Subject: Tax Abatement Agreement- Housing Rebate Program

Recommendation: Following separate public hearings, approve the following tax rebates at 1337 and 1353 Lenore Way and allow staff to sign tax abatement agreements with Fergus Falls Area Habitat for Humanity.

Background/Key Points: This memo references two separate lots (1337 and 1353 Lenore Way), each to contain a single family home. Neither home will be made available for rent during the life of the tax abatement but will instead house families in need through Habitat for Humanity.

The purpose of the Tax Rebate Program is to encourage the construction of new primary residence single and two-family housing units and encourage the replacement of dilapidated housing structures in Fergus Falls. The tax abatement agreement anticipates valuation by Otter Tail County in 2021 for tax abatements payable in 2022.

Budgetary Impact: Any person who files application materials for new primary residence single and two-family housing units between Jan 1, 2020 and Dec 31, 2022 may be eligible to receive a 100% tax rebate of Fergus Falls' share of increased real estate taxes as a result of building a new home for a period of up to 5 years or up to \$5,000, whichever is met first.

Subject: Tax Abatement Agreement- Housing Rebate Program

Recommendation: Following a public hearing, approve the following tax rebate at 608 Ann St and allow staff to sign a tax abatement agreement with Brad and Paula Christenson via NCS Homes, Inc.

<u>Background/Key Points</u>: An application for 608 Ann St was initially rejected from the tax rebate program at the request of the city building department based on a permitting issue, which has since been resolved. Construction is now complete and the home has been purchased by Brad and Paula Christenson. At the request of the home's developer and the current homeowners, city staff has agreed to submit the application for a tax rebate to council. Submitting the rebate to council is recognition of NCS Homes, Inc's dedication to building housing in Fergus Falls.

The purpose of the Tax Rebate Program is to encourage the construction of new primary residence single and two-family housing units and encourage the replacement of dilapidated housing structures in Fergus Falls. The tax abatement agreement anticipates valuation by Otter Tail County in 2021 for tax abatements payable in 2022.

Budgetary Impact: Any person who files application materials for new primary residence single and two-family housing units between Jan 1, 2020 and Dec 31, 2022 may be eligible to receive a 100% tax rebate of Fergus Falls' share of increased real estate taxes as a result of building a new home for a period of up to 5 years or up to \$5,000, whichever is met first.

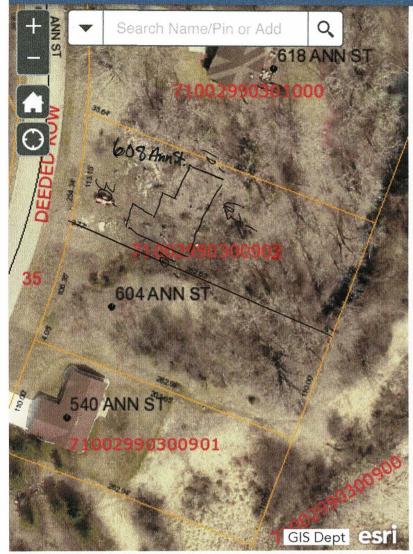

City Council Minutes May 17, 2021

The Fergus Falls City Council held a regular meeting on Monday May 17, 2021 at 5:30 pm in the City Council Chambers. Pastor Lee Kantonen gave the invocation and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Mayor Schierer called the meeting to order at 5:33 pm. Council members in attendance were Arneson, Gustafson, Hicks, Fish, Hagberg, Kvamme, Rufer and Thompson.

Approval of the Agenda

A motion and second were made by Rufer and Hagberg approving tonight's agenda with the following additions: Resolution accepting the quote for PI 7766, the storm sewer improvement for 1220 N Tower Road (consent); Resolution awarding a 2021-2023 hayland lease agreement (new business) and Resolution declaring community festivals (consent) and the motion carried.

Proclamation: Public Works Week

Mayor Schierer read a proclamation of appreciation for our Public Works employees and declared May 16-22 as Public Works Week. Public Works Director Len Taylor thanked the council for their recognition of our public works employees and the vital services they provide for our community.

Consent Agenda

The following items were approved under Resolution #92-2021 by Thompson: Motion approving the minutes from the May 3, 2021 City Council meeting and the May 12, 2021 Committee of the Whole Motion approving the following licenses: Demo/Hauler of Building Waste Rachel Contracting; Mechanical All Seasons Heating & A/C; Chickens Cindy Jensen 544 W Summit Avenue (renewal), Callie Shea and Alex Lais 615 S Woodland Drive (new); Minnesota Lawful Gambling Permit Elizabeth Lions Club for Bingo at the W Otter Tail County Fair July 21-24. Resolution #93-2021 accepting the conveyance of a stormwater pond (Outlot A) to the city contingent upon the authorization for the City Engineer and City Attorney to prepare the Storm Water Maintenance Agreement and the preparation of the ingress/egress easement to allow city access to Outlot A. Resolution #94-2021 initiating PI 7767, the Pebble Lake Golf Course delineation and drainage improvement project and accepting Stantec's professional services proposal for wetland delineation in the amount of \$8,050. Resolution #95-2020 setting a final cost hearing for CP 5955, the 2021 street and utility improvement project for Whitford Street and the Bancroft Avenue area for June 21, 2021. Resolution #96-2021 approving the consent to assignment of the investment management agreement between the City of Fergus Falls and Galliard Capital Management Inc. to GRCR LLC and Reverence Capital Partners LP. Resolution #97-2021 accepting the quote for PI 7766, the storm sewer improvement for 1220 N Tower Road, the West Tool & Design expansion project, to Leitch Excavating Inc. in the amount of \$47,669.27. Resolution #98-2021 declaring SummerFest, the Over the River Festival and Shop, Move and Groove as 2021 community festivals. The resolution was seconded by Gustafson and was adopted.

Ordinance 7 Eighth Series

Ordinance 7, Eighth Series, Interim Emergency Succession was adopted by a roll call vote.

Land Purchase on Southview Drive

On May 3, the council introduced a land sale of approximately two acres to Lonnie and Danielle Ballweg on Southview Drive. The City Charter states at least ten days must separate the introduction

and final sales of city property. A number of neighbors have come forward saying they were not aware the city was considering this land sale and asked the city to slow down the process and not approve the final sale this evening. A letter from Amanda Saint and Andrew Kutzke was submitted into record and their concerns how a private shop would adversely affect how they use their land and their request for the further dialogue to see how a sale would affect the neighborhood were relayed. Mike Robertson, 2312 Lakeview Drive said this request blindsided the neighbors and he was concerned about access points for a driveway and the effect on property values if a shop was constructed in a wooded area. He advocated other neighbors be allowed an opportunity to purchase the land and also requested the council slow down their process and provide more information to the neighborhood.

A motion and second were made by Rufer and Fish to table this discussion so a meeting can be held with the neighborhood to gather their input. Hicks stated he was fine with a short delay, but he believes the city needs to be careful with setting a precedence of having a contract and then opening up a property for other buyers. The City Attorney said there technically is no contract. Selling city owned property is done by the council's discretion and if they want to finalize the land transaction tonight, they should take action to enter into a purchase agreement. Arneson spoke about the process laid out in the City Charter and how the time between the introduction and final sales offer this very type of opportunity for others to add input, but he would like to see a deadline for this issue to come back before the council in light the rising construction of Rufer said he has heard requests from the neighbors to delay this process and he did not feel gathering their input would set a bad precedence. He agreed having this matter come back to the council in a timely manner would be in everyone's best interest and said he would coordinate a meeting with the neighborhood as soon as possible. The motion to table the final land sale carried with Hicks voting in opposition.

Airport Manager/FBO

A working group comprised of Council Members Arneson and Hagberg, City Engineer Brian Yavarow, Human Resources Director Mike Hartwell, City Attorney Rolf Nycklemoe and Airport Advisory Board members Andrew Yaggie and Robbie Olson has met four times to help select a new Airport Manager/Fixed Based Operator (FBO). Justin Arneson reviewed context of each of these meetings and said they have made a recommendation for the council to select Sky Crew Services. A motion and second were made by Arneson and Hagberg directing the City Attorney to draft an Airport Management and FBO contract with Sky Crew Services. Thompson said he would be voting in opposition to appointing Sky Crew Services. He referenced rumors and petitions being spread about Alexandria Aviation to the Alexandria City Council and his belief the rumors were spread by friends and associates of Sky Crew Services to sway the city's decision. He did not feel the city should hand over an airport to candidates who do not have experience or formal training with MnDOT or the FAA when the proposal from Alexandria Aviation clearly shows a candidate with more experience and a proven track record in his mind. Mayor Schierer said he spoke to the Alexandria Mayor who confirmed there were communications from people in Fergus Falls with their City Council members, but these conversations did not influence any decision making. Kvamme said the word local has been used often in this hiring process and he shared his opinion that the Fergus Falls Airport is a regional asset as it serves a broad area and the original consultant's recommendation to select Alexandria Aviation is the direction the city should be taking. Clarification was provided that the city was not making a final selection at this time as the draft agreement, including the length of the contract, would be reviewed by the working group. This group would also be making a recommendation on the length of time considered in the contract. The motion was called to a vote and carried on a 5-3 vote. Voting

in favor were Arneson, Gustafson, Hicks, Hagberg and Rufer while Thompson, Fish and Kvamme voted in opposition.

Resolution of Accounts

Fish offered a resolution authorizing the payments and claims in the amount of \$3,509,244.52, which was seconded by Hagberg and was adopted after explaining the use and need for a charge for sewer cameras.

Franchise Fees

At the May 12 Committee of the Whole meeting, staff reviewed the city's pavement management plan and suggested the city consider franchise fees to create a dedicated funding source for street improvements. City Administrator Andrew Bremseth explained how cities have the statutory ability to adopt an ordinance that charges a fee to utility companies for using the city's right of way. These nominal fees are monthly passed onto the customers and the proceeds are dedicated to funding street improvement projects. Bremseth said he has already had brief conversations with Otter Tail Power Company and Great Plains Natural Gas to give them a heads up this conversation may be coming. He was reminded that Lake Region Electric also serves customers within the city limits. The city would continue to set aside levy funding for chip seal and mill and overlay projects. Kvamme asked if cable and telephone companies could also be sources of franchise fees. Bremseth said the city already collects franchise fees from Park Region Telephone and Spectrum and those funds help fund PEG Access. The city could charge above and beyond those fees, but with so many competitive streaming services, this would likely be detrimental to these businesses in our community. Hicks asked if the city is making Great Plains Natural Gas and Otter Tail Power the "bad guys" if they are the ones asking for the additional taxes. There was discussion about how this funding mechanism has everyone paying their fair share for road improvements. A motion and second were made by Rufer and Gustafson to direct staff to begin the process of looking into franchise fees as a funding source for street improvements and the motion carried.

Hayland Lease Agreement

Staff recommended awarding a two year hayland lease to Daryl Tysdal. He provided the only bid and has leased this land in the past. Tysdal's bid on Parcel 1, 14.5 acres, is \$312.50 and his bid on Parcel 2, 1.4 acres, is \$36.35. Tysdal would be responsible for paying the taxes. The lease payments would be credited to the city's water fund. Staff explained the location and layout of the land noting the Otter Tail Power feeder line that goes through the property. Kvamme offered Resolution #99-2021 awarding a two year hayland lease to Daryl Tysdal, which was seconded by Fish and was adopted.

Emergency Powers

Hicks felt it was time to lift the city's emergency powers declaration due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Bremseth said the city has not used the emergency powers for over a year and the main reason for enacting the powers was to seek FEMA reimbursement for covid related expenses. CARES funding and the American Rescue Plan have provided funding sources for the city to access and use. He commented on the usefulness and flexibility the declaration provided the city in allowing businesses outdoor seating and carry-out signage that normally would not be allowed. He did not believe the powers were abused and that they were put to good use. Hicks offered Resolution #100-2021 lifting the city's emergency powers declaration, which was seconded by Arneson and was adopted. Bremseth said as of June 1, the city plans to go back to all in person meetings. This will include City

Council, Committee of the Whole, Port Authority and all meetings of the city's various boards and commissions. The public will be invited to participate in the meetings in public or to view the meetings on the city's You Tube channel or PEG Access.

The meeting adjourned at 6:18 pm

Committee of the Whole Meeting June 2. 2021

The Fergus Falls City Council met as a Committee of the Whole on June 2, 2021 at 7:00 am in the City Council Chambers. Mayor Schierer called the meeting to order at 7:00 am and the following members were in attendance: Arneson, Gustafson, Hicks, Fish, Hagberg, Kvamme, and Thompson. Rufer was absent.

PI 5337

PI 5337 is the 2021 mill and overlay project, which encompasses Vernon Avenue: Union to Oak; Vasa: Union to Vine and Vine: Vernon to Alcott. The estimated project cost is \$209,000 and if bids are favorable, additional work would be done. The bids will be opened on June 29 and work would be completed by the fall. A motion and second were made by Fish and Gustafson to recommend the council accept the project plans and specifications for PI 5337 and authorize the advertising of bids for the project and the motion carried.

PI 5338

PI 5338 is the 2021 seal coat project, which encompasses Cascade: Hwy 210 bypass to Summit Avenue; Summit Avenue: Union to Friberg; Alcott Avenue: Union to Westside Drive. The estimated project cost is \$186,000 and the bids will be opened on June 29, with the work to be completed by the fall of 2021. A motion and second were made by Fish and Kvamme to recommend the council accept the project plans and specifications for PI 5338 and authorize the advertising of bids for the project and the motion carried.

PI 9768

Bolton & Menk Inc. has provided a professional services agreement for the Downtown Riverfront project in the amount of \$640,000. They would be responsible for the construction administration, observation, special inspection testing, and construction staking and architectural services. The fee could be lower if the Union Avenue resurfacing and pedestrian improvement project can be constructed at the same time. A motion and second were made by Hagberg and Arneson to recommend the council accept the Bolton & Menk Inc. professional services agreement in the amount of \$640,000 for construction administration and observation and the motion carried with Hicks voting in opposition. Hicks requested staff provide the council with a summary of how much the city has paid Bolton & Menk to date.

Fire Department Cooperative Agreement

The city's joint cooperative agreement for mutual aid fire services with the City of Moorhead is expiring. There has been a cooperative agreement with Moorhead for the past 15 years and the agreement has been reviewed by both departments who have consented to the addition of a fee schedule for emergency incidents with a duration of 6 or more hours. Fergus Falls has been requested to provide mutual aid to Moorhead three times over the past 15 years. This contract would only represent the agreement with Moorhead as the city has approximately 20 separate mutual aid agreements with surrounding towns and townships. A motion and second were made by Hicks and Thompson to recommend the council renew the Joint Powers Agreement for the use of emergency operations personnel and equipment with the City of Moorhead and the motion carried.

Equipment Purchase

Unit 259 is a street sweeper that has been in service since 2010 and is scheduled to be replaced. It is been proposed to be replaced by a Tymco sweeper model 500X street sweeper. The purchase price of the new equipment is \$302,965 and Unit 259 has a trade-in allowance of \$55,000 for a total price of \$247,965 from the state contract. Funding for the sweeper would come out of the equipment fund. This purchase would exhaust the 2021 budget allowance and there are still equipment needs within the fleet this year. A budget adjustment from \$670,000 to \$750,000 is being requested. A motion and second were made by Hicks and Thompson to recommend the council declare Unit 259 as surplus equipment and authorize its disposal; to authorize the purchase of a Tymco sweeper Model 500X street sweeper from the equipment fund and authorize the budget increase to \$750,000 and the motion carried.

Library Annual Report

Library Director Gail Hedstrom provided an annual update on the library's 2020 activities. Their staff had to adapt to a new way of conducting business through the pandemic and were able to offer curbside service and they removed the barrier of late fines. Their library visits were down, but they still offered 6,888 reference transactions, checked out nearly 177,000 print and digital items and nearly 5,300 people participated in person and virtual events. The library was an important resource during the pandemic to help provide internet connectivity to many residents for a variety of reasons. The library is planning for a busy summer and will conduct programming for children, teen and adults in different formats. They have added a vinyl record collection and patrons can check out passes to Minnesota state parks. They have 78 children signed up for summer reading tutor services and the library staff will be active at community events. Their Saturday hours will be expanding to 4 pm October-March. The library staff was commended for their flexibility to run the community food shelf during the pandemic when their regular volunteers were unable to operate the facility.

Contract between the City of Fergus Falls and Greater Fergus Falls

Over the past few months council members Karoline Gustafson and Krista Hagberg have met with representatives of Greater Fergus Falls to discuss an agreement between the City and Greater Fergus Falls. During that timeframe, a transition occurred in the Greater Fergus Falls leadership. Gustafson said the agreement language states the city's appropriation of funds is not a donation or grant dollars, but funds dedicated to economic development services to the city. A memorandum of understanding (MOU) has been suggested to be a separate document to the agreement that will allow for mutual adjustments over time. Hicks felt the MOU should be completed prior to the council approving the contract, so the city is not signing an open ended document. He also believed payments should be made quarterly and there should be a stipulation Greater Fergus Falls needs to maintain an office in Fergus Falls. It was confirmed payments are being made monthly. Kvamme asked why a MOU would need to be a separate item and Gustafson replied an MOU would be more flexible as things change over time and it would ensure a good working relationship. Mayor Schierer felt this has become more complicated as the city is giving \$50,000 to leverage against community dollars to help spur economic development within the city. He felt it would show a lack of trust if the city tried micromanaging their budget and professional expertise. A motion and second were made by Gustafson and Hagberg to recommend the council discuss the agreement further at the June 7 meeting.

RTC Phase II Bonding Dollars

During the 2018 Minnesota State legislative session, the city was awarded \$3.5 million for use on the RTC campus. The approved bonding language was read and states the funds must be used by

December 31, 2022 and they cannot be used to demolish the central tower or the U shaped building connected to the central tower. The city has expended \$1,778,558.92 of the bonding dollars leaving a balance of \$1,721,441.08. All of the buildings behind the complex, with the exception of a storage shed and the Memorial building have already been removed. Kvamme spoke about the RTC Master Plan Committee's work and their goal to increase awareness for the redevelopment and preservation of the RTC. The consultant is about to release their 172 page report and has concluded the building is structurally sound and a housing project is the most viable reuse option. The committee prepared a handout of the possible redevelopment options to SummerFest attendees as the event will take place on the RTC grounds. The consultants were recently made aware of the remaining \$1.7 million and they have come up with a list of recommendations on how to expend the funds. The list includes roofing and flashing repairs, dehumidification, life safety and building security issues, mold abatement, debris removal, and tuck pointing. The final report is due in July and it was suggested the council hold a work session to determine how the city should proceed prior to the December 31, 2022 deadline. If the city proceeds with spending these bonding dollars, they would not have to be run through the city's Capital Improvement Plan process. City Administrator Andrew Bremseth said time will be of the essence, but many of the suggested projects could be done inside the building, which extends the construction season. The council's current course of action is to demolish the structure, and they are not obligated to use these funds. The council could return the money, get the language amended to allow more demolition or seek additional funding.

Arneson said housing redevelopment projects have not been successful in the past due to their reliance on housing tax credits and the stringent process used to allocate those funds. Thompson felt if the city were to expend any funds, they would be best used to provide external security due to the extensive damage caused by vandalism over the years. He was concerned with the city's liability of someone getting serious harmed in the building. Thompson asked if the city's exposure would be if the paid for roof repairs and a storm damaged the work. Bill Sonmor said the city has liability, but not property insurance on the RTC, as this is a vacant building the city would not rebuild the structure if it were damaged. A council work session will be set up to discuss this matter further after the master plan has been completed.

The meeting adjourned at 7:51 am

PUBLIC HEARING TO CONSIDER A REQUEST FOR VARIANCE TO PLACE A DETACHED ACCESSORY STRUCTURE WITHIN THE FRONT AND SIDE YARD OF A PROPERTY LOCATED AT 640 WEST BIRCH AVENUE IN AN R-2 ZONE. REQUESTED BY LEROY THOMPSON.

Chair Stanislawski asked City staff to explain the request. Darrin Welle explained that Leroy & Carol Thompson are asking for a variance to place a detached 8 x 10' accessory garage within the front yard of two streets, not meeting front setbacks. This is defined as the area from the road right-of-way to the front of the primary structure. The structure is about 5' off of the right-of-way to both Birch Avenue and Buse Street. As this property sits there is no "rear yard" to place a structure on the back of this house. This house was built before city zoning regulations and does not lend itself to detached accessory construction the way the code requires today. This shed was moved on to the property already, but did not require a building permit to place it due to being under 200 sq. ft. in size. The shed may sit a little farther off of Birch Avenue than 5 feet, but is closer to Buse than Birch.

Darrin explained the ordinances and zoning codes that apply to this variance request in an R-2 Zone.

Front yard regulations:

- a) There shall be a front yard having a depth of not less than 30 feet.
- b) There shall be a front yard having a depth of not less than 35 feet on a lot or plot that abuts a thoroughfare as shown on the adopted city thoroughfare plan.
- c) There shall be a front yard on each street side of a corner lot. No accessory building shall project into the required front yard bordering either street.

Accessory Buildings:

a) A detached accessory building shall not be located in any required front or side yard.

b) A detached accessory building not over one story and not exceeding 19 feet in height shall have matching facade of the primary structure and shall occupy not more than 30% of the area of any rear yard.

Darrin explained a map of the area and the setbacks required. Darrin stated that Minnesota Statute Section 462. 357, SUBD. 6 provides:

- Variances shall only be permitted (a) when they are in harmony with the general purposes and intent of the ordinance and (b) when the variances are consistent with the comprehensive plan.
- Variances may be granted when the applicant for the variance establishes that there are practical difficulties in complying with the zoning ordinance. "Practical difficulties," as used in connection with the granting of a variance, means that (a) the property owner proposes to use the property in a reasonable manner not permitted by the zoning ordinance; (b) the plight of the landowner is due to circumstances unique to the property not created by the landowner; and (c) the variance, if granted, will not alter the essential character of the locality.

Darrin stated that the six Proposed Findings listed in the staff report were created with the idea of approval of the variance request. If the commission does not agree with any of the findings, then the commission should revisit the conditions to help to create a positive finding or establish findings that support denial.

Public Hearing to Consider a Request for a Variance to Place a Detached Accessory Structure with the front yard of the property located at 640 West Birch Avenue in an R-2 Zone. Requested by LeRoy & Carol Thompson was open to the public at **5:37** PM

Chair Stanislawski asked if anyone wished to speak to this request. LeRoy Thompson, 640 West Birch Avenue, stated there was no room for a shed in the backyard or the east side of the property.

Chair Stanislawski closed the Public Hearing to the Public at **5:38** PM, and bought the meeting back to the Planning Commission for discussion. There was no discussion.

Commissioner Kilde made a motion to recommend to approve the Variance request by LeRoy & Carol Thompson to place a detached accessory structure within their front and side yard, including the proposed findings as presented. It was seconded by Commissioner Johnson. Passed by the following vote:

PUBLIC HEARING TO CONSIDER A REQUEST FOR VARIANCE TO PLACE A DETACHED ACCESSORY STRUCTURE WITHIN THE SIDE YARD AND SIDE YARD SETBACK OF A PROPERTY LOCATED AT 720 EAST MOUNT FAITH AVENUE IN AN R-1 ZONE. REQUESTED BY SHERRI EASTERDAY.

Chair Stanislawski asked City staff to explain the request. Darrin Welle explained that Sherri Easterday has asked for a variance to place a detached approximately 8 x 10' accessory garage within the side yard and within 5' of the neighboring property line (a 0' setback is proposed). The structure is about 25' off the road right of way, the same distance as the house from the street. As this property sits there is not much of a "rear yard" to place a structure on the back of this house. This house was built before city zoning regulations and does not lend itself to detached accessory construction the way the code requires today. This shed was moved on to the property already, but did not require a building permit to place it due to being under 200 sq. ft. in size. The shed is placed the same distance off the road as the house. Darrin explained some photos of the property and mentioned there were no comments from the neighbors on the request.

Darrin explained the ordinances and zoning codes that apply to this variance request in an R-1 Zone. Accessory Buildings:

a) A detached accessory building shall not be located in any required front or side yard.

b) A detached accessory building not over one story and not exceeding 19 feet in height shall have matching facade of the primary structure and shall occupy not more than 30% of the area of any rear yard.

CONSIDER A RECOMMENDATION FROM THE HERITAGE PRESERVATION COMMISSION TO DESIGNATE BROKEN DOWN DAM LOCATED AT 600 BROKEN DOWN DAM ROAD TO THE FERGUS FALLS REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES.

Chair Stanislawski asked City staff to explain the request. Klara Beck stated that the HPC voted to recommend local historic designation for Broken Down Dam and its site, located at 600 Broken Down Dam Road. It was noted that the City of Fergus Falls is the owner of the property and had recently passed a resolution consenting to allow the application to occur. Recommendation: Renew the expiring Joint Cooperative Agreement for use of Emergency Operations Personnel and Equipment with the City of Moorhead

<u>Background/Key Points</u>: The Fire Department has had a Mutual Aid Agreement with the City of Moorhead for the past 15 years, which is expiring in July. The ability to respond to and call upon surrounding fire departments is a critical component for department and incident operations throughout our region. The written Cooperative Agreement has been reviewed and updated by both the Fergus Falls and Moorhead Fire Department, as well as both Cities Administrators and attorneys.

The significant change was the addition of the Fee Schedule Table (Appendix A), which applies to emergency incidents with a duration of 6 hours or more.

Budgetary Impact: On average we respond to 10-15 mutual aid responses per year and the cost of our personnel's hourly wage and fuel for the first several hours of an incident are factored into our yearly operating budget. Our department has been requested by Moorhead 3 times in 15 years.

JOINT COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT FOR USE OF EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PERSONNEL AND EQUIPMENT

THIS JOINT COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT (this "Agreement") is entered into this ____ day of _____, 2021, (the "Effective Date"), by and between the City of Moorhead, Minnesota, a political subdivision of the State of Minnesota ("Moorhead"); and the City of Fergus Falls, a political subdivision of the State of Minnesota ("Fergus Falls"); collectively, the Parties.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Fergus Falls has fire equipment and personnel capable of responding to emergency situations in Fergus Falls and the surrounding area, including Moorhead; and

WHEREAS, Moorhead has fire equipment and personnel capable of responding to emergency situations in Moorhead and the surrounding area, including Fergus Falls; and

WHEREAS, the Parties believe it will be mutually beneficial to provide emergency operation response services to each other or surrounding areas according to the terms and conditions provided under this Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual terms and covenants contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which the parties acknowledge, the parties hereby agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

I. PURPOSE. This Agreement is made pursuant to Minnesota Statute § 471.59, which authorizes the joint and cooperative exercise of powers common to contracting parties. The law of the States of Minnesota provides that political subdivisions and municipal corporations are empowered to make and enter into mutual aid agreements with other political subdivisions and municipal corporations in order to more effectively respond and provide public safety services during emergency situations. The intent of this Agreement is to make equipment, personnel, and other resources available to Fergus Falls and Moorhead.

II. DEFINITIONS.

- a. "Party" means Fergus Falls or Moorhead.
- b. "Requesting Official" means the person designated by a Party who is responsible for requesting assistance from the other Party.
- c. "Requesting Non-Official" means an emergency dispatch operator or a county sheriff, or his designee.
- d. "Requesting Party" means the Party that requests assistance from the other Party.

- e. "Responding Official" means the person designated by either Party who is responsible to determine whether and to what extent that Party should provide assistance to the Requesting Party.
- f. "Responding Party" means the Party that provides assistance to the Requesting Party.
- g. "Assistance" means fire and/or emergency medical services personnel and equipment.
- h. "Specialized Activity" means non-emergency assistance to include, but not be limited to, fire investigators, fire educators, fire instructors, training personnel, and associated equipment and facilities.
- **III. PARTIES.** The Parties shall consist of Moorhead and Fergus Falls. Upon the adoption of a resolution by its governing body, an executed copy of this Agreement shall be forwarded by each Party to both the City Manager of Moorhead and the City Administrator of Fergus Falls.

IV. PROCEDURE.

Subdivision 1. Request for Assistance. Whenever, in the opinion of a Requesting Official or Requesting Non-Official, there is a need for assistance from other parties, the Requesting Official, or Requesting Non-Official, may call upon the Responding Official to furnish assistance. Specialized activity of a non-emergency nature may be requested and/or provided by the Parties to this Agreement.

In order to invoke assistance under this Agreement, the Requesting Official or Requesting Non-Official shall be required to contact the Responding Official by voice communication system, in writing, or through a message relay provided by an emergency dispatch center. Any request for aid hereunder shall include a statement of the amount and type of equipment and personnel requested and shall specify the location to which the equipment and personnel are to be dispatched.

Subdivision 2. Response to Request. Upon the request for assistance from the Requesting Party, the Responding Official may authorize and direct his/her Party's personnel to provide assistance to the Requesting Party. This decision will be made after considering the needs of the Responding Party and the availability of resources. The Responding Official may request information as is necessary to confirm the emergency situation and to assess the types and amounts of such assistance that shall be provided.

Subdivision 3. Recall of Assistance. The Responding Official may at any time recall such assistance when in his or her best judgment or by an order from the governing body of the Responding Party, it is considered to be in the best interests of the Responding Party to do so.

Subdivision 4. Command of Scene. The Requesting Party shall be in command of the mutual aid scene. The personnel and equipment of the Responding Party shall be under the direction and control of the Requesting Party until the Responding Official withdraws assistance. The Responding Party's personnel and equipment shall be released by the Requesting Party when the resources are no longer required or when the Responding Party is needed within the area for which it normally provides services. The Responding Party may also withdraw its personnel and equipment when deemed to be in the best interest of the Responding Party and following notice

provided to the Requesting Party of the intended action. The Responding Party may withdraw resources if it determines response conditions are beyond acceptable risk.

Subdivision 5. Command of Scene by Requesting Non-Official. In the event that a request is made by a Requesting Non-Official due to a Requesting Party's lack of available personnel, the personnel and equipment of the Responding Party shall be under the direction and control of the Responding Party until such time as a Requesting Party has personnel able to assume command of the scene under the previous subdivision.

Subdivision 6. National Incident Management System. The Parties agree to implement the National Incident Management System during all emergency responses in accordance with NFPA 1561.

V. WORKERS' COMPENSATION.

Subdivision 1. Workers' Compensation Coverage. The Parties shall be responsible for injuries or death of its own personnel. Each Party will maintain workers' compensation insurance or self-insurance coverage, covering its own personnel while they are providing assistance pursuant to this Agreement. Each Party waives the right to sue the other Party to this Agreement for any workers' compensation benefits paid to its own employee or volunteer or their dependents, even if the injuries were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of the other party or its officers, employees, or volunteers.

Subdivision 2. Workers' Compensation Coverage. In the event that a Party responds to a call made by a Requesting Non-Official, that Party shall be responsible for injuries or death of its own personnel. Each Party will maintain workers' compensation insurance or self-insurance coverage, covering its own personnel while they are providing assistance pursuant to this Agreement. Each Party waives the right to sue the other Party to this Agreement for any workers' compensation benefits paid to its own employee or volunteer or their dependents, even if the injuries were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of the other party or its officers, employees, or volunteers.

Subdivision 3. <u>Automobile Liability Coverage</u>. The Parties will be responsible for its own actions and those of its employees and is responsible for complying with the motor vehicle financial responsibility laws of the State while they are providing assistance pursuant to this Agreement.

VI. DAMAGE TO EQUIPMENT. The Parties shall be responsible for damages to or loss of its own equipment. The Parties waive the right to sue the other Party for any damages to or loss of its equipment, even if the damages or losses were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of the other Party or its officers, employees, or volunteers.

VII. LIABILITY.

Subdivision 1. The Parties agree to waive all claims against the other Party for compensation for any loss, damage, personal injury, or death occurring as a consequence of the performance of this Agreement. The Parties agree to hold the other Party harmless for all damages arising out of the provisions of assistance in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, even if

the loss, damage, personal injury, or death was caused wholly or partially by the negligence of the other Party or its officers, employees, or volunteers.

Under no circumstances shall a Party be required to pay on behalf of itself and the other Party, any amounts in excess of the limits on liability established in Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466, applicable to any one (1) party. The limits of liability for some or all of the parties may not be added together to determine the maximum amount of liability for each Party. For purposes of determining total liability for damages, the participating governmental units, are considered a single governmental unit and the total liability for the participating governmental units shall not exceed the limits on governmental liability for a single governmental unit.

Subdivision 2. No Party to this Agreement, nor any officer of either Party, shall be liable to the other Party or to any other person for failure of either Party to furnish assistance to the other Party, or for recalling assistance, both as described in this Agreement.

VIII. CHARGES TO THE REQUESTING PARTY.

Subdivision 1: A Responding Party to this Agreement will not levy charges for assistance rendered to a Requesting Party under the terms of this Agreement unless that assistance continues for a period of more than six (6) hours. The Requesting Party shall, regardless of the length of time of assistance, reimburse the Responding Party for supplies used. If assistance provided under this Agreement continues for more than six (6) hours, the Responding Party will submit to the Requesting Party, an itemized invoice for the actual cost of any assistance provided after the initial six (6) hour period. The REIMBURSEMENT RATE TABLE, attached as **Appendix A**, will be used to determine the amount to charge for equipment, personnel, and supplies. The itemized invoice for equipment, personnel, and supplies shall be delivered to the Requesting Party within fifteen (15) days of the request for assistance. Charges for assistance are not contingent upon the availability of federal or state government funds.

Subdivision 2: The Requesting Party agrees to submit reimbursement to the Responding Party within thirty (30) days' receipt of the itemized invoice. If there are any disputes regarding the itemized invoice, the Requesting Party will pay the undisputed portion of the itemized invoice and the parties will arrange a meeting to discuss the disputed portion of the itemized invoice. Failure to resolve the dispute at the meeting may result in mediation proceedings or the pursuit of other legal remedies.

IX. DURATION. This Agreement will be in force from the Effective Date and notification of both the City Manager of Moorhead and the City Administrator of Fergus Falls. This Agreement will be in force for a period of fifteen (15) years from the Effective Date. The Parties may withdraw from this Agreement upon thirty (30) days' written notice to the other Party to this Agreement.

X. MISCELLANEOUS.

Subdivision 1. Regular Meetings. The Parties agree to meet on a regular basis, at least annually, to review interagency assistance plans and the provisions of this Agreement.

Subdivision 2. <u>Similar Agreements</u>. Nothing in this Agreement shall prevent the Parties herein from entering into similar agreements with another entity.

Subdivision 3. Written Amendment Required. No amendment, modification, or waiver of any condition, provision, or term will be valid or of any effect unless made in writing signed by the Party or Parties to be bound, or a duly authorized representative, and specifying with particularity the extent and nature of such amendment, modification, or waiver. Any waiver by either Party of any default of the other Party will not affect or impair any right arising from any subsequent default. Except as expressly and specifically stated otherwise, nothing herein will limit the remedies and rights of the Parties thereto under and pursuant to this Agreement.

Subdivision 4. <u>Grammatical Construction</u>. Whenever the singular member is used herein, the same includes the plural where appropriate, and the words of any gender include any other genders where appropriate.

Subdivision 5. Third Party Beneficiaries. The execution of this Agreement shall not give rise to any liability or responsibility for failure to respond to any request for assistance made pursuant to this Agreement. This Agreement shall not be construed as or deemed to be an agreement for the benefit of any third party or parties, and no third party or parties shall have any right of action hereunder for any cause of action.

Subdivision 6. <u>Default.</u> Upon the occurrence of any non-performance of either Party's obligations under this Agreement which has not been cured within thirty (30) days after written notice to the breaching Party, the non-breaching Party may take any one (1) or more of the following remedial steps: (a) terminate this Agreement; (b) suspend the non-breaching Party's performance under this Agreement until it receives assurances from the breaching Party satisfactory to the non-breaching Party that the breaching Party will cure such event of default and perform its obligations under this Agreement; and/or (c) commence legal or administrative proceedings for the collection of any amounts due hereunder or the enforcement of any covenant, agreement, or obligation of the breaching Party.

Subdivision 7. <u>Termination</u>. The Parties to this Agreement may terminate this Agreement, upon written notice to the other Party. Such notice shall be effective thirty (30) days after receipt.

Subdivision 8. Severability Clause. Each provision, section, sentence, clause, phrase, and word of this Agreement is intended to be severable. If any provision, section, sentence, clause, phrase, or word hereof is held by a court with jurisdiction to be illegal or invalid for any reason whatsoever, such illegality or invalidity will not affect the validity of the remainder of this Agreement.

Subdivision 9. Force Majeure. Neither Party will be liable to the other Party during any period in which its performance is delayed or prevented, in whole or in part, by circumstances beyond its reasonable control. Circumstances include, but are not limited to, the following: act of God (e.g., flood, earthquake, wind), fire, war, act of a public enemy or terrorist, act of sabotage, strike, or other labor dispute, riot, misadventure of the sea, inability to secure materials and/or transportation, or a restriction imposed by legislation, an order or a rule or regulation of a governmental entity. If such circumstance occurs, the Party claiming the delay must undertake reasonable action to notify the other Party of the same.

Subdivision 10. <u>Notice</u>. All notices, certificates, or other communications required under this Agreement will be deemed sufficiently given when delivered or deposited in the United States mail in certified form with postage fully prepaid and addressed as follows:

Subdivision 11. <u>Agreement Binding on Successors</u>. This Agreement will be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties hereto and their respective personal representatives, successors, and assigns.

Subdivision 12. Minnesota Law Applies. This Agreement will be controlled by the laws of Minnesota.

Subdivision 13. Execution in Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts with both Moorhead and Fergus Falls having a fully executed counterpart.

Subdivision 14. Effective Date. The Effective Date is the date of the last signature appearing below.

Recommendation:

- Declare unit #259, a 2009 "Tymco" Street sweeper Model 500X, with 7,557 hours "surplus" and authorize its disposal via trade in.
- Authorize the purchase of a "Regenerative Air" "Tymco" Sweeper-Model 500X Street sweeper from Environmental Equipment.
- Authorize budget increase to \$750,000.00

Background/Key Points:

Unit 259 has been in service since 2010 sweeping streets and keeping debris from entering the storm sewer system and is scheduled to be replaced.

We run 2 types of sweepers, this "regenerative air" type and a "mechanical" type. The application/uses are different for each type of sweeper but can also crossover. The regenerative air type sweeper works best picking up leaves and smaller debris, while the mechanical sweeper works best picking up wet leaves and the sand/gravel material left on the roadways from the winter.

The sweeper will be used in the fleet for a minimum of 7 years and at that time operational costs will be evaluated before it is considered for replacement.

Budgetary Impact:

- The purchase price is \$302,965.00. Factoring in a trade-in allowance of \$55,000 for unit #259, the out of pocket purchase price off of the state contract is \$247,965.00.
- The purchase will come from the 2021 Equipment fund budget.
- With the increased prices we are seeing in equipment, this purchase will exhast the 2021 budget allowance, while there are still needs within the Fleet. To cover the basic replacements that are still identified, I am requesting a budget adjustment from the approved \$670,000.00 increased up to \$750,000.00.

Recommendation:

Authorize the Mayor and City Administrator to execute the appropriate documents related to the Danner Holding LLC Facade Loan.

Background/Key Points:

Danner Holding LLC has asked for the City's participation in financing the resurfacing of their parking lot and updates to their building and property, including a new door, awning, painting, and landscaping. The total cost for the listed updates are estimated at \$25,000. Danner Holding LLC purchased the building in December 2020 with financing from Farmers State Bank. The property owner has contributed \$6,000 personal financing towards various upgrades to the property thus far and is seeking reasonable financing through the BDFF-managed Facade Loan Program to complete the work. Matt Danner will maintain an office for his transportation business out of the updated building and will also maintain a small used-car lot called Riverside Autos.

City Staff and BDFF have reviewed financial information submitted by Danner Holding LLC and are recommending approval of a 7 year \$25,000 Facade Loan with an interest rate of 2%. These terms are consistent with other City loans for similar projects.

The collateral for the loan will be a second position on the real estate located at 507 South Sheridan Street, Fergus Falls, MN.

- 1) First position, Farmers State Bank
- 2) Second position, City of Fergus Falls \$25,000 Facade Loan

Matt & Erika Danner are willing to sign corporate and personal guaranties on the \$25,000 loan.

The City will request a 1% application fee on the loan amount. Because the Loan is under \$75,000, a public hearing by the City is not necessary.

Budgetary Impact:

The City will be receiving interest on the loan, and these improvements to the property would be providing needed updates to a neglected building along a business district thoroughfare.

ORDINANCE NO. 14, EIGHTH SERIES

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FERGUS FALLS, MINNESOTA, AMENDING CITY CODE CHAPTER 33 ENTITLED "GOVERNMENT ETHICS" RELATING TO A CODE OF ETHICS COVERING PUBLIC OFFICIALS, CITY EMPLOYEES AND ITS VOLUNTEERS, WHICH AMONG OTHER THINGS, CONTAINS PENALTY PROVISIONS.

THE CITY OF FERGUS FALLS DOES ORDAIN:

Section 1. The City Council of the City of Fergus Falls determines Fergus Falls government exists to serve the people of Fergus Falls, and to do so effectively, the people of Fergus Falls must have confidence and trust in the integrity of their local government. The public judges its government by the way its public officials and employees conduct themselves. City officials and employees hold positions of public trust under the scrutiny of public opinion, and their actions must be above suspicion. The public deserves its public officials maintain the highest ethical principles and avoid misconduct and conflicts of interest, apparent or real. The public has the right to expect its public officials to act in a manner that preserves public confidence in and respect for its government. Effective democracy depends on a government that is fair, ethical and accountable to the people it serves. Therefore, this Code of Ethics for public officials is adopted to provide an ethical guide and specific rules which reflect the ethical values of the City of Fergus Falls and its residents. The Code of Ethics is both inspirational and a basis for disciplinary action and defines levels of conduct below which no public official or city employee may fall without being subject to disciplinary action. The Code of Ethics is designed to promote high ethical standards and conduct, and foster a healthy culture throughout City government. It is the touchstone for all who work with and for the benefit of the City and to assist in fulfilling those important responsibilities to the people of Fergus Falls.

Section 2. City Code Chapter 33, Government Ethics, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 33.01 ETHICS IN GOVERNMENT.

Public officials must put the public's interest ahead of their own personal advancement and financial interests. Public officials must disclose and refrain from participating in decisions where they may have a conflict of interest. Public officials must avoid misconduct and actions that might impair independence of judgment or give the appearance of impropriety or a conflict of interest. Public officials must not use their position to gain privileges or special treatment or use public property for private or personal purposes.

§ 33.02 PUBLIC OFFICIAL.

In the performance of official duties public officials shall act for the benefit of the City. The term "public official", as used in this chapter 33, includes elected officials (the city council and the mayor), appointed officials (persons that serve on city boards, committees, and commissions, including the Charter Commission and the Port Authority), and city employees.

§ 33.03 CONFLICTS OF INTEREST.

- (A) Definition of Conflicts of Interest and Financial Interest. A public official shall avoid any situation that might give rise to a conflict of interest. The term "conflict of interest", as used in this chapter 33, is present when, in the discharge of official duties, a public official participates in a governmental decision, action or transaction in which:
 - (1) he or she has a financial interest,

- (2) a business, organization, corporation, or association which he or she serves as an officer, director or board member has a financial interest or other interest which may conflict with the responsibilities owed to the public as a public official,
- (3) his or her employer has a financial interest, or
- (4) his or her spouse, domestic partner, or dependent has a financial interest.

The term "financial interest", as used in this Chapter 33, is any interest, including loans, which may yield, directly or indirectly, a monetary or other material benefit

- (B) Participating with a Conflict of Interest.
- (1) <u>No Participation.</u> A public official must not participate in making or attempt to use his or her position to influence any City governmental decision, action, or transaction in which the public official knows or has reason to know that he or she has a conflict of interest. To participate or participation as used in this paragraph (B) means making a decision, taking action, entering into a transaction, providing advice or a recommendation, introducing, sponsoring, debating, voting on, approving, and investigating the decision, action, or transaction. Participation includes the direct and active supervision of the participation of a subordinate in the matter. Participation is more than official responsibility, knowledge, perfunctory involvement, or involvement on an administrative or peripheral basis.
- (2) A public official may participate in a City governmental decision, action, or transaction involving an organization or entity if the public official or his or her spouse, domestic partner, or dependent is an officer, director, board member, or trustee of the organization and the organization does not have a financial interest or other interest which may conflict with the responsibilities owed the public as a public official. However, the public official must disclose his or her affiliation with the organization or entity as though it were a conflict of interest.
- (3) A public official may participate in a City governmental decision involving a related person, other than his or her spouse, domestic partner or dependent, if the related person does not have a financial interest in the governmental decision, action, or transaction. However, the public official must disclose his or her relationship with the related person as though it were a conflict of interest.
- (C) Disclosure of Conflicts of Interest. If a public official, in the discharge of his or her official duties, recognizes that his or her participation may create a conflict of interest, the public official shall disclose the conflict of interest as follows:
 - (1) The Mayor and members of the City Council shall disclose conflicts of interest to each other as soon as they become aware of the conflict, orally at or during a meeting of the City Council, or one of its committees.
 - (2) A department head shall disclose a conflict of interest to the Mayor, the City Council, and the City Administrator, either orally or by a written statement describing the matter requiring action or decision and the nature of his or her conflict of interest.
 - (3) Employees of the city shall disclose a conflict of interest to their supervisor and to the City Administrator and shall also be disclosed to the Mayor and City Council.
 - (4) Public officials who are not covered by paragraphs (1), (2) and (3) above shall disclose conflicts of interest as soon as they become aware of the conflict, orally to the committee chair at or during a meeting of the committee or commission.

§ 33.04 SOLICITNG OR ACCEPTING PERSONAL GIFTS.

- (A) A public official shall not solicit or accept any gift from any interested person, lobbyist, or principal who has a direct financial interest in a decision the public official is authorized to make.
 - (B) Exceptions. The prohibitions in this section do not apply if the gift is:
 - (1) A campaign contribution as defined in Minnesota Statutes, Section 10A.01, Subd. 11;
 - (2) A service to assist an official in the performance of official duties, including, but not limited to, providing advice, consultation, information and communication in connection with legislation, or services to constituents;
 - (3) A service of insignificant monetary value; A service is of an insignificant monetary value if the monetary value of said service is less than \$50.00 (Fifty Dollars).
 - (4) A plaque or similar memento recognizing services in a field of specialty or to a charitable cause;
 - (5) A trinket or memento of insignificant value;
 - (6) Informational material of unexceptional value;
 - (7) Food or a beverage given at a reception, meal, or meeting away from the recipient's place of work by an organization before whom the recipient appears to make a speech or answer questions as part of a program;
 - (8) Given because of the recipient's membership in a group, a majority of whose members are not officials, and an equivalent gift is given to the other members of the group; or
 - (9) Given by an interested person, lobbyist, or principal who is a related person to the recipient, unless the gift is given on behalf of someone who is not a related person.
- (C) A public official who receives any gift prohibited by this section shall return, dispose of, or request that the City Council accept the gift on behalf of the City.

§ 33.05 USE OF OFFICIAL POSITION TO SOLICIT PRIVILEGES OR SPECIAL TREATMENT.

A public official shall not use his or her official position to solicit privileges or special treatment, unless the privileges or special treatment are for the benefit of the City.

§ 33.06 CITY PROPERTY.

A public official shall not engage in or permit the unauthorized use or destruction of City property.

§ 33.07 REQUIRED REPORTING OF FRAUD; UNLAWFUL USE OF PUBLIC FUNDS OR PROPERTY.

A public official that discovers evidence of fraud, theft, embezzlement, forgery, or unlawful use of public funds or property shall promptly report the discovery to the City Administrator.

§ 33.08 DISCRIMINATION OR HARASSMENT.

A public official shall not engage in discrimination or harassment in the workplace based on race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, affectional preference, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, disability, sexual orientation or age.

§ 33.09 USE OR DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION.

- (A) A public official shall not use or disclose any information gained in the course of or by reason of his or her official position in any way that violates his or her fiduciary duty to the City of Fergus Falls or the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act.
- (B) A current or former public official shall not use or disclose privileged, nonpublic, confidential, private or proprietary information gained by reason of being a public official in any way that could result in financial gain for the public official, or for their spouse, domestic partner, or dependents or for a person in a committed relationship with the public official, or for any associated business or organization that the public official is either an employee of or a volunteer for.

§ 33.10 AVOIDING BIAS OR FAVORITISM.

When making decisions or recommendations on behalf of the City of Fergus Falls, a public official shall always act for the benefit of the City of Fergus Falls, avoid bias or favoritism, and shall respect cultural differences.

§ 33.11 INAPPROPRIATE INFLUENCE.

- (A) The role of a public official is to exercise his or her judgment to further the best interests of the City of Fergus Falls. For an appointed public officials and city employees this includes making recommendations and provide policy options to elected public officials. Once the City Council sets policy, the job of a appointed public official and city employee is to implement the policy in good faith, regardless of his or her personal views.
- (B) A public official or an employee or business associate of a public official shall not inappropriately influence or attempt to influence the exercise of professional judgment of any employee of the City of Fergus Falls. Examples of inappropriate influence by a public official include asking or ordering a city employee to:
 - (1) Violate this Code of Ethics or an applicable code of professional responsibility under which the employee operates; or
 - (2) Do a special favor or make an exception for a constituent or other individual or organization contrary to existing law or adopted City policy; or
 - (3) Misrepresent a recommendation to other public officials.

§ 33.12 CODE OF ETHICS VIOLATIONS.

- (A) A public official must report any conduct by other public officials that he or she believes violates this Code of Ethics to the City Administrator or, if the alleged violator is the City Administrator, the alleged violation must be reported to the City Attorney.
- (B) Once a violation is reported under the above clause, the City Administrator or City Attorney, whichever is applicable, must immediately investigate the alleged violation and make appropriate recommendations to the Mayor, Council and/or the City Administrator.

§ 33.13 SANCTIONS - ENFORCEMENT.

- (A) Any person who violates any provision of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. The City Administrator shall monitor compliance with this chapter and shall report all suspected violations to the City Attorney. The City Attorney shall review the report of the City Administrator and determine the validity of the complaint, and, if warranted, prosecute the action against any person who violates any provision of this chapter, on behalf of the City of Fergus Falls. It shall not be a conflict of interest for the City Attorney's Office to prosecute a public official for any alleged Code of Ethics violations that constitute a crime pursuant to this chapter. If the City Attorney or a member of the City Attorney's office is suspected of having violated this chapter, the City Administrator shall employ outside special counsel to review the complaint and, if warranted, prosecute the action on behalf of the City of Fergus Falls.
- (B) In addition to criminal sanctions, a public official who violates this Code of Ethics may also be subject to disciplinary action including termination of City employment or removal from appointed position.
- <u>Section 3.</u> City Code Chapter 2 entitled "Ethics In Government" including penalty for violation is hereby adopted in its entirety, by reference, as though repeated verbatim herein.
- Section 4. Effective Date. The effective date of this ordinance shall be the ___day of ______, 2021.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF FERGUS FALLS AND GREATER FERGUS FALLS REGARDING ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

(It is suggested that this be separate from the above agreement to allow for mutual adjustments over time, not only to be determined by the terms of the above agreement)

If this is truly going to be a partnership it is recommended that City Staff and Greater Fergus Falls create this memorandum of understanding together in a joint working session. City Council members and GFF Board might be invited to join in the conversation, should City and GFF choose to include them.

PURCHASE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT ("<u>Agreement</u>") made and entered into as of the 18th day of May 2021, by and between the **City of Fergus Falls**, a Minnesota municipal corporation, whose address is 112 West Washington Avenue, Fergus Falls, MN 56537 (the "<u>Seller</u>"), and **Lonnie Ballweg and Danielle Ballweg**, whose address is 2306 Southview Drive, Fergus Falls, Minnesota 56537 (the "**Buyer**").

- 1. <u>Real Property</u>. Seller agrees to sell, and Buyer agrees to purchase, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, real property located in Fergus Falls, Otter Tail County, Minnesota, and legally described on <u>Exhibit A</u>, together with all improvements and appurtenances belonging thereto (the "<u>Real Property</u>").
- 2. **Purchase Price**. The purchase price shall be Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars and No/00 (\$35,000.00) payable in cash or certified funds at closing.
- 3. <u>Contingencies</u>. The terms of this Agreement are contingent upon certain conditions, referred to as "contingencies", being met on or before the date of closing, which contingencies are set forth as follows:

There are no contingencies.

- 4. <u>Title, Liens and Encumbrances</u>. At closing, Seller shall transfer title to the Real Property to the Buyer by a Quit Claim Deed conveying Seller's title to the Buyer. The sale and transfer by Quit Claim Deed shall be free of all liens and encumbrances except for the following:
 - (a) Building and zoning laws, ordinances, including local, state and federal regulations.
- 5. <u>Title Examination</u>. The Buyer may procure its own expense a title insurance commitment and final owner's policy and shall provide a copy of the commitment within 7 days of it being issued. If the commitment shows that title to the Real Property is unmarketable, the Seller may elect (at Seller's sole discretion) to either terminate this Agreement or correct title to the Real Property and make it marketable. If the title to the Real Property cannot be made marketable within 90 days of being provided a copy of the commitment this Agreement shall be wholly null, void, and unenforceable, unless the Buyer waives its objections and proceeds to close. If Buyer proceeds to closing with or without title insurance commitment or final owner's policy, Buyer shall be deeded to waive any objections to title. The closing may be extended by agreement of the Seller to permit the Seller a sufficient time to correct any title defects. However, if title defects cannot be corrected within that timeframe, this Agreement shall terminate. The cost of the title insurance commitment and final policy shall be paid for by Buyer.
- 6. <u>Closing</u>. Closing of this transaction shall take place and possession of said premises shall be delivered to the Buyer on or before the 15th day of June 2021 (the "<u>Closing</u>

<u>Date</u>"), subject to the extension of time heretofore granted if title to such premises shall be found unmarketable. The closing shall be handled by the law office of Nycklemoe & Ellig, P.A. located at 106 East Washington Avenue, Fergus Falls, Minnesota 56537. No in person closing shall be required as closing documents shall be transmitted by mail, email, or fax and money shall be wired between the parties.

- 7. <u>Real Estate Taxes and Assessments</u>. The Seller agrees to pay all real estate taxes and assessments for special improvements levied or assessed for the year prior to closing and prior years. Real estate taxes, and assessments for special improvements for the year of closing shall be prorated between the Buyer and the Seller, and in the event the exact amount of the taxes and assessments for the year of closing are not yet known, the amount to be prorated shall be based on the real estate taxes and assessments for special improvements for the year prior to closing. Buyer agrees to pay the real estate taxes and assessments for special improvements accruing after closing and all subsequent years.
- 8. <u>Buyer Representations</u>. Buyer hereby represents to Seller that Buyer has the full and complete authority to enter into this Agreement, and that the individuals executing this Agreement on behalf of Buyer have the legal and organizational authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of Buyer and to bind Buyer.
- 9. <u>Seller Covenants, Warranties and Representations</u>. Seller provides the following warranties, covenants, and representations, which shall be effective as of the date of this Agreement and as of the date of closing:
 - (a) Seller has the legal and organizational authority to enter into this Agreement and to sell the Real Property, and that the individuals executing this Agreement on its behalf have the legal and organizational authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of Seller and to bind Seller.
 - (b) No consent or approval of any person, entity, or governmental agency or authority is required with respect to the execution and delivery of this Agreement by Seller and, as of the Closing Date, no such consent or approval will be required with respect to the sale by Seller of the Real Property to Buyer.
 - (c) Seller has not received notice from any governmental authority of any violation affecting any portion of the Real Property.
 - (d) There are no outstanding, pending, or, to the best of Seller's knowledge and belief, threatened suits, judgments, condemnation proceedings, zoning changes, or any other proceedings pending or of record in any court of any nature respecting the Real Property;

- (e) As of the Closing Date, there will be no recorded or unrecorded liens, mortgages, security interests, security agreements, or UCC financing statements, against the Real Property or any part thereof.
- 10. <u>Well Disclosure</u>. Seller certifies that there are no wells on the Real Property.
- 11. <u>Public Utilities, City Water and Sewer Disclosure</u>. Seller discloses there are no public utilities, including water or sewer, serving the Real Property.
- 12. <u>Title and Real Property sold "AS IS" "WHERE IS"</u>. The Real Property is sold without warranty or representation as to title and Buyer accepts the property in its "AS IS" and "WHERE IS" condition including all faults known or unknown.
 - 13. <u>Documents and Deliverables for Closing.</u>
 - (a) Seller shall furnish the following documents at the time of closing:
 - i. Quit Claim Deed.
 - ii. Any Certificate of Real Estate Value or Fair Consideration required by the applicable state agencies.
 - iii. Any documents required which are necessary to convey good and marketable title, free of any encumbrances or liens, and otherwise consistent with this Agreement.
 - (b) Buyer shall deliver the following at Closing:
 - i. Purchase price payable in cash or certified funds.
 - ii. Any other document required by this agreement.
- 14. **Possession.** At closing, Seller will deliver possession of the Real Property to Buyer.
- 15. <u>Allocation of Closing Expenses</u>. The parties shall apportion the Closing expenses in the following manner:
 - (a) Seller's expenses Seller shall be responsible for:
 - i. Transfer tax, if any, connected with the recording of the Quit Claim Deed;
 - ii. The recording fees for any corrective instruments;

- iii. Its own attorney's fees;
- iv. One-half of the total anticipated \$400.00 closing fee charged by the Closing Agent, and
- v. All other costs specifically allocated to the Seller as set forth in this Agreement.
- (b) Buyer's expenses Buyer shall be responsible for:
 - i. Recording fees for the Quit Claim Deed;
 - ii. Its own attorney's fees, including fees for title opinions;
 - iii. The cost of an owner's title insurance policy;
 - iv. One-half of the total anticipated \$400.00 closing fee charged by the Closing Agent, and
 - v. All other costs specifically allocated to the Buyer as set forth in this Agreement, including but not limited to, ALTA survey costs, lender fees and appraisals, and environmental site assessments, if any.
- 16. <u>Real Property to permanently attach to adjacent land</u>. Buyer is the current owner of real property described in that Warranty Deed dated February 28, 2020, filed March 4, 2020 and recorded in the Office of the County Recorder, Otter Tail County, Minnesota as Document #1234277, which is adjacent to the Real Property described in Exhibit A. Buyer agrees that the Real Property described in Exhibit A shall be permanently attached to the real property described in Document #1234277 as if to make one lot which shall not be subdivided at any time after closing.
- 17. <u>Default</u>. If Buyer fails to perform any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement within the specified time limits, Seller may, at Seller's option, declare this Agreement terminated or have this Agreement specifically enforced. Likewise, if Seller fails to perform any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement within the specified time limits, Buyer may declare this Agreement terminated or Buyer may have this Agreement specifically enforced. The rights and remedies granted to the parties in this Section are intended to be cumulative to all other rights and remedies available to the parties (whether under this Agreement, at law, in equity or otherwise); accordingly, the exercise by either party of any such right or remedy shall not preclude it from exercising any other such right or remedy.
- 18. <u>Time of the Essence</u>. Time is of the essence of each provision of this entire Agreement and all of the conditions thereof.

- 19. <u>Modification</u>. No change or modification of this Agreement shall be valid unless the same be in writing and signed by all the parties to this Agreement.
- 20. <u>Persons Bound by this Agreement</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties, their heirs, devisees, and legal representatives., This Agreement may not be assigned by the either party without each party's prior written consent. The rights and obligations of any party to this Agreement may be exercised or satisfied by that party's legal representative.
- 21. <u>Governing Law</u>. The provisions of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the state of Minnesota.
- 22. <u>Condemnation</u>. If prior to the Date of Closing, a public or private entity with the power of eminent domain commences condemnation proceedings against all or any part of the Real Property, Seller will promptly notify Buyer, and Buyer may, at Buyer's sole option, terminate this Agreement.
- 23. <u>Casualty Loss</u>. Until the Date of Closing, the risk of loss for the Real Property is on Seller.
- 24. <u>Mutual Indemnification</u>. Seller will indemnify and hold Buyer harmless from all liabilities (including reasonable attorneys' fees in defending against claims) arising out of claims by third parties relating to acts or occurrences on, at or with respect to the Real Property which occur prior to the closing, unless such claims relate to acts by Buyer or its agents. Buyer will indemnify and hold Seller harmless from all liabilities (including reasonable attorney fees in defending against claims) arising out of claims by third parties relating to acts or occurrences on, at or with respect to the Real Property which occur on or after the closing unless such claims relate to acts by Seller or its agents.
- 25. <u>Signature in Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall be an original, with the same effect as if the signatures thereto and hereto were upon the same instrument. The parties hereto confirm that any facsimile or scanned copy of another party's executed counterpart of this Agreement (or its signature page thereof) will be deemed to be an executed original thereof.
