics. Any contracts negotiated, entered into or performed in violation of any of the provisions of this Code shall be voidable as to the City. Any permit, license, ruling, determination or other official action of the City applied for in any other manner sough, obtained or undertaken in violation of the provisions of this Code may be invalidated or rescinded.

#### § 2.916 Additional Ethical Standards Permitted.

The Code of Ethics defines standards of conduct below which no local official or employee should fall. A City department, agency, authority, or instrumentality may adopt and enforce additional ethical standards as needed.

#### § 2.917 Definitions.

(A) "Candidate" means any individual who files an affidavit of candidacy or petition or appear on the ballot for an elected office.

(B) "Confidential information" means information that is not accessible to the public or to the subject of the information, if any.

(C) "Conflict of interest" means a situation where a local official, employee or volunteer, in the discharge of their official duties, participates in a governmental decision, action or transaction in which he or she has a financial interest, except when that interest is no greater than that of another member of his or her business classification, profession or occupation.

(D) "Financial interest" means any interest, including loans, which shall yield, directly or indirectly, a monetary or other material benefit to the local official or employee (other than monetary or material benefits authorized by the City). A financial interest of a local official's or employee's employer (other than the City of Fergus Falls), his or her associated business, or his or her spouse, domestic partner, or dependent, shall also be considered a financial interest of the local official or employee. The following assets shall not be considered a financial interest for purposes of this section: (1) ownership of shares in a diversified mutual fund; (2) membership in a pension plan or employee benefit plan' (3) ownership of bonds or publicly traded securities with a market value of less than \$2500; (4) ownership of a whole life insurance policy.

"Participate" or "Participation" means making a decision, taking action, providing advice or a **(E)** recommendation, introducing, sponsoring, debating, voting on, approving, or investigating the decision, action, or transaction. Participation includes the direct and active supervision of the participation of a subordinate in the matter. Participation is more than official responsibility, knowledge, perfunctory involvement or involvement on an administrative or peripheral issue.

"Private information" means information that is not accessible to the public but is accessible to the (F) subject of the information.

"Privileged information" means information that is learned by a local official or employee or (G) volunteer acting in the course of his or her duties, and includes information that the law protects from forced disclosure because of a protected relationship, such as the attorney-client relationship.

"Proprietary information" means information belonging exclusively to the City. (H)

City Code Chapter 2 entitled "Ethics In Government" including penalty for violation is Section 4. hereby adopted in its entirety, by reference, as though repeated verbatim herein.

Effective Date. The effective date of this ordinance shall be the 20<sup>th</sup> day of August, 2008. Section 5.

## Background/Key Points:

The Purchase Agreement between the City and River's Edge Investments for the Cityowned parking lot near Shopko currently has a closing date of March 1, 2021 (Section 6). In our on-going conversations with the Developer, it's understood that closing will not be happening by March 1<sup>st</sup> and that this project likely won't happen in 2021, so a request has been made to extend the closing date to read "on or before June 30, 2022." No other terms of this contract would change through this action. Staff is comfortable with this request, as further due-diligence is necessary for the developer.

**Budgetary Impact:** Proceeds from the sale would not be received as anticipated in March.

#### PURCHASE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT ("<u>Agreement</u>") made and entered into as of the  $2^{n}$  day of <u>becamber</u>, 2020, by and between the City of Fergus Falls, MN, a Minnesota municipal corporation, whose address is 112 Washington Ave. W, Fergus Falls, MN 56538 (the "<u>Seller</u>"), and River's Edge Investments, LLC, a Minnesota limited liability company, whose address is 925 Clearview Ct., Fergus Falls MN 56537 (the "<u>Buyer</u>").

1. <u>**Real Property</u>**. Seller agrees to sell, and Buyer agrees to purchase, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, certain real property located at the southeast corner of Lincoln Avenue and Cascade Street in Fergus Falls, Otter Tail County, Minnesota, and legally described on <u>Exhibit 1</u>, together with all improvements and appurtenances belonging thereto (the "<u>Real</u> **Property**").</u>

2. <u>*Purchase Price.*</u> The purchase price shall be Three Hundred Twenty-Eight Thousand Dollars and NO/00 (\$328,000.00) payable in cash at closing.

3. <u>Contingencies</u>. The terms of this Agreement are contingent upon certain conditions, referred to as "contingencies", being met on or before the date of closing, which contingencies are set forth as follows:

- (a) Zoning for the Real Property that is paid for by and satisfactory to Buyer.
- (b) The Buyer securing financing in amounts and on terms which are satisfactory to Buyer in Buyer's absolute discretion.
- (c) The Buyer securing Tax Increment Financing ("<u>TIF</u>") for its intended construction project in amounts and on terms which are satisfactory to Buyer in Buyer's absolute discretion.
- (d) The Seller and Buyer executing a mutually acceptable TIF development agreement for the construction project.
- (e) The Buyer must close on construction loan financing in sufficient amounts for the duration and completion of the TIF development agreement for its intended construction Project. The closing on the construction loan financing may occur simultaneously with the closing of this Agreement.
- (f) An ALTA survey of the Real Property, if desired by Buyer, which illustrates boundaries and locations of improvements and easements which are satisfactory to the Buyer. Said survey shall be paid for by the Buyer.
- (g) An environmental condition of the Real Property, as shown by an environmental site assessment prepared by a company selected by Buyer, which is satisfactory to the Buyer. Said environmental site assessment shall be paid for by the Buyer.

(h) The Real Property being in such a condition so as to allow the Buyer to construct improvements in a manner and location as desired by Buyer. Said inspection shall be paid for by the Buyer.

Buyer shall have a period of one hundred twenty (120) days from the date of this Agreement to perform its due diligence and to determine its satisfaction of the conditions described in subparagraphs (a), (c), (f), (g) and (h). The conditions described in subparagraphs (b), (d) and (e) must be satisfied on or before closing. The Buyer and its representatives shall have reasonable access to the Real Property to perform Buyer inspections, fulfill contingencies and do its due diligence. If any contingency has not been satisfied to Buyer's or Seller's satisfaction, either Buyer or Seller may elect to terminate this Agreement by providing written notice to the other (which notice must specify the failed contingency). Alternatively, Buyer and Seller may agree in writing to waive any one or more of the contingencies described above and close the transaction pursuant to the other terms of this Agreement.

4. <u>*Title, Liens and Encumbrances*</u>. At closing, Seller shall transfer title to the Real Property to the Buyer by a Warranty Deed conveying good and marketable title to the Buyer. The sale and transfer by Warranty Deed shall be free of all liens and encumbrances except for the following:

- (a) Building and zoning laws, ordinances, state and federal regulations;
- (b) Utility, drainage and other easements of record which do not interfere with Buyer's intended use of the Real Property.

Title Examination. The parties shall procure a title insurance commitment and 5. final owner's and lender's title policy from West Central Abstracting Company Inc., Fergus Falls, MN (hereafter "Title Company") which commitment and policies must show good and marketable title in the Seller, including legal access, ingress and egress to the Real Property, free and clear of all liens and encumbrances, except as noted above and except those acceptable to Buyer or caused to be placed thereon by Buyer. The title commitment will be ordered after the Seller has completed its procedural requirements associated with selling the Real Property and has notified Buyer accordingly. The Buyer shall have 15 days' time to examine said title commitment and within said period of time shall promptly notify the Seller of all objections thereto in writing. If the title to the Real Property is unmarketable, the Seller shall have a period of 90 days in which to correct the title and make it marketable. If the title to the Real Property cannot be made marketable within said period of time or such further time as may be granted by the Buyer, this Agreement shall be wholly null, void, and unenforceable, unless the Buyer waives its objections. The cost of the title insurance commitment and final policy shall be paid as set forth in other portions of this Agreement.

6. <u>Closing</u>. Closing of this transaction shall take place and possession of said premises shall be delivered to the Buyer on the  $1^{st}$  day of March, 2021 (the "<u>Closing Date</u>"),

subject to the extension of time heretofore granted in the event that title to such premises shall be found unmarketable. The closing shall be handled by the Title Company. No in person closing shall be required as closing documents shall be transmitted by mail, email, or fax and money shall be wired between the parties. It is the intention of the Buyer and Seller that the Real Property closing shall occur simultaneously with the TIF development agreement and construction loan financing closings.

7. <u>**Real Estate Taxes and Assessments**</u>. The Seller agrees to pay all real estate taxes and assessments for special improvements levied or assessed for the year prior to closing and prior years. Real estate taxes, and assessments for special improvements for the year of closing shall be prorated between the Buyer and the Seller, and in the event the exact amount of the taxes and assessments for the year of closing are not yet known, the amount to be prorated shall be based on the real estate taxes and assessments for special improvements for the year prior to closing. Buyer agrees to pay the real estate taxes and assessments for special improvements accruing after closing and all subsequent years.

8. <u>Buyer Representations</u>. Buyer hereby represents to Seller that Buyer has the full and complete authority to enter into this Agreement, and that the individuals executing this Agreement on behalf of Buyer have the legal and organizational authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of Buyer and to bind Buyer.

9. <u>Seller Covenants, Warranties and Representations</u>. Seller provides the following warranties, covenants and representations, which shall be effective as of the date of this Agreement and as of the date of closing:

- (a) Seller has the legal and organizational authority to enter into this Agreement and to sell the Real Property, and that the individuals executing this Agreement on its behalf have the legal and organizational authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of Seller and to bind Seller.
- (b) No consent or approval of any person, entity, or governmental agency or authority is required with respect to the execution and delivery of this Agreement by Seller and, as of the Closing Date, no such consent or approval will be required with respect to the sale by Seller of the Real Property to Buyer.
- (c) Seller has not received notice from any governmental authority of any violation affecting any portion of the Real Property.
- (d) There are no outstanding, pending, or, to the best of Seller's knowledge and belief, threatened suits, judgments, condemnation proceedings, zoning changes, or any other proceedings pending or of record in any court of any nature respecting the Real Property;

- (e) As of the Closing Date, there will be no recorded or unrecorded liens, mortgages, security interests, security agreements, or UCC financing statements, against the Real Property or any part thereof.
- (f) To the best of Seller's actual knowledge, there are no encroachments or boundary line questions affecting the Real Property.
- (g) Until closing, Seller will not grant, enter into or agree to enter into any lease, easement, covenant or restriction affecting the Real Property.

## 10. Hazardous Substances.

- (a) Definitions. The following definitions apply to this portion of the Agreement.
  - i. "Law or Regulation" means and includes the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act ("CERCLA") as amended by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986 ("SARA"); the Federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976 ("RCRA"); the Clean Water Act, or any similar state law or local ordinance which may regulate the environment or hazardous substances, all as may be from time to time amended and any other federal, state, county, municipal, local, or other statute, law, ordinance, or regulation that may relate to or deal with pollution, contamination, human health, or the protection of the environment including, without limitation, all regulations promulgated by a regulatory body pursuant to any such statute, law, or ordinance.
  - ii. "Hazardous Substance" means asbestos, urea formaldehyde, polychlorinated biphenyls, heating oil, natural gas, natural gas liquids, liquefied natural gas, synthetic gas useable for fuel (or mixtures of natural gas and synthetic gas), nuclear fuel or materials, chemical wastes, radioactive materials, explosives, known carcinogens, petroleum products, or other dangerous, toxic, or hazardous pollutants, contaminants, chemicals, materials, or substances defined as hazardous, a hazardous substance, a toxic substance, hazardous waste or as a pollutant or contaminant in, or the release or disposal of which is regulated by, any Law or Regulation.
- (b) Seller represents and warrants that:
  - i. To the best of its knowledge, there is not located on, in, about, or under the Real Property any Hazardous Substance.

- ii. To the best of its knowledge, the Real Property has never been utilized for the storage, manufacture, disposal, handling, transportation or use of any Hazardous Substances, and no Hazardous Substances have been generated, treated, stored, released or disposed of, or otherwise placed, deposited in or located on the Real Property.
- iii. After due inquiry there are no past or present investigations, administrative proceedings, litigation, regulatory hearings, or other action proposed, threatened or pending, alleging non-compliance with, or violation of, any Law or Regulation or relating to any required environmental permits with respect to the Real Property. Seller has not, nor to the knowledge of Seller has any third party, violated any Law or Regulation with respect to the Real Property.
- iv. The Real Property is not listed in the United States Environmental Protection Agency's National Priorities List of Hazardous Waste Sites or on any other list, schedule, log, inventory, or record of hazardous waste sites maintained by any state, federal, or local agency.
- v. To the best of Seller's knowledge, no activity has been undertaken on the Real Property that would cause or contribute to the discharge of pollutants or Hazardous Substances or of fluids into any water source or system, the dredging or filling of any waters or the discharge into the air of any emissions that would require a permit under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act or the Clean Air Act, as amended, or any similar state law or local ordinance.
- vi. Seller has disclosed to Buyer all reports and investigations commissioned by Seller relating to Hazardous Substances and the Real Property.
- vii. No above ground or underground tanks are located in or about the Real Property, or have been located under, in or about the Real Property and have subsequently been removed or filled. To the extent storage tanks exist on or under the Real Property, such storage tanks have been duly registered with all appropriate regulatory and governmental bodies and otherwise are in compliance with applicable Federal, State and local statues, regulations, ordinances and other regulatory requirements.
- (c) If any representation or warranty herein contained shall be or be found to be false, inaccurate, or misleading, then Buyer shall be entitled to terminate this Agreement or, if the sale has already closed, to recover damages, including, but not limited to, all costs and expenses incurred in correcting, remediating or remedying any environmental contamination or other problems resulting from Seller's false, inaccurate, or misleading representations or warranties and all costs

of defending any regulatory or governmental action resulting from such error including, without limitation, attorney's fees, expert's fees and costs and disbursements.

(d) Buyer may hire third parties to conduct a Phase I environmental site assessment, and the cost of said environmental site assessment will be paid by Buyer.

11. *Well Disclosure*. Seller certifies that Seller does not know of any wells on the Real Property.

12. *Individual Sewage Treatment System Disclosure*. Seller certifies that there is no individual sewage treatment system on or serving the Real Property.

#### 13. Documents and Deliverables for Closing.

- (a) Seller shall furnish the following documents at the time of closing:
  - i. Warranty Deed;
  - ii. TIF development agreement and related documents;
  - iii. Any Certificate of Real Estate Value or Fair Consideration required by the applicable state agencies;
  - iv. An affidavit in a form presented by Buyer or by Title Company evidencing the absence of bankruptcies, judgments, tax liens, construction or mechanic's lien rights affecting the Real Property, unrecorded interests affecting the Real Property, persons in possession of the Real Property and known encroachments or boundary line questions affecting the Real Property;
  - v. Any documents required by Buyer's title examination which are necessary to convey good and marketable title, free of any encumbrances or liens, and otherwise consistent with this Agreement;
  - vi. A non-foreign affidavit containing such information as is required under Section 1445(b)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code and any regulations relating thereto;
  - vii. All appropriate disclosures and certificates regarding wells, septic/sewer systems, ground water, environmental conditions or other conditions of the Real Property which certificates are required by the state where the Real Property is located;
  - viii. All abstracts of title for the Real Property;
    - ix. Any other document required by this Agreement.

(b) Buyer shall deliver the following at Closing:

- i. Purchase price payable in cash;
- ii. TIF development agreement and related documents;
- iii. Copies of construction loan financing documents to secure financing for the completion of the TIF development agreement and its intended Project.
- iv. Any other document required by this Agreement

(c) In addition, each party will deliver to the other party and the Title Company such agreements, assignments, conveyances, instruments, documents, certificates and the like as may be reasonably required by either party or the Title Company to consummate the sale of the Real Property from Seller to Buyer in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

14. <u>Possession</u>. At closing, Seller will deliver possession of the Real Property to Buyer.

15. <u>Allocation of Closing Expenses</u>. The parties shall apportion the Closing expenses in the following manner:

(a) Seller's expenses - Seller shall be responsible for:

- i. Transfer tax, if any, connected with the recording of the Warranty Deed;
- ii. The recording fees for any corrective instruments;
- iii. Its own attorney's fees;
- iv. The cost of continuation of the abstract and title commitment;
- v. One-half the cost of the closing fee charged by the Title Company; and
- vi. All other costs specifically allocated to the Seller as set forth in this Agreement.

(b) Buyer's expenses - Buyer shall be responsible for:

- i. Recording fees for the Deed;
- ii. Its own attorney's fees, including fees for title opinions;

- iii. The cost of an owner's title insurance policy and the full cost of a lender's title insurance policy in amounts designated by the Buyer and the lender;
- iv. One-half the cost of the closing fee charged by the Title Company; and
- v. All other costs specifically allocated to the Buyer as set forth in this Agreement, including but not limited to, ALTA survey costs, lender fees and appraisals, and environmental site assessments.

16. <u>Settlement Statements</u>. All settlement statements prepared by the Title Company and which show closing amounts for Seller and Buyer shall be provided to both Seller and Buyer.

17. <u>Survival</u>. All of the terms, representations and warranties contained herein are continuing and shall survive the Closing.

18. <u>Default</u>. If Buyer fails to perform any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement within the specified time limits, Seller may, at Seller's option, declare this Agreement terminated or have this Agreement specifically enforced. Likewise, if Seller fails to perform any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement within the specified time limits, Buyer may declare this Agreement terminated or Buyer may have this Agreement specifically enforced. The rights and remedies granted to the parties in this Section are intended to be cumulative to all other rights and remedies available to the parties (whether under this Agreement, at law, in equity or otherwise); accordingly, the exercise by either party of any such right or remedy shall not preclude it from exercising any other such right or remedy.

19. <u>*Time of the Essence.*</u> Time is of the essence of each provision of this entire Agreement and all of the conditions thereof.

20. <u>Modification</u>. No change or modification of this Agreement shall be valid unless the same be in writing and signed by all the parties to this Agreement.

21. <u>Persons Bound by this Agreement</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties, their heirs, devisees, and legal representatives., This Agreement may not be assigned by the either party without each party's prior written consent. The rights and obligations of any party to this Agreement may be exercised or satisfied by that party's legal representative.

22. <u>Governing Law</u>. The provisions of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the state of Minnesota.

23. <u>Condemnation</u>. If prior to the Date of Closing, a public or private entity with the power of eminent domain commences condemnation proceedings against all or any part of the Real Property, Seller will promptly notify Buyer, and Buyer may, at Buyer's sole option, terminate this Agreement.

24. *Casualty Loss.* Until the Date of Closing, the risk of loss for the Real Property is on Seller.

25. <u>Mutual Indemnification</u>. Seller will indemnify and hold Buyer harmless from all liabilities (including reasonable attorneys' fees in defending against claims) arising out of claims by third parties relating to acts or occurrences on, at or with respect to the Real Property which occur prior to the closing, unless such claims relate to acts by Buyer or its agents. Buyer will indemnify and hold Seller harmless from all liabilities (including reasonable attorney fees in defending against claims) arising out of claims by third parties relating to acts or occurrences on, at or with respect to the Real Property which occur on or after the closing unless such claims relate to acts by Seller or its agents.

26. <u>Signature in Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall be an original, with the same effect as if the signatures thereto and hereto were upon the same instrument. The parties hereto confirm that any facsimile or scanned copy of another party's executed counterpart of this Agreement (or its signature page thereof) will be deemed to be an executed original thereof.

#### RESOLUTION #\_\_\_\_-2021 RESOLUTION OPPPOSING MINNESOTA ADOPTING CALIFORNIA'S CLEAN-CAR INTITIATIVE

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Governor's Administration and Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) are considering adopting a rulemaking process that would bind Minnesota to California's motor vehicle emission regulations and,

WHEREAS, Minnesota has 338 automotive dealerships that sell new vehicles and create nearly 45,000 jobs and in 2019 these dealerships generated sales of \$15.9 billion, had a payroll of \$1.2 billion and paid \$1.0 billion of state sales tax and,

WHEREAS, Fergus Falls, Minnesota has 3 automotive dealerships that sell new vehicles which equates to nearly 200 jobs and in 2020 these dealerships generated sales of \$180 million, and had a payroll of \$11 million and,

WHEREAS, last year the pandemic created a 20% drop in vehicle sales and affected jobs in this market and,

WHEREAS, on average 5% of vehicles purchased in a state are registered to customers from outside the state and in Minnesota that number is almost double, with some dealerships dependent on customers from neighboring states for a significant portion of their sales and,

WHEREAS, it has been estimated the price of all vehicles will increase by a minimum of \$1,139 with the adoption of the California emissions standards, and that increase would negatively affect sales that Minnesota automotive dealers make to customers from surrounding states and,

WHEREAS, cross-border sales and the inability to locate certified industry will be a hardship on dealers and consumers and would especially adversely affect communities in greater Minnesota and,

WHEREAS, these emission standards would go into effect in 2024 and the MPCA is proposing early adoption credits for electric vehicles to encourage investing early in the necessary infrastructure and these costs would fall on Minnesota dealerships, who must buy the cars and bear the brunt of the financial risk.

WHEREAS, President Biden announced his intention to address climate change and his administration plans to reinstate and advance more stringent fuel economy standards,

WHEREAS, if the federal government plans to restore the stringent vehicle emission standards the MPCA has relied on, the Minnesota Auto Dealers Association has advocated opposition to Minnesota moving forward with a plan to follow California instead of waiting for the Biden Administration to reinstate the previous standards and,

WHEREAS, the MPCA rules would go into effect in 2024 and in the following year California will institute updated rules for models beginning in 2026 and begin a phase out of the sale of gas powered passenger vehicles by 2035, WHEREAS, Minnesota's auto dealers are requesting the Walz Administration drop this plan and work with our legislators and stakeholders on homegrown solutions to address climate change and advance cleaner vehicles,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Fergus Falls, Minnesota to opposed to Minnesota adopting California's Clean-Car Initiative.

# Subject: Street lighting

**Recommendation:** Enter into an agreement with Otter Tail Power Company whereby Otter Tail Power would provide all street lighting within the city limits.

# Background/Key Points:

- Over the last few years, conversations with Otter Tail Power about converting our city owned street light system over from "high pressure sodium" lights to "LED" lights, has gone from the city doing a conversion project to them (OTP) proposing to install all new street lighting (including all new wiring, poles and light heads) in all areas where the city owns the street lighting, which is basically the commercial/business area from the Interstate through all of downtown and Vernon from Union to Pebble Lake Rd. to the Hwy 210 bypass. Along with taking over these areas, we have looked at adding areas that currently don't have street lighting, such as the frontage road between St. Andrews St. and Tower Rd., College Way from Lincoln to Tower Rd. and Tower Rd from Lincoln to College Way and County Rd. 82 from the 210 bypass to Pebble Shores Dr.
- OTP would do this project in 2 phases. The first phase in 2020 would be all of the areas except the downtown area. The pole and light head in these areas would be similar to what is currently in place, the poles however will be aluminum versus the steel that we currently have. The second phase would include the downtown areas (excluding Lincoln Ave.) including the area on Vernon Ave. near LRHC and the Public Library/NP Park, where we have asked that there be a more decorative style pole/light head installed. For this type of pole/light head, OTP needs to obtain approval from the MN Public Utilities Commission which they hope to get in 2020 and then do phase 2 in 2021.
- We would continue to own/operate the decorative lights at the RTC, Lake Alice and Lincoln Ave.
- Phase II will complete the project which covers Cavour from Union to Cascade, Court/Mill/Cascade from Cavour to Lincoln, South Union from Lincoln to the railroad tracks, the 100 block of W. Vernon, E. Vernon to Concord, Pebble Lake Rd. to Hwy 210 and Cascade from Cavour to E. Vernon. There are decorative options for Court/Mill/Cascade in between Cavour and Lincoln, Union (from Lincoln to RR tracks), and Vernon (NP Park and library block) potentially for Phase II that OTP is still waiting on a tariff rate determination from the Public Utilities Commission.

# **Budgetary Impact:**

• There will be an impact to the budget of \$35,000. This amount includes all of our costs/charges (tariff and consumption). This amount is proposed to come from what we have been budgeting annually for maintenance (\$30,000) and from re-allocating a request for funds for new boards at the Cleveland ice rink (\$35,000).

• Current lights use 68,300 watts. The new lights will use 25,612 watts. This reduction in wattage used will translate into future savings.

### OUTDOOR LIGHTING AND MUNICIPAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made by and between Otter Tail Power Company (the "Company"), a Minnesota corporation, and <u>City of Fergus Falls, MN</u> (the "Customer").

In consideration of the mutual promises contained below, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The Customer agrees to purchase and receive from the Company electric energy in accordance with the terms of this Agreement and all terms and conditions and Rules and Regulations (the "Terms") established by the Company and filed in its approved tariff with the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission. These Terms shall include but not be limited to Customer's payment for electrical energy in accordance with the Company's rate schedule as filed with and approved by the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission, or such superseding rate(s) as may be approved in the future.
- 2. The Company shall provide and the Customer shall pay for the services specified in this Agreement for a term of one year with an effective date of the term to begin <u>March 1 2021</u>, and terminating <u>March 1 2022</u>, and thereafter shall be renewed for periods of one year each, unless written notice to the contrary is given by either party to the other not less than thirty (30) days before the expiration of this agreement or any renewal thereof. This agreement shall automatically terminate in the event the Customer discontinues all electric service or has its service disconnected by the Company for any reason. The termination of this agreement for any reason will not relieve Customer of any payments due to the Company for any service provided pursuant to this agreement and the Company's tariffs, or for the full payment of amounts required pursuant to paragraph 15 of this agreement.

The Company will not be liable for incidental or consequential damages, including, but not limited to, loss of profits resulting from the use of service or any delay, interruption, curtailment, suspension, disturbance or variability of electric service. The Company shall have the right to suspend temporarily the delivery of electric power hereunder for the purpose of making repairs or improvements of its system.
- 15. If applicable, the Company shall charge for and Customer shall pay any Excess Expenditures associated with Special Facilities as identified in Section 5.03 of the General Rules and Regulations. The total Excess Expenditures of Special Facilities identified is \$TBD.
- 16. All previous agreements, if any, between the parties covering the subject matter hereof are hereby cancelled and terminated as of the effective date specified in Paragraph 2 of this Agreement, except as specifically provided in this Agreement.

Subject: Snow Removal

# **Recommendation:**

Affirm (with additional 2019 language) Resolution #8 1997 "City of Fergus Falls Snow and Ice Control"

The additional "2019 language" defines the downtown parking restriction that was put in place.

### **Background/Key Points:**

The city has approximately 120 miles of paved streets, 12 miles of gravel streets, 5 miles of gravel alleys and 2 miles of paved alleys, 16 parking lots and thousands of feet of sidewalk that is adjacent to city owned property.

The city has budgeted \$646,000 for snow removal for 2021. This covers 18-22 staff members that operate a variety of equipment from snow shovels to sweepers, truck plows (with sanders), front end loaders and graders. Along with the snow removal equipment, we also operate sander trucks that are used to treat the alleys. There is also a fleet of trucks that are used to haul snow basically from the downtown area and other areas throughout the city as needed.

Resolution #8 1997-"City of Fergus Falls Snow and Ice Control" put in words, the practices that had been followed for many years and was actually made policy in 1997.

# City of Fergus Falls Snow and Ice Control Resolution #8 1997

### 1. Introduction

The City of Fergus Falls assumes basic responsibility for control of snow and ice on city streets in the interest of the safety and convenience of the city's residents. Reasonable ice and snow control is necessary for routine travel and emergency services. The City will provide such control in a safe and cost effective manner, keeping in mind safety, budget, personnel and environmental concerns. The City will use city employees and equipment to provide this service.

2. When will the city start snow or ice control operations?

The Public Works Director will decide when to begin snow or ice control operations. The criteria for that decision are:

- A. Snow accumulation of 3 inches or more, or at the discretion of the Public Works Director
- B. Drifting of snow that causes problems for travel
- C. Icy conditions which seriously affect travel; and
- D. Time of snowfall in relationship to heavy use of streets

Snow and ice control operations are expensive and involve the use of limited personnel and equipment. Consequently, snowplowing operations will not generally be conducted for snowfall of less than 3 inches, or at the discretion of the Public Works Director.

### 3. How snow will be plowed

Snow will be plowed in a manner so as to minimize any traffic obstructions. The center of the roadway will be plowed first. The snow shall then be pushed from left to right. The discharge shall go onto the boulevard area of the street. When a plow goes on a bridge, the driver shall slow down so that snow does not go over the bridge if possible. In times of extreme snowfall, streets will not always immediately be able to be completely cleared of snow.

### 4. Priorities and schedule for plowing streets

The City has classified city streets based on the street function, traffic volume, and importance to the welfare of the community. Those streets classified as "Priority Snow Plow Routes" will be plowed first. These are high volume routes which connect major sections of the city and provide access for emergency fire, police and medical services. These first priority routes include: Lincoln Avenue, Union Avenue, Fir Avenue, Friberg Avenue, Broadway Avenue, Cascade Avenue, Cleveland Avenue, Washington Avenue, Sheridan Avenue, Alcott Avenue and Vernon Avenue. The second priority streets are those streets providing access to schools and commercial businesses. The third priority streets are low volume residential streets, alleys and city parking lots.

### 5. Snow Removal

The  $\bar{P}$ ublic Works Director will determine when snow will be removed by truck from the area. Such snow removal will occur in areas where there is no room on the boulevard for snow storage and in areas where accumulated piles of snow create a hazardous condition. On occasion, snow may need to be temporarily placed on private property. City crews will return to remove this snow as soon as circumstances permit. Snow removal operations will not commence until other snowplowing operations have been completed. Snow removal operations may also be delayed depending on weather conditions, personnel and budget availability. The snow will be removed and hauled to a snow storage area. The snow storage area will be located so as to minimize <u>travel</u> and environmental problems.

### 6. Work schedule for snowplow operators

Snowplow operators will be expected to work eight-hour shifts. In severe snow emergencies, operators sometimes have to work in excess of eight-hour shifts. Operators will take a fifteen minute break every four hours with a half-hour meal break after four hours. After a twelve-hour day, the operators will be replaced if additional qualified personnel are available.

### 7. Weather Conditions

Snow and ice control operations will be conducted only when weather conditions do not endanger the safety of city employees and equipment. Factors that may delay snow and ice control operations include; severe cold, significant winds and limited visibility. (Exceptions for emergency response; see paragraph 11).

### 8. Use of sand. salt and other chemicals

The city will use sand, salt, and other chemicals when there are hazardous ice or slippery conditions. The City is concerned about the effect of these chemicals on the environment and will limit such use for that reason.

### 9. Sidewalks

The City will maintain those sidewalks in the city which are within or adjacent to publicly owned property, including bridges.

Property owners or tenants are responsible for the sidewalks adjacent to their property. Sidewalks must be clear of ice and snow 24 hours after the snow/ice has subsided.

### 10. Damage to mailboxes and other property

Plows generally stay one to two feet away from mailboxes so as to minimize the potential for any damage.

In the event that a city-operated snow plow should damage a mailbox, curb or landscaping on a boulevard, the city will repair and/or replace the property when weather conditions permit. (See paragraph 5 regarding snow removal). The city does not assume any responsibility for damage to underground lawn sprinkling systems, exterior lighting systems and similar landscaping installed on city owned right-of-ways.

### 11. Snow removal for emergency vehicles

The City Public Works Department will coordinate with emergency response providers, including police, fire department, and ambulance dispatchers, to clear snow in order to provide access to the site of an emergency.

### 12. Parking

Vehicles that are parked on any street for over 24 hours may be cited or towed. Cars left on streets interfere with the ability of plows to adequately remove snow, and may create a hazard.

### 13. 2019 Parking restriction (Not included in 1997 Resolution)

There is no parking allowed "on street" in the downtown area between the hours of 1am-5am. This area includes: Cavour, Lincoln, Washington (Union to Cascade) Union, Court, Mill, Cascade (Cavour to Washington).

# City code: Chapter 72.28 PERMITTED PARKING; EMERGENCY DECLARATION.

(A) The Director of Public Works shall declare a parking emergency at the times necessary to preserve the public welfare and to assure proper control of traffic during emergencies. The declaration, when made, shall be communicated to the office of the City Administrator who shall, in turn, advise news media so as to disseminate the information as quickly as possible. Notice of ending the parking emergency shall be given in the same manner.

(B) During the parking emergency, vehicular parking on streets, public parking lots and public property is permitted only as follows:

(1) In the central business district, as defined in the code and described as that area bounded by Cavour Avenue on the north, Whitford and Friberg Avenue on the east, Washington Avenue on the south and Vine Street on the west, parking is permitted between the hours of 6:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m.; and

(2) In all other areas:

(a) Vehicles may be parked for 24 hours on the even street numbers side of the street commencing at 5:00 p.m. on even numbered days of the month;

(b) Vehicles may be parked for 24 hours on the uneven street numbers side of the street commencing at 5:00 p.m. on uneven numbered days of the month; and

(c) On streets where parking is permanently banned on one side of the street, parking shall remain as restricted, unless otherwise temporarily posted.
