Recommendation:

- Set the ADA Transition Plan Public Hearing Date for December 6, 2021
- Appoint Senior Engineering Tech. & Sidewalk Program Coordinator as ADA Coordinator Public Rights of Way

Background/Key Points:

As part of the funding process for potential Federal Aid Projects the City must have on file an approved "ADA Transition Plan" for its public rights of way. This plan identifies obstacles within the public Right of Way, how and when to fix them, and lists the responsible officials.

As a standard practice the City has always upgraded its infrastructure to meet the current ADA standards with every new construction, reconstruction project, and street resurfacing project it completes. However, MnDOT and Federal Agencies are now requiring that a written plan be in place in order for the City to receive Federal Funds for future projects.

The City Council must hold a public hearing on the ADA Transition Plan. I am requesting it be scheduled for the <u>December 6, 2021</u> City Council meeting. The Council also needs to appoint a city staff member as "ADA Coordinator – Public Rights of Way". I am recommending the Senior Engineering Tech. & Sidewalk Program Coordinator be appointed to this position.

Introduction

Transition Plan Need and Purpose

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), enacted on July 26, 1990, is a civil rights law prohibiting discrimination against individuals on the basis of disability. ADA consists of five titles outlining protections in the following areas:

- 1. Employment
- 2. State and local government services
- 3. Public accommodations
- 4. Telecommunications
- 5. Miscellaneous Provisions

Title II of ADA pertains to the programs, activities and services public entities provide. As a provider of public transportation services and programs, the City of Fergus Falls must comply with this section of the Act as it specifically applies to public service agencies. Title II of ADA provides that, "...no qualified individual with a disability shall, by reason of such disability, be excluded from participation in or be denied the benefits of the services, programs, or activities of a public entity, or be subjected to discrimination by any such entity." (42 USC. Sec. 12132; 28 CFR. Sec. 35.130)

As required by Title II of <u>ADA, 28 CFR. Part 35 Sec. 35.105 and Sec. 35.150</u>, the City of Fergus Falls has conducted a self-evaluation of its facilities within public rights of way and has developed this Transition Plan detailing how the organization will ensure that all of those facilities are accessible to all individuals

ADA and its Relationship to Other Laws

Title II of ADA is companion legislation to two previous federal statutes and regulations: the Architectural Barriers Acts of 1968 and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

The Architectural Barriers Act of 1968 is a Federal law that requires facilities designed, built, altered or leased with Federal funds to be accessible. The Architectural Barriers Act marks one of the first efforts to ensure access to the built environment.

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 is a Federal law that protects qualified individuals from discrimination based on their disability. The nondiscrimination requirements of the law apply to employers and organizations that receive financial assistance from any Federal department or agency. Title II of ADA extended this coverage to all state and local government entities, regardless of whether they receive federal funding or not.

Agency Requirements

Under Title II, the City of Fergus Falls must meet these general requirements:

- Must operate their programs so that, when viewed in their entirety, the programs are accessible to and useable by individuals with disabilities (<u>28 C.F.R. Sec. 35.150</u>).
- May not refuse to allow a person with a disability to participate in a service, program or activity simply because the person has a disability (<u>28 C.F.R. Sec. 35.130 (a)</u>.
- Must make reasonable modifications in policies, practices and procedures that deny equal access to individuals with disabilities unless a fundamental alteration in the program would result (28 C.F.R. Sec. 35.130(b) (7).
- May not provide services or benefits to individuals with disabilities through programs that are separate or different unless the separate or different measures are necessary to ensure that benefits and services are equally effective (<u>28 C.F.R. Sec. 35.130(b)(iv) & (d)</u>.
- Must take appropriate steps to ensure that communications with applicants, participants and members of the public with disabilities are as effective as communications with others (29 C.F.R. Sec. 35.160(a).
- Must designate at least one responsible employee to coordinate ADA compliance [28 <u>CFR Sec. 35.107(a)</u>]. This person is often referred to as the "ADA Coordinator." The public entity must provide the ADA coordinator's name, office address, and telephone number to all interested individuals [28 CFR Sec. 35.107(a)].
- Must provide notice of ADA requirements. All public entities, regardless of size, must provide information about the tights and protections of Title II to applicants, participants, beneficiaries, employees, and other interested persons [28 CFR Sec. 35,106]. The notice must include the identification of the employee serving as the ADA coordinator and must provide this information on an ongoing basis [28 CFR Sec. 104.8(a)].
- Must establish a grievance procedure. Public entities must adopt and publish grievance procedures providing for prompt and equitable resolution of complaints [28 CFR Sec. 35.107(b)]. This requirement provides for a timely resolution of all problems or conflicts related to ADA compliance before they escalate to litigation and/or the federal complaint process.

NOTE: This document has been created to specifically cover accessibility within the Public Rights of Way and does not include information on the City's programs, practices, or building facilities not related to Public Rights of Way.

Self-Evaluation

Overview

The City of Fergus Falls is required, under Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and 28CFR35.105, to perform a self-evaluation of its current <u>transportation infrastructure</u> policies, practices, and programs. This self-evaluation will identify what policies and practices impact accessibility and examine how the City implements these policies. The goal of the self-evaluation is to verify that, in implementing the City's policies and practices, the department is providing accessibility and not adversely affecting the full participation of individuals with disabilities.

The self-evaluation also examines the condition of the City's Pedestrian Circulation Route/Pedestrian Access Route) (PCR/PAR) and identifies potential need for PCR/PAR infrastructure improvements. This will include the sidewalks, curb ramps, bicycle/pedestrian trails, traffic control signals and transit facilities that are located within the City rights of way. Any barriers to accessibility identified in the self-evaluation and the remedy to the identified barrier are set out in this transition plan.

Summary

In **2020**, the City of Fergus Falls examined its inventory of pedestrian facilities within its public right of way consisting of the evaluation of the following facilities:

- 44.68 miles of sidewalks
- 867 Intersection Quadrants (curb ramps)
- 9.10 miles of Bike Paths (paved trails pedestrian use allowed)
- 52 traffic control signals (13 Intersections)
- 0 bus stops
- 0.78 miles of Bike Lanes (Signs and pavement markings)
- 8.37 miles of Bikeways (Signs but no pavement markings)

The City of Fergus Falls evaluated their curb ramps on a 1-3 rating system. The descriptions of these ratings for the intersection quadrants are as follows:

Curb Ramp Rating 1: Ramp(s) are fully compliant

Curb Ramp Rating 2: Ramp(s) are non-compliant

Curb Ramp Rating 3: No ramp exists at sidewalk and curb intersection

A detailed evaluation on how these facilities relate to ADA standards is found in Appendix A and will be updated periodically.

Policies and Practices

Previous Practices

Since the adoption of the ADA, the City of Fergus Falls has striven to provide accessible pedestrian features as part of the City's capital improvement projects. As additional information was made available as to the methods of providing accessible pedestrian features, the City updated their procedures to accommodate these methods. The City has constructed its street improvement projects to be compliant with the ADA standards in effect at the time of construction or reconstruction.

Policy

The City of Fergus Falls goal is to continue to provide accessible pedestrian design features as part of the City capital improvement projects. The City has established ADA design standards and procedures as listed in Appendix F. These standards and procedures will be kept up to date with nationwide and local best management practices.

The City will consider and respond to all accessibility improvement requests. All accessibility improvements that have been deemed reasonable will be scheduled consistent with transportation priorities. The City will coordinate with external agencies to ensure that all new or altered pedestrian facilities within the City's jurisdiction are ADA compliant to the maximum extent feasible.

Maintenance of public pedestrian facilities within the public right of way will continue to follow the policies set forth by the City. All snow and ice removal from public sidewalks is the responsibility of the owner of the abutting property as is the general maintenance of the sidewalk surface for safety. The City has an established a public sidewalk replacement program to help the property owners by lowering the cost of any necessary work and allowing the remaining cost of such work to be placed on a special assessment. Please refer to the City Code Chapter 5 for more information regarding streets and sidewalks. The City Code can be found on the City's website at www.ci.fergus-falls.mn.us.

Requests for accessibility improvements can be submitted to the City Engineer or Public Works Director. Contact information is located in Appendix E.

Improvement Schedule

Priority Areas

The City of Fergus Falls has identified priority areas for planned accessibility improvement projects. These areas have been selected due to funding availability and their proximity to

specific land uses such as schools, government offices and medical facilities, as well as from the receipt of public comments. The priority areas are as follows:

- Scheduled / Active Street Projects using Federal or State Funds
- Scheduled / Active Street Projects using City or Grant Funds
- Planned Projects listed in City's Capital Improvement Program
- Specific requests from the public for accessibility improvements

Additional priority will be given to any location where an improvement project or alteration was constructed after January 26, 1991, and accessibility features were omitted.

External Agency Coordination

Many other agencies are responsible for pedestrian facilities within the jurisdiction of the City of Fergus Falls. The City will coordinate with those agencies to track and assist in the facilitation of the elimination of accessibility barriers along their routes.

Schedule

The City of Fergus Falls has set the following schedule goals for improving the accessibility of its pedestrian facilities within the City jurisdiction:

- After 10 years, 80% of accessibility features within the public right of way jurisdiction identified by City staff would be ADA compliant.
- After 20 years, 90% of accessibility features within the public right of way jurisdiction of the City would be ADA compliant.

ADA Coordinator Public Rights of Way

The City of Fergus Falls has identified an ADA Title II Coordinator to oversee the City policies and procedures regarding Public Rights of Way. Contact information for this individual is located in Appendix E.

Implementation Schedule

Methodology

The City of Fergus Falls will utilize two methods for upgrading pedestrian facilities to the current ADA standards. The first and most comprehensive of the two methods are the scheduled street and utility improvement projects. All pedestrian facilities impacted by these projects will be upgraded to current ADA accessibility standards. The second method is the stand alone sidewalk and ADA accessibility improvement project. These projects will be incorporated into the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) on a case by case basis as determined by the City of

Fergus Falls staff. The City CIP, which includes a detailed schedule and budget for specific improvements, is included on Attachment No. 2.

Public Outreach

The City of Fergus Falls recognizes that public participation is an important component in the development of this document. Input from the community has been gathered and used to help define priority areas for improvements within the jurisdiction of the City of Fergus Falls.

Public outreach for the creation of this document consisted of the following activities:

A Public Hearing was held on ______ at the City Council meeting regarding the City's ADA Transition Plan. This document is available in the City Engineer's Office and on the City's website (www.ci.fergus-falls.mn.us)

This document was also available for public comment. A summary of comments received and detailed information regarding the public outreach activities are located in Appendix C.

Grievance Procedure

If users of the City of Fergus Falls facilities and services believe the City has not provided reasonable accommodation, they have the right to file a grievance.

The City has developed a grievance procedure for the purpose of the prompt and equitable resolution of citizens' complaints, concerns, comments, and other grievances. This grievance procedure is outlined in Appendix D.

Progress Monitoring

This document will continue to be updated as conditions within the City evolve. The appendices in this document will be updated periodically, while the main body of the document will be updated approximately every 5 years or as necessary. With each main body update, a public comment period will be established to continue the public outreach.

Appendix A – Self-Evaluation Results

This initial self-evaluation of pedestrian facilities yielded the following results:

- 54% of curb ramps met current accessibility criteria (Ramps <u>with</u> "domes" detectable warning panels)
- 41% of curb ramps met previous accessibility criteria (Ramps <u>without</u> "domes" detectable warning panels)
- 5% intersections with sidewalks did not have any curb ramps
- 8% of traffic control signals had push buttons that are accessible, or had the pedestrian indications on recall
- 0% of traffic control signals had APS (Accessible Pedestrian Signal WALK phase is in audible or vibrotactile format)

Cost Information

Unit Prices

Construction costs for upgrading facilities can vary depending on each individual improvement and conditions of each site. Costs can also vary on the type and size of project the improvements are associated with. Listed below are representative 2020 costs for some typical accessibility improvements based on if the improvements are included as part of a retrofit type project, or as part of a larger comprehensive capital improvement project.

Intersection corner ADA improvement retrofit: +/- \$5,000 per corner

Intersection corner ADA improvement as part of adjacent capital project: +/- \$2,000 per corner

Priority Areas

Based on the results of the self-evaluation, the estimate costs associated with eliminating accessibility barriers within the targeted priority areas is as follows:

- Lincoln Avenue: Union to Friberg \$20,000 (Federal Project 2022)
- Union Avenue: Lincoln to Fir \$50,000 (Federal Project 2022)
- Broadway: Lincoln to Fir \$55,000 (Federal Project 2023)

Entire Jurisdiction

Based on the results of the self-evaluation, the estimate costs associated with providing ADA accessibility within the entire jurisdiction is \$925,000. This amount signifies a significant investment that the City of Fergus Falls is committed to making in the upcoming years. A systematic approach to providing accessibility will be taken in order to absorb the cost into the City of Fergus Falls budget for improvements to the public rights of way.

Appendix D - Grievance Procedure

As part of the ADA requirements the City has posted the following notice outlining its ADA requirements as it specifically applies to Public Rights of Way:

Public Notice

In accordance with the requirements of title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, the City of Fergus Falls will not discriminate against qualified individuals with disabilities on the basis of disability in City services, programs, or activities.

Employment: The City does not discriminate on the basis of disability in its hiring or employment practices and complies with all regulations promulgated by the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission under title I of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

Effective Communication: The City will generally, upon request, provide appropriate aids and services leading to effective communication for qualified persons with disabilities so they can participate equally in the City's programs, services, and activities, including qualified sign language interpreters, documents in Braille, and other ways of making information and communications accessible to people who have speech, hearing, or vision impairments.

Modifications to Policies and Procedures: The City will make all reasonable modifications to policies and programs to ensure that people with disabilities have an equal opportunity to enjoy all City programs, services, and activities. For example, individuals with service animals are welcomed in City offices, even where pets are generally prohibited.

Anyone who requires an auxiliary aid or service for effective communication, or a modification of policies or procedures to participate in a City program, service, or activity, should contact the office of the City Administrator as soon as possible but no later than 48 hours before the scheduled event.

The ADA does not require the City to take any action that would fundamentally alter the nature of its programs or services, or impose an undue financial or administrative burden.

The City will not place a surcharge on a particular individual with a disability or any group of individuals with disabilities to cover the cost of providing auxiliary aids/services or reasonable modifications of policy, such as retrieving items from locations that are open to the public but are not accessible to persons who use wheelchairs.

Appendix D – Grievance Procedure (Continued)

City of Fergus Falls

Grievance Procedure under the Americans with Disabilities Act for issues within the Public Rights of Way

This Grievance Procedure is established to meet the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 ("ADA") regarding accessibility issues occurring within the public rights of way under the jurisdiction of the City of Fergus Falls. It may be used by anyone who wishes to file a complaint alleging discrimination on the basis of disability in the provision of services, activities, programs, or benefits by the City of Fergus Falls. The City's Personnel Policy governs employment-related complaints of disability discrimination.

The complaint may be filed either in writing or verbally. It should contain information about the alleged discrimination such as name, address, phone number of complainant and location, date, and description of the problem. Alternative means of filing complaints, such as personal interviews or a tape recording of the complaint, will be made available for persons with disabilities upon request.

The complaint should be submitted by the grievant and/or his/her designee as soon as possible but no later than 60 calendar days after the alleged violation to:

An investigation, as may be appropriate, shall follow a filing of complaint. The investigation shall be commenced by the ADA Coordinator, or the designee of the ADA Coordinator, within ten (10) calendar days following the filing of complaint. The investigation will be informal but thorough, affording all interested persons and their representatives, if any, an opportunity to submit information relevant to such investigation.

A written determination as to the validity of the complaint and a resolution of the complaint, if any, shall be issued by the ADA Coordinator and a written copy mailed to the complainant within thirty (30) calendar days following the filing of the complaint.

The complainant may request a reconsideration of the case determination of the ADA Coordinator in instances where he or she is dissatisfied with the resolution. The request for reconsideration shall be made within ten (10) calendar days following the date the

complainant receives the determination of the ADA Coordinator. The request for reconsideration shall be made to the City Administrator of the City of Fergus Falls. The City Administrator shall review the records of said complaint and may conduct further investigation when necessary to obtain additional relevant information. The City Administrator shall issue his or her decision on the request for reconsideration within twenty (20) calendar days of the filing of the request for reconsideration. A copy of said decision shall be mailed to the complainant.

The complainant may request a reconsideration of the case determination of the City Administrator in instances where he or she is dissatisfied with the decision of the City Administrator. The request for reconsideration should be made within ten (10) calendar days following the date the complainant receives the determination of the City Administrator. The request for reconsideration shall be made to the City Council of the City of Fergus Falls. The City Council shall review the records of said complaint and may conduct further investigation when necessary to obtain additional relevant information and shall issue its decision thereon within thirty (30) calendar days of the filing of the request for reconsideration. A copy of said decision shall be mailed to the complainant. The decision of the City Council is final.

The complainant's right to prompt and equitable resolution of the complaint must not be impaired by his or her pursuit of other remedies, such as the filing of a complaint with the U.S. Department of Justice or any other appropriate federal agency. Furthermore, the filing of a lawsuit in State or Federal District Court can occur at any time. The use of this grievance procedure is not a prerequisite to the pursuit of other remedies.

These rules shall be construed to: 1) protect the substantive rights of interested persons, 2) meet appropriate due process standards, and 3) comply with the ADA and implementing regulations.

The resolution by the City of Fergus Falls of any one grievance does not constitute a precedent upon which the City is bound or upon which other complaining parties may rely.

The City shall maintain ADA grievance files for a period of seven years.

Design Procedures

Intersection Corners

Curb ramps or blended transitions will attempt to be constructed or upgraded to achieve compliance within all capital improvement projects. There may be limitations which make it technically infeasible for an intersection corner to achieve full accessibility within the scope of any project. Those limitations will be noted and those intersection corners will remain on the transition plan. As future projects or opportunities arise, those intersection corners shall continue to be incorporated into future work. Regardless on if full compliance can be achieved or not, each intersection corner shall be made as compliant as possible in accordance with the judgment of City staff.

Sidewalks / Trails

Sidewalks and trails will attempt to be constructed or upgraded to achieve compliance within all capital improvement projects. There may be limitations which make it technically infeasible for segments of sidewalks or trails to achieve full accessibility within the scope of any project. Those limitations will be noted and those segments will remain on the transition plan. As future projects or opportunities arise, those segments shall continue to be incorporated into future work. Regardless on if full compliance can be achieved or not, every sidewalk or trail shall be made as compliant as possible in accordance with the judgment of City staff.

Traffic Control Signals

Traffic control signals will attempt to be constructed or upgraded to achieve compliance within all capital improvement projects. There may be limitations which make it technically infeasible for individual traffic control signal locations to achieve full accessibility within the scope of any project. Those limitations will be noted and those locations will remain on the transition plan. As future projects or opportunities arise, those locations shall continue to be incorporated into future work. Regardless on if full compliance can be achieved or not, each traffic signal control location shall be made as compliant as possible in accordance with the judgment of City staff.

Bus Stops

There are no Bus Stops located within the City of Fergus Falls.

Other Transit Facilities

There are no additional Transit Facilities located within the City of Fergus Falls.

Other policies, practices and programs

Policies, practices and programs not identified in this document will follow the applicable ADA standards.

Design Standards

The City of Fergus Falls uses PROWAG, as modified by the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT), as its design standard. Appendix G – Glossary of Terms

ABA: See Architectural Barriers Act.

ADA: See Americans with Disabilities Act.

ADA Transition Plan: Mn/DOT's transportation system plan that identifies accessibility needs, the process to fully integrate accessibility improvements into the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP), and ensures all transportation facilities, services, programs, and activities are accessible to all individuals.

ADAAG: See Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines.

Accessible: A facility that provides access to people with disabilities using the design requirements of the ADA.

Accessible Pedestrian Signal (APS): A device that communicates information about the WALK phase in audible and vibrotactile formats.

Alteration: A change to a facility in the public right-of-way that affects or could affect access, circulation, or use. An alteration must not decrease or have the effect of decreasing the accessibility of a facility or an accessible connection to an adjacent building or site.

Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA): The Americans with Disabilities Act; Civil rights legislation passed in 1990 and effective July 1992. The ADA sets design guidelines for accessibility to public facilities, including sidewalks and trails, by individuals with disabilities.

Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines (ADAAG): contains scoping and technical requirements for accessibility to buildings and public facilities by individuals with disabilities under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990.

APS: See Accessible Pedestrian Signal.

Architectural Barriers Act (ABA): Federal law that requires facilities designed, built, altered or leased with Federal funds to be accessible. The Architectural Barriers Act marks one of the first efforts to ensure access to the built environment.

Bicycle Lanes: An on-street designated preferential space for bicyclists through the use of pavement markings and signs.

Bike Paths / Bikeways: A separated off-street designated path for bicyclists which may also be a shared use path with pedestrians, etc.

Appendix G (Continued)

Capital Improvement Program (CIP): The CIP for the Transportation Department includes an annual capital budget and a five-year plan for funding the new construction and reconstruction projects on the county's transportation system.

Detectable Warning: A surface feature of truncated domes, built in or applied to the walking surface to indicate an upcoming change from pedestrian to vehicular way.

DOJ: See United States Department of Justice

Federal Highway Administration (FHWA): A branch of the US Department of Transportation that administers the federal-aid Highway Program, providing financial assistance to states to construct and improve highways, urban and rural roads, and bridges

FHWA: See Federal Highway Administration

Pedestrian Access Route (PAR): A continuous and unobstructed walkway within a pedestrian circulation path that provides accessibility.

Pedestrian Circulation Route (PCR): A prepared exterior or interior way of passage provided for pedestrian travel.

PROWAG: An acronym for the *Guidelines for Accessible Public Rights-of-Way* issued in 2005 by the U. S. Access Board. This guidance addresses roadway design practices, slope, and terrain related to pedestrian access to walkways and streets, including crosswalks, curb ramps, street furnishings, pedestrian signals, parking, and other components of public rights-of-way.

Right of Way: A general term denoting land, property, or interest therein, usually in a strip, acquired for the network of streets, sidewalks, and trails creating public pedestrian access within a public entity's jurisdictional limits.

Section 504: The section of the Rehabilitation Act that prohibits discrimination by any program or activity conducted by the federal government.

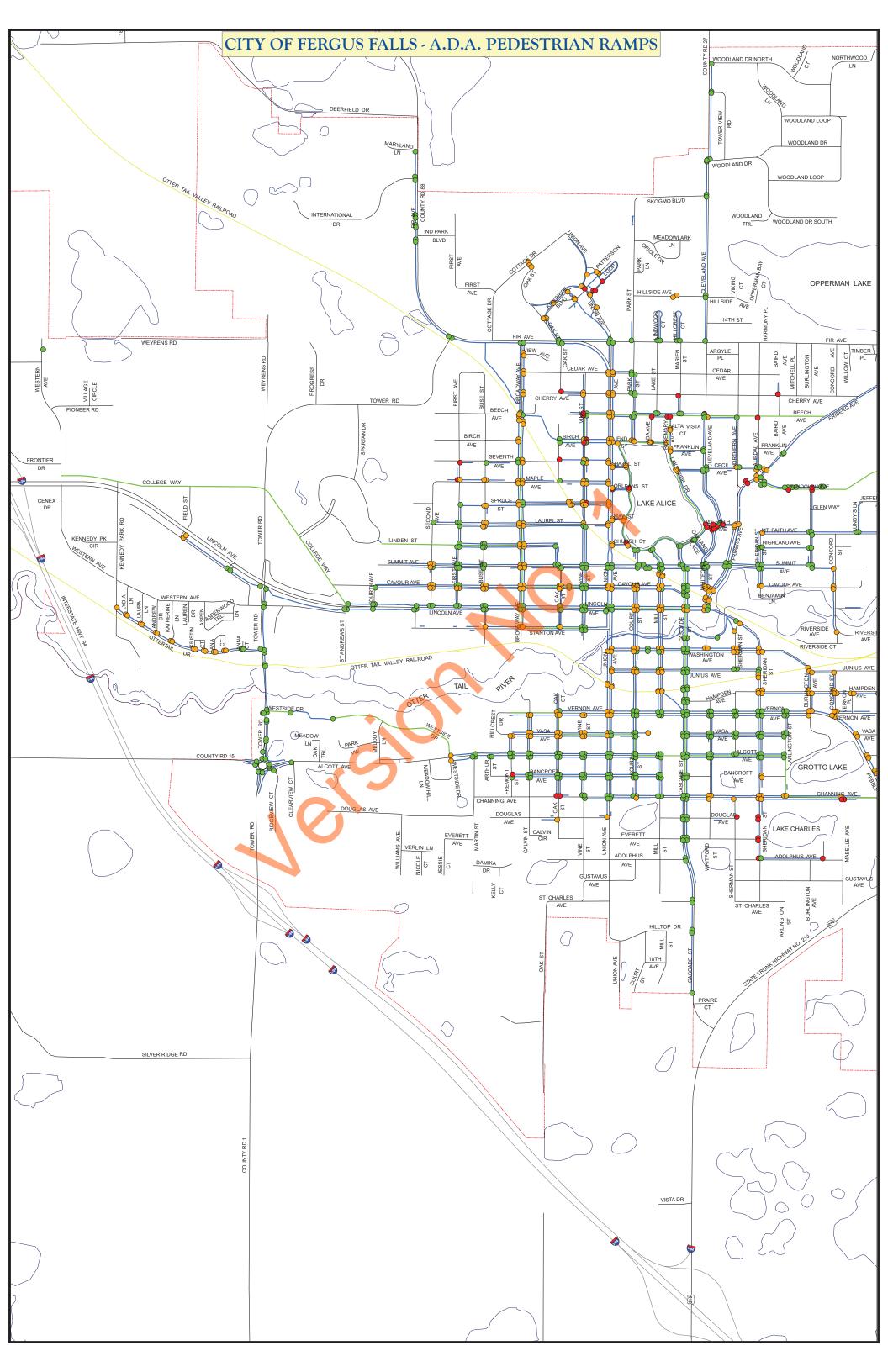
Uniform Accessibility Standards (UFAS): Accessibility standards that all federal agencies are required to meet; includes scoping and technical specifications.

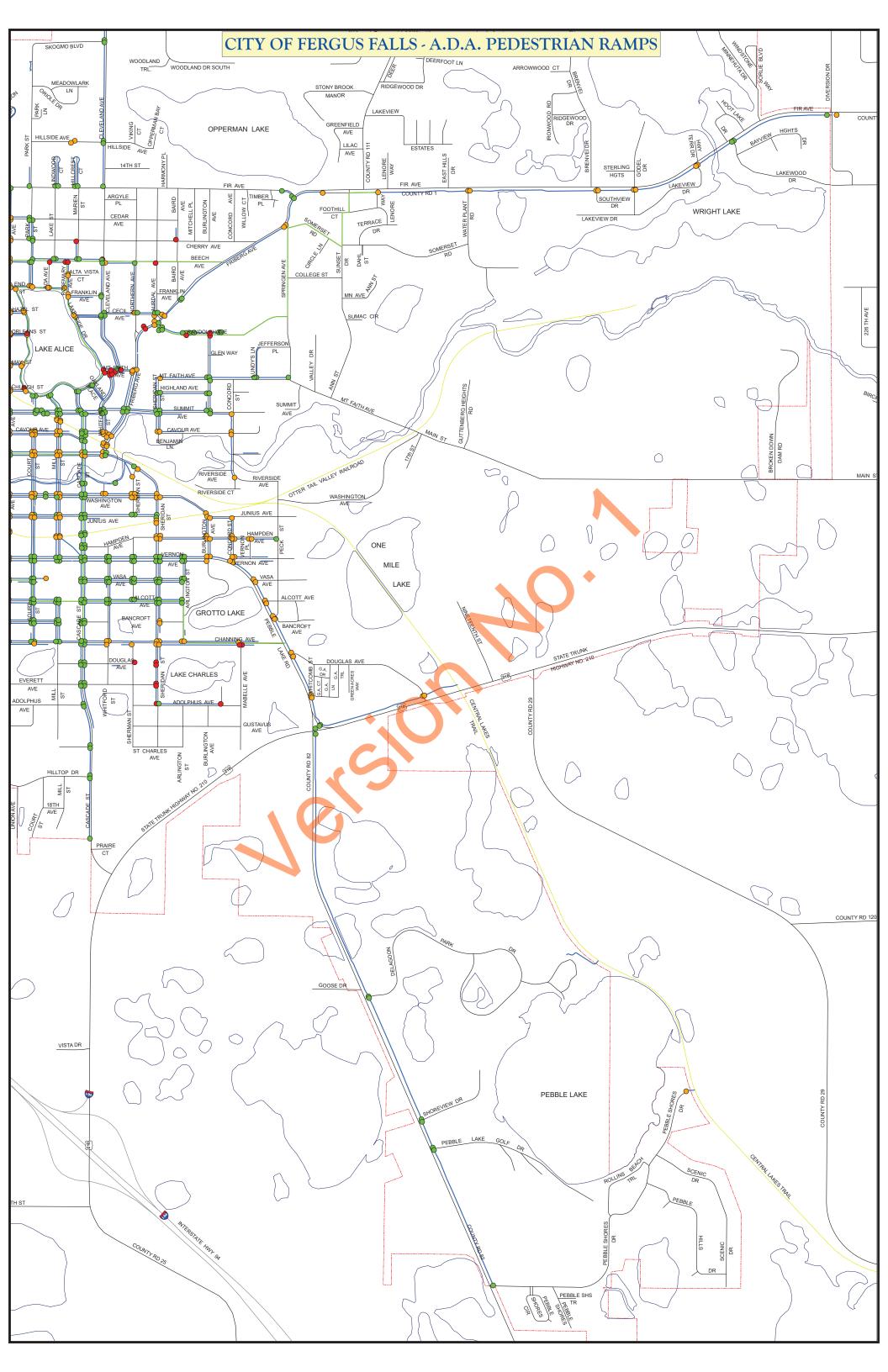
United States Access Board: An independent federal agency that develops and maintains design criteria for buildings and other improvements, transit vehicles, telecommunications equipment, and electronic and information technology. It also enforces accessibility standards that cover federally funded facilities.

United States Department of Justice (DOJ): The United States Department of Justice (often referred to as the Justice Department or DOJ), is the United States federal executive department responsible for the enforcement of the law and administration of justice.

City Council Minutes November 15, 2021

The Fergus Falls City Council held a regular meeting on November 15, 2021 at 5:30 pm in the City Council Chambers. Pastor Dave Foss of Bethel Lutheran Church gave the invocation and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Mayor Schierer called the meeting to order at 5:31 pm. Council members in attendance were Hagberg, Kvamme, Rufer, Thompson, Arneson, Gustafson and Hicks. Fish was absent.

Approval of Agenda

A motion and second were offered by Gustafson and Thompson to approve tonight's agenda with a revision to H-5 (Campus View Addition project) and Hick's request to remove item six from the consent agenda and the motion carried.

Retirement: Dave Christianson

Hicks offered Resolution #241-2021 acknowledging the retirement of Dave Christianson and recognizing his 38 years of service to the City of Fergus Falls, which was seconded by Arneson and was adopted.

Retirement: Pat Kava

Gustafson offered Resolution #242-2021 acknowledging the retirement of Pat Kava and recognizing his 7 years of service to the City of Fergus Falls, which was seconded by Hagberg and was adopted.

Library Foundation Update

Jennifer Smestad announced the Library Foundation made its final payment and fulfilled their \$3 million commitment to the city for the Library Renewal Project. She spoke about the public-private partnership efforts to bring this project to fruition thanked the donors, board members, council, and staff for their contributions to make this such a successful project. She commented on the usage of the library and its value to so many within the community, region and for visitors alike. Smestad felt this process can inspire other efforts within the community to work together and continue building a strong community. The foundation is working through a strategic planning process to continue supporting the library.

Consent Agenda

The following items were approved under Resolution #243-2021 by Rufer: Motion approving the open and closed minutes from the November 1, 2021 City Council meeting and the November 10, 2021 Committee of the Whole meeting. Motion approving the following licenses: Full Liquor (2022) Zens Steak and Seafood, Fiesta Brava; Tobacco (2022) Fleet Farm (store and convenience store), Walmart Inc., Joanne New Age. <u>3.2% Off Sale Malt Liquor Walmart Inc.</u>; Paving/Sidewalk (2021) Relay Construction LLC; Ellingson Trenchless LLC; <u>Mechanical (2021)</u> Mid States Infloor Heating LLC; <u>Fireworks Display Permit</u> Over the River Festival, December 4 in Wright Park at dusk; <u>Brewer License</u>, Taproom and Growler (2022) Fergus Brewing Company. Resolution #244-2021 setting the ADA Transition Plan public hearing date for December 6, 2021 and appointing the Senior Engineering Tech and Sidewalk Program Coordinator as the ADA Coordinator for Public Rights of Way. Resolution #245-2021 certifying delinquent special assessments. Resolution #246-2021 certifying delinquent miscellaneous invoices. The resolution was seconded by Thompson and was adopted.

Hicks commented on the delinquency of the WestRidge Mall's utility payments. He said they have been making demands of the city and should reciprocate by staying current on their bills. His opinion is the city needs to take a hard stance on turning off their water if they continue not paying their bill. Hicks offered Resolution #247-2021 certifying delinquent utility accounts, which was seconded by Hagberg and was adopted.

Ordinance 20

Ordinance 20, Eighth Series, Amending the zoning map from R-1 to R-A for Timber Ridge Estates was introduced by Gustafson and declared to have its first reading.

Ordinance 19

Ordinance 19, Eighth Series, Vacation of Campus Addition and Outlot B was adopted by a roll call vote.

PI 9508 RTC Phase 3

The council was asked to initiate PI 9508, the RTC Phase 3, the mothball and preservation options. Upon approval, staff would work with Stantec to refine the scope of work and cost estimates prior to begin preparing bid documents. City Engineer Brian Yavarow said the cost estimates for the main tower building as well as the east and west detached buildings would be presented as a base bid plus alternates so the council can decide what the most pressing needs are within the allotted budget. There is \$1,714,895.75 remaining from the Phase II state grant and Hicks asked if the city could return the money to the state rather than spending it. He said the city has shown willingness to preserve the tower, but the vision for the remaining buildings is still unknown. He felt if the city were to give the money back to the state, it would be looked upon favorably when the city would ask for additional funding once a concrete plan has been established. Kvamme disagreed with the comments there is not a plan for the campus stating a master plan has been developed over the past two years. He said the only thing making them unsafe is the mold issues. He advocated the council use the funding to clean, protect and keep the water out of the structure. Hicks offered Resolution #248-2021 initiating PI 9508, the RTC Phase 3 Preservation Project, which was seconded by Hagberg and was adopted.

Property Tax Rebate Program

Otter Tail County recently extended their property tax rebate program. Applicants can now receive a \$10,000 rebate from the county's portion of property taxes and the program deadline was extended until December 31, 2024. Amy Baldwin from the county explained the reasoning behind the extension. Over the course of the pandemic, many people's plans changed due to economic factors, supply chain issues and rising material costs. Home values have gone up extensively and that will affect assessed home values. The county decided to extend the rebate to \$10,000 and retroactively over this higher level to those who have already applied to the program. Applicants have one year to build their home after being accepted into the program. Extending the program an additional year would provide more time to mitigate some of the factors holding people back from building. 150 applications have been approved to date with the majority coming from township areas. The program is also trying to provide needed to increase the housing inventory and attract workers to our county. Hicks said he would be voting in opposition as there have been numerous properties receiving TIF or tax abatement lately and the city needs to start collecting taxes. Rufer expressed his support for the program provides benefits such as building supply sales and solving housing needs within our communities. Hagberg offered Resolution #249-2021, extending the city's property tax rebate

program through 2024, which was seconded by Rufer and was adopted with Hicks voting in opposition.

Campus View Public Hearing

Arneson offered Resolution #250-2021 setting a preliminary project hearing for Campus View Addition for December 20, 2021 at 5:30 pm in the City Council Chambers, which was seconded by Hagberg and was adopted.

Resolution of Accounts

Hagberg offered a resolution authorizing the payments and claims in the amount of \$5,092,904.09, which was seconded by Kvamme and was adopted. Finance Director Bill Sonmor explained the larger amounts were due to annual bond payments and the city's reinvestment of funds within the investment portfolio.

Boards and Commissions

Staff have been working on a revitalization of city boards and commissions in an effort to clarify roles, improve communication and increase efficiencies for board and staff members. Some of the proposed changes include absorbing the duties of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee into the Parks and Recreation Board and renaming this the Board of Parks, Trails and Recreation, lowering the number of board members in many cases from 5 members to 3 members and designating the Airport Advisory Board, Human Rights Commission, Public Safety Advisory Board, Public Arts Commission and Sister City Commission as ad hoc commissions who meet based on work needs. The Natural Resources Advisory Commission was proposed to be codified as an official committee under the City Code. Hicks had questions about membership, vacancies and uniformity amongst the language. There was a discussion on the fundraising/grant writing opportunities for boards to participate in and the need for all boards to follow the rules set forth in the Open Meeting Law. The council was in consensus that members do not need to be residents of the city to participate on the boards or commissions. A motion and second were made by Hicks and Gustafson directing the City Attorney to draft revisions to City Code Chapter 32: City Organizations and the motion carried. The proposed changes will be reviewed at an upcoming Committee of the Whole meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 6:15 pm.

Committee of the Whole Meeting December 1, 2021

The Fergus Falls City Council met as a Committee of the Whole on December 1, 2021 at 7:00 am in the City Council Chambers. Rufer, serving as the Acting Mayor, called the meeting to order. Council members in attendance were Hagberg, Kvamme, Rufer, Thompson, Arneson, Gustafson, Hicks and Fish.

Visit Fergus Falls Contract

The purpose of Visit Fergus Falls is promoting Fergus Falls as a tourism destination and strengthening the hospitality sector of the community. The city has a Local Convention and Tourism Agreement with Visit Fergus Falls. It has been a number of years since the contract was reviewed. Their board has proposed and approved an updated agreement that complies with lodging tax state statutes and City Code. This would be a three year contract with an automatic renewal unless a 60 day termination notice is provided. Visit Fergus Falls gets 97% of the lodging tax charged on hotel visits to enhance their tourism endeavors and the city gets the remaining 3% for administering fiscal host services. The city's only obligation in the contract is to serve as the fiscal host and a council member is appointed to serve on their board. Their bylaws require board members to be comprised from the hotel, restaurant, community attractions industries as well as an at large position. A motion and second were made by Fish and Hagberg to recommend the council approve the Local Convention and Tourism Agreement with Visit Fergus Falls and authorize the Mayor and City Administrator to execute the agreement and the motion carried.

Campus View Estates

The Preliminary Engineering Feasibility Report for PI 5958, the Campus View Estates Development is complete. The city's proposed work would consist of 36 foot streets with a sidewalk, curb and gutter, sanitary sewer main with services, watermain with services and storm sewer improvements to serve the benefitting properties. The total preliminary project cost is \$1,795,645 and the primary funding source is General Obligation Tax Abatement Bonds. Special assessments would also be levied against the benefitting properties as per city policy and Minnesota Statute Chapter 429 requirements. The collection of Tax Increment Funding would replace the special assessments to fund the bonds. A preliminary project hearing has been scheduled on December 20. The City Engineer reviewed the project scope, area and tentative construction date of spring 2022. He recommended the council accept the report as this project will benefit the necessary development of housing. Council members asked if a sidewalk on Park Street from Fir Avenue to the Minnesota Veterans Home as well as sidewalks on both sides of the streets through the development. A motion and second were made by Hicks and Thompson to recommend the council accept the Preliminary Engineering Feasibility Report for PI 5958 and the motion carried.

Airport Maintenance and Operations Grant

In addition to the state and federal grant programs for the airport capital improvement projects, the State of Minnesota is providing funding to supplement annual airport operations through an Airport Maintenance and Operation Grant contract. The state is offering 75% reimbursement in 2022 and 2023 for eligible items not to exceed \$71,453 each fiscal year. Expenses eligible for this reimbursement include city employee wages, heating, electricity, parts, supplies and pavement repairs. The state requires recipients to adhere to operational safety standards to maintain the airport in a safe and serviceable manner for aeronautical purposes only for the use and benefit of the public. A motion and

second were made by Hicks and Gustafson to recommend the council accept the State of Minnesota Airport Maintenance and Operation Grant offer for state fiscal years 2022 and 2023 and the motion carried.

NP Park Playground Improvements

The city has been working with local organizers to create an inclusive playground at NP Park that meets ADA standards. He shared the proposed project footprint and explained the park will be raised three feet to safely transition to the current sidewalk system. He reviewed the necessary modifications to the storm water basins and drainage system. Quotes were solicited for the granular import and placement of the playground equipment. The low quote was received from Barry Construction Inc. (BCI) in the amount of \$33,348.28. Quotes were also taken for the storm sewer improvements. Barry Construction Inc. submitted the low quote for this work in the amount of \$14,569.62. The funding is expected to come from the private fundraising efforts. A motion and second were made by Fish and Kvamme to recommend the council award the quotes for granular import and storm sewer improvements at NP Park and the motion carried.

Grant for Rural Child Care

Community Development Director Klara Beck asked the council for authorization to submit a grant to the Rural Child Care Innovation Program. This is a facilitated community engagement process to address the challenges of child care in rural communities and develop practical solutions for the participating communities. The city will be working in conjunction with Otter Tail County, West Central Initiative, and other entities working on child care issues. Possible outcomes of the project are the startup of new child care services or programs, mentorships, a POD model, community and business partnerships and awareness. Applications to participate in the project are due January 7 and there is no charge to partake in the process. It is estimated the process will take 18-24 months and the end goal is having the creation of a feasible community specific action plan. The community specific goals and action plans developed by the steering committee will be shared with the council as they develop. A motion and second were made by Gustafson and Thompson to recommend the council authorize the city and their partners to submit an application to participate in the First Children's Finance Rural Child Care Innovation Program and the motion carried.

Glacial Edge Trail

In 2017, the city adopted the Glacial Edge Trail Master Plan for a 14 mile trail mostly located within the city limits. Nick Leonard, representing Otter Tail County said the Greater Minnesota Regional Parks and Trails Commission (GMRPTC) designated a trail of regional significance in 2019. A five segment trail running East to West, known as the Pelican to Perham trail has secured funding for four of the five segments. The county is working on legislative bonding to secure the last segment which runs through Maplewood State Park. The next priority would be the establishment of this trail running from Fergus Falls to Maplewood State Park. The GMRPTC has suggested the county and city work together on this project so each trail is deemed regionally significant. An amendment to the Glacial Edge Trail Master Plan would be easier and more cost effective than initiating a new master plan. The amendment would require the county and city enter into a cooperative agreement to states funding, construction and maintenance are the responsibility of the jurisdictions. Trail segments within the city and adjacent townships are the responsibility of the city while the county would be responsible for all other trail segments. The county has already agreed to the amendment. A motion and second were made by Arneson and Hagberg to recommend the council accept the amendment to the Glacial

Edge Trail Master Plan and enter into a cooperative agreement with Otter Tail County for the Glacial Edge Trail and the motion carried.

New Business, Lincoln Avenue Street Project

Next year the city is planning a \$1.2 million project to improve the street condition and ADA compliance on Union Avenue from Fir to Lincoln Avenue and Lincoln from Union to Friberg as a federal and state funded transportation improvement project. There has been interest expressed in adding bike lanes to this project. It is not feasible to add bike lanes on the Union Avenue portion of the project without removing residential parking on one side of the street. Space is also limited in the Lincoln Avenue portion of the project, but the city has been looking at two options for driving and biking lanes. Alternate A would consist of a 10.5 foot driving lanes, 5 foot bike lanes and 10.5 foot turn lanes. Approximately 45 feet of curb and gutter would need to be removed at the intersections to accomplish this plan and no parking would be disrupted. Alternate B would have a shared 14 foot drive/bike lane as well as 10.5 foot turn lanes at the intersections. Both options would transition to a 7.5 foot parking lane, 5 foot bike path and 11 foot driving lanes along the corridor. Bike lanes are not required in the reconfiguration of the street, but they would replace the existing sharrows. A motion and second were made by Fish and Gustafson recommend the city proceed with Alternate A in the plans for PI 5314, the Union and Lincoln Avenue street improvement project and the motion carried with Kvamme voting in opposition.

Letter of Intent from OSPTI

OSPTI has submitted a letter of intent for the property behind the west liquor store. The council adjourned to a closed meeting at 7:43 am as allowed by MN Statute Section 13D.05, subd. 3(c). The discussion was tables at 8:06 am until the December 6 council meeting and the council did not adjourn back into an open meeting.

Subject: 2022 Insurance Renewal

<u>Recommendation</u>: The City of Fergus Falls waive the monetary limits on municipal tort liability established by Minnesota Statutes, Section 466.04

Background/Key Points: The City of Fergus Falls is insured through the League of Minnesota Cities Insurance Trust (LMCIT). The current statutes limit a city's tort liability to a maximum of \$500,000 per claimant and \$1,500,000 per occurrence. The LMCIT provides the City the option to waive the monetary statutory tort limits. The waiver provides coverage to a maximum of \$2,000,000 per claimant and \$2,000,000 per occurrence.

In prior years, the City of Fergus Falls has waived the statutory limits to provide expanded coverage for the residents.

I have reviewed this waiver with the City Attorney in the past and he recommends we continue to waive the statutory tort limits to provide this additional protection.

<u>Budgetary Impact</u>: Because the waiver increases the City's municipal liability and auto liability exposure, the premium is about 3.5% higher for coverage under the waiver option or about \$6,800 based on the 2021 municipal and automobile liability premiums.

PLANNING COMMISSION MINUTES November 22, 2021

The Fergus Falls Planning Commission held a regular meeting on November 22, 2021 in the Council Chambers of City Hall. The meeting was opened at 5:30 PM. Agenda was approved. Members present were: ($\sqrt{}$ indicates those present in the Council Chambers).

City staff in attendance included Karin Flom, City Planner, Klara Beck, Community Development Manager, and Jill Hanson who took minutes for the meeting. Also in attendance were Austin Hennen and Duane Stigen. Chris Heyer (Moore Engineering), joined by telephone.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the October 25, 2021 meeting were reviewed and Chair Stanislawski entertained a motion to approve the minutes. It was so moved by Commissioner Kilde and seconded by Commissioner Rachels. Passed unanimously.

<u>PUBLIC HEARING TO CONSIDER A REQUEST FOR A CONDINATIONAL USE PERMIT (CUP)</u> <u>TO ALLOW FOR A USED CAR LOT IN A B-2 ZONE LOCATED AT 128 SOUTH TOWER ROAD.</u> <u>REQUESTED BY AUSTIN HENNEN</u>

Chair Stanislawski asked City staff to explain the request. Karin Flom stated that the applicant, Austin Hennen, currently has a purchase agreement on approximately a half acre of vacant land located at 128 South Tower Road. Karin stated the applicant is proposing to construct and operate a used car lot. Karin explained the property is zoned B-2 (Service Business District) and a used car lot is a conditional use in the B-2 zone, noting there are conditions outlined in City Code.

Karin stated that the property is adjacent to B-2 on the west, north, and east, and B-1, Limited Business District to the south. To the west is multi-business space ("Pine Plaza") which includes RV sales. To the east across South Tower Road is a storm water retention area owned by the City of Fergus Falls. To the north across West Lincoln Avenue is the former Hedahl's building, which recently was purchased. It will be renovated into a dental clinic. To the south (the B-1 property) is a multifamily apartment building.

Karin explained that the applicant's site concept has the display lot and 20' by 44' office building located approximately 20 feet from the shared property line with the multifamily building. The display lot area would wrap around the west, north, and east sides of the property along the frontage road, West Lincoln Avenue, and South Tower Road. Karin stated that a more detailed site plan would be required when applying for a building permit. At that time, slight adjustments to the parking and display areas will need to be made to setbacks and customer parking. Should the Planning Commission attach any other conditions to the conditional use permit, a building permit review would also ensure those are being met.

Karin mentioned that the notice for the public hearing was published in the Daily Journal on November 10, 2021. A copy of this public notice was mailed to property owners within 350 feet on November 10, 2021. Staff has received no inquiries or public comments. Copies of the application materials were sent to the City of Fergus Falls Engineering Department, Building Official, and Fire Department. No staff comments were received.

Karin stated that the seven proposed findings listed in the staff report were created with the idea of approval of the CUP request with the conditions listed. Staff recommend approval of the Conditional Use Permit with the following conditions. The City's zoning code requires a used car lot to operate under conditions 2, 3, and 4 below in the B-2 zone.

- 1. Must abide by all building code and any applicable license requirements pertaining to the construction and operation of a used car lot.
- 2. The outside display and storage area shall be surfaced with a dust-free material, and the arrangement of entrances, exits and parking stalls shall be subject to the approval of the City Engineer. Off-street parking and loading areas shall be surfaced as required by §§ 154.190 through 154.204 of this chapter.
- 3. The lighting, whether direct or reflected, such as from floodlights or spotlights, and as differentiated from general illumination, shall not be directed into any adjacent property.
- 4. All automobiles not in saleable or running condition or automobile parts must be stored inside a building or within an area screened by an opaque fencing.

If the commission does not agree with any of the findings, then the commission should look at are there conditions to help to create a positive finding or look at a denial finding and create a set of findings to support denial. Commissioner Kilde had some concerns about opaque fencing mentioned in Condition #4 because of the location of the lot.

Public Hearing to consider a request for a CUP to allow for Used Car Lot in a B-2 Zone at 128 South Tower Road was opened to the public at 5:35 PM Chair Stanislawski asked if anyone also wished to speak on this request

Chair Stanislawski asked if anyone else wished to speak on this request.

Seeing no one, Chair Stanislawski closed the Public Hearing at **5:36** PM, and bought the meeting back to the Planning Commission for discussion. Commissioner Kilde felt that there should not be any opaque fencing on the sides of the lot running parallel with Tower Road and Lincoln Avenue and suggested modification of Condition #4 to prohibit opaque fencing along lot lines parallel with Tower Road and Lincoln Avenue.

4. All automobiles not in saleable or running condition or automobile parts must be stored inside a building or within an area screened by an opaque fencing. Opaque fencing may not be located on the sides of the lot which are parallel to South Tower Road or Lincoln Avenue.

Commissioner Rachels made a motion to recommend to approve the Conditional Use Permit request by Austin Hennen to allow for a used car lot at 128 South Tower Road with the proposed findings and conditions discussed. It was seconded by Commissioner Kilde. Passed unanimously.

PRELIMINARY AND FINAL PLAT TO CREATE A SEVEN LOT SUBDIVISION "PEBBLE HILLS ESTATES SECOND ADDITION," REQUESTED BY PEBBLE HILLS CORPORATION

Chair Stanislawski asked City staff to explain the request. Karin Flom stated an application has been submitted to the City of Fergus Falls by Pebble Hills Corporation (engineer/survey by Moore Engineering) for a one block, seven-lot subdivision Second Addition to Pebble Hills Estates. The current zoning of all lots in the plat area is R-1, One-Family Residence District.

Karin explained that the Second Addition to Pebble Hills Estates is another phase of development in this area. The area was annexed to the City in 1996 and the first subdivision was platted in 1996. The parcel being subdivided consists of the 4.98 in the plat area and 15.97 acres on the east side of Scenic Drive. These 15.97 acres are not being subdivided at this time.

Karin explained the zoning and land use of the area. The plat area is zoned R-1, One-Family Residence District. With the exception of the unplatted 15.97 acres (which is zoned R-A), surrounding properties are also zoned R-1. The area has developed with single-family dwellings. Other lots are undeveloped but owned by adjacent property owners as back lots.

Karin showed images from the proposed plat and stated all lots meet R-1 dimensional standards. Karin explained that at the back of these lots is a dedicated walkway that will connect to a platted walkway from other subdivisions in the area.

Karin mentioned that notices for the public hearing was published in the Daily Journal on November 10, 2021. A copy of this public notice was mailed to property owners within 350 feet on November 10, 2021. Staff have received no inquiries or comments from the public to date. Karin stated that comments on the preliminary plat were sought from staff in the Engineering Department, Building Official, and Fire Department. The notice was also sent to the DNR area hydrologist. The Engineering Department noted there would be deferred assessments to these parcels due to previous sanitary sewer and water main expansion work. The Engineering Department also noted there is no adjacent water main to the lots within the plat area.

Karin stated that the five proposed findings in the staff report were created with the idea of approval of the preliminary and final plat. Staff recommend approval of the preliminary and final plat with the following recommended condition:

1. Prior to recording the plat, the applicant shall enter into a developer's agreement, which will address things such as, but not limited to, installation of required utilities and infrastructure.

Karin stated that if the Planning Commission does not agree with any of the findings, then the Planning Commission should look at if are the conditions to help to create a positive finding, or look at a denial finding and create a set of findings to support denial.

Chair Stanislawski asked if the applicant would like to address the Commission. Chris Heyer, Moore Engineering, mentioned that Craig Vaughn, a partner in Pebble Hills Corporation, is agreeable to entering into a developer's agreement. There was some discussion about the deferred assessments and how the assessments would be allocated to the seven lots in the subdivision when the property was developed.

Public Hearing to Consider a Request for a Preliminary and Final Plat to Create a Seven Lot Subdivision "Pebble Hills Estates Second Addition". Requested By Pebble Hills Corporation was open to the Public at 5:46 PM

Chair Stanislawski asked if anyone else wished to speak on this request.

Duane Stigen, 25620 Aurdal River Road, explained how he purchased a lot in the adjacent subdivision. He had some questions about the impact of the developer's agreement and installation of utilities in the proposed subdivision on his lot's special assessments. Chris Heyer, representative of the applicant, clarified for Mr. Stigen that a developer's agreement means the utilities are paid for and installed by the developer and not the City.

Chair Stanislawski closed the Public Hearing to the Public at **5:52 PM**, and bought the meeting back to the Planning Commission for discussion.

Commissioner Kilde made a motion to approve the preliminary & final plat to create a seven lot subdivision "Pebble Hills Estates Second Addition" with the proposed findings as presented and the recommended condition. It was seconded by Commissioner Rachels. Passed unanimously.

CITY COUNCIL UPDATE ON ORDINANCE AMENDMENT – Use Tables, Accessory Buildings & Fences

Karin stated that the City Council had the second reading of the zoning code ordinance changes on November 1 and they approved the Planning Commission's recommendations with a few changes. They removed the two-foot setback requirement for fences and clarified language about fence opacity in front yards. Karin mentioned the ordinance changes went into effect today (November 22, 2021).

DECEMBER 2021 APPLICATIONS

Karin mentioned that there may be a need for a December 27, 2021 Planning Commission meeting.

Commissioner Kilde asked if there were any updates on the joint subcommittee created to study zoning ordinance change for group living situations. Karin replied there were no updates at this time.

The next regular meeting will be on December 27, 2021 at 5:30 PM.

- 4. All automobiles not in saleable or running condition or automobile parts must be stored inside a building or within an area screened by an opaque fencing. Opaque fencing may not be located on the sides of the lot which are parallel to South Tower Road or Lincoln Avenue.

Background/Key Points: Pebble Hills Corporation is requesting a combined preliminary and final plat approval of "Second Addition to Pebble Hills Estates" a seven lot, one block subdivision of part of Parcel ID 71001500091000. The total plat area for Second Addition to Pebble Hills Estates is 4.98 acres.

The plat area is zoned R-1, One-Family Residence District. Surrounding properties are zoned R-1. The portion of this parcel to remain unplatted is zoned R-A. The area has developed with single family dwellings.

The newly created lots will have deferred assessments due to previous construction of sanitary sewer and water main expansion in the area. The lots are not currently served by City water, but sanitary sewer is available.

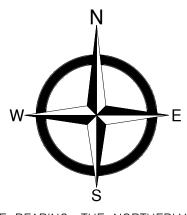

The State of Minnesota redistributed the remaining funds amongst eligible local governments who had requested ARPA funds.

Recommendation:

Resolution approving a Local Convention and Tourism Agreement with Visit Fergus Falls and authorizing the Mayor and City Administrator to execute the agreement

Background/Key Points:

The Fergus Falls Convention and Visitor's Bureau (Visit Fergus Falls) has been providing tourism services to the City of Fergus Falls for many years. The last time an agreement was entered into between the City and the CVB was back in 2003 (18 years ago). That particular agreement allowed for automatic annual renewal, but it was supposed to be reviewed annually. It has been several years since the agreement was reviewed and much of the language is out of date.

The City was approached by Visit Fergus Falls to look at putting a new contract in place, which is simplified and updated. This proposed agreement will be for three years and then will renew annually unless terminated. A 60 day termination notice is required to end the contract.

A redline version is included in the packet and will show how many things were able to be eliminated or updated. First of all, lodging tax is a major component of the agreement. The City remits 97% of collected lodging tax to Visit Fergus Falls to carry out its duties and retains 3% to cover the cost of fiscal hosting services. City Code Chapter 9 covers the pertinent information as it relates to lodging tax, making much of the previous language cumbersome. Further, we wanted to allow the Visit Fergus Falls board additional latitude to be responsive to market conditions in the tourism industry. The language in the proposed agreement certainly honors the purpose of the lodging tax, but gives the board the ability to set goals and carry out objectives. Per the Visit FF bylaws, there is a Mayoral appointment on the board at all times. Currently, there are two City Councilmembers serving on the board. Finally, as mentioned, the City serves as the fiscal host, making much of the language pertaining to budgets, audits, accounts payable, etc. unnecessary, as that is all included within the scope of the City's role.

Besides simplifying and shortening the contract, there won't be any changes in how Visit FF operates or the relationship between the City and Visit FF. Visit FF is still tasked with promoting the City as a tourism destination and working to enhance and strengthen our hospitality sector. The only obligation of the City in this agreement is to serve as fiscal host, which we have been doing.

This agreement was approved by the Visit Fergus Falls Board at their November 15, 2021 meeting.

LOCAL CONVENTION AND TOURISM AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into to be effective as of November __, 2021, by and between the **CITY OF FERGUS FALLS, MINNESOTA,** a municipal corporation organized under the laws of the State of Minnesota, hereinafter referred to as "City", and the **FERGUS FALLS CONVENTION AND VISITOR'S BUREAU, INC.,** a nonprofit corporation organized under the laws of the State of Minnesota, doing business as VISIT FERGUS FALLS, hereinafter referred to as "VFF".

RECITALS

A. Pursuant to City Code § 36.02, the City has imposed a local tax on lodging to fund a convention and visitors bureau and,

B. Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes § 469.190 Subd. 3 and City Code § 36.14, ninety-five percent of the gross proceeds from any local lodging tax imposed shall be dedicated to fund a local convention or tourism bureau for the purpose of marketing and promoting the City as a tourist or convention center, and

C. The hospitality industry forms a major component of the City's business and tax base, and

D. A healthy and vital hospitality industry is important to the overall wellbeing of the City, its residents, and businesses; and

E. The City deems it in the public interest to support the hospitality industry by promoting the City as a tourist, conference, and visitor destination;

WHEREAS, VFF is a local tourism or convention bureau organized for the purpose of marketing and promoting the CITY as a tourist or convention center.

WHEREAS It is in the best interests of the City to designate VFF as the local convention and visitors bureau to manage and administer the marketing and promoting of tourism in the City as a part of the City's overall economic development program.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

1. *TERM*.

1.1 The term of this agreement shall be for three years from the date of commencement. This agreement will renew thereafter on an annual basis for a calendar year in accordance with the provisions of this agreement, until terminated.

1.2 The parties may terminate this agreement only as follows:

A. By either party, with or without cause, upon sixty (60) days written notice of election to terminate; or,

B. If the local lodging tax is eliminated, -the City may terminate this agreement immediately by delivering written notice of termination to VFF. For purposes under this section, termination shall be effective upon delivery of the notice.

1.3 Upon termination, all funds allocated or held by VFF, which remain in accounts for the purpose of funding VFF operations shall be remitted to the City, less such amounts as are necessary to cover obligations and expenses incurred by VFF prior to receiving notice of termination to carry out obligations of this agreement in accordance with the budget approved by the City.

2. SERVICES RENDERED BY VFF.

2.1 VFF will provide sales and marketing services to attain the maximum benefit of the hospitality industry, primarily lodging and maximum usage of the City's hospitality industries.

2.2 VFF shall furnish the following services:

A. Perform and provide services necessary to promote the City as a travel destination for leisure and group business.

B. Plan, coordinate and conduct programs that attract visitors to the City.

C. Participate in the enhancement of community amenities that directly impact tourism.

D. Other services from time to time as requested by the City and approved by the board.

2.3 VFF shall not undertake any activity that conflicts with or reasonably appears to conflict with its rendering of service to the City under this agreement.

2.4 As representatives for the City, VFF staff and board members shall abide by the established government ethics relating to volunteers as set forth in City Code Chapter 33.

3. COLLECTION AND DISTRIBUTION OF THE LODGING TAX.

3.1 The City shall remit to VFF, for funding of VFF, ninety-seven percent (97%) of the local lodging tax payment received by the City, less refunds, in the preceding month during the term of this Agreement.

4. *FISCAL*.

4.1 The City shall be VFF's fiscal host.

5. HOLD HARMLESS INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE

5.1 Any and all employees of VFF, or other persons while engaged in the performance of any service required by VFF under this Agreement, shall not be considered employees of the City, and any and all claims that may or might arise under the Workers' Compensation Act of the State of Minnesota on behalf of said employees or other persons while so engaged, and any and all claims made by a third party as a consequence of any act or omission on the part of VFF, its agents, or employees or other persons while so engaged in any of the services provided to be rendered herein, shall in no way be the obligation or responsibility of the City. In connection therewith, the VFF hereby agrees to indemnify, save and hold harmless, and defend the City and all of its officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims, demands, actions, or causes of action, of whatsoever nature or character arising out of or by reason of the execution of the performance of the services provided for in this Agreement.

5.2 VFF shall carry insurance to cover its employees and agents while performing services pursuant to this Agreement. Such insurance coverage shall include

comprehensive general liability and property damage to VFF and its employees and agents in such amounts as will equal the applicable limits of liability to which the City may be held pursuant to Minnesota Statute § 466.04 as the same may be amended from time to time VFF shall also carry worker's compensation as required by Minnesota Statues § 176.181, Subdivision 2, and provide the City with proof of compliance with Minnesota Statutes § 176.182, as the same may be amended from time to time.

6. STRUCTURE OF ORGANIZATION.

6.1 VFF shall maintain its non-profit tax status in compliance with state and federal law.

6.2 VFF shall consult with the City before adopting any modifications to the existing composition of the Board of Directors of VFF as presently set forth in its by-laws.

6.3 No employee of VFF shall serve on the Board of Directors of VFF.

6.4 No member of the City Council or employee of City shall have any interest in any contract made by VFF in performing its services.

7. *CITY'S SERVICES.* City may provide VFF with meeting rooms and such other staff as agreed to by the City Administrator of City and the Executive Director of VFF. City shall provide fiscal host services in the form of accounting and investment management as requested.

8. **REPORTING PROCEDURES.** VFF shall keep and maintain adequate records of the services performed and expenses incurred in carrying out the program

which is the basis of this agreement. VFF shall provide City with progress reports as requested from time to time.

9. **DEFAULT.** The City shall have the right, at all reasonable times, to inspect the books and records for the purpose of determining performance of the obligations of VFF hereunder. If VFF fails to keep and perform any of the covenants or agreements contained in this indenture, this agreement shall become void as determined solely by the City.

10. *ASSIGNABILITY*. This agreement shall not be assigned to any other party without the written consent of all parties.

11. *LAWS.* VFF will comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws in the performance of its obligations in this Agreement.

5.5 The FFCVB shall not spend or otherwise obligate itself financially in excess of the revenues received.

5.6 No later than 180 days after the fiscal year end, the FFCVB shall submit to the City an audited financial report of the FFCVB for the fiscal year just ended, prepared by an independent certified public accountant.

5.7 The FFCVB shall obtain fidelity bonds in the amount of \$15,000.00 covering officers and employees of the FFCVB who handle or disburse monies or sign or countersign checks of the FFCVB.

The Preliminary Engineering Feasibility Report is complete for the above referenced project. In general from an engineering standpoint, this project is feasible, cost effective, and necessary. Please refer to the attached report for detailed information.

This public improvement project is proposed to be special assessed per City Policy and MN Statue Chapter 429 requirements. The work items funded by special assessments consists of street with a sidewalk, sanitary sewer main with services, watermain with services, and storm sewer improvements to serve the benefitting properties.

On November 15, 2021 this Council scheduled the **Preliminary Improvement Project Hearing for December 20, 2021 beginning at 5:30 P.M. in these Council Chambers.** A legal publication along with individual notices will be sent to all subject properties.

I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Interstate Engineering is pleased to submit this Preliminary Engineering Report to the City of Fergus Falls for review of proposed infrastructure to be constructed to provide the public with a road, city utilities, and sidewalks for the proposed Campus View Estates Development. This report investigates the feasibility of the proposed infrastructure, provides a project cost estimate, and recommends a method for financing and funding the project.

The existing site is a grass field with a section of trees in the Southern portion of the site. There are existing utilities, including watermain, sanitary sewer, and storm sewer accessible on Park Street.

The alternatives provided are the "Do Nothing" alternative and the additions of 8" water and sewer mains, utility services for each unit, a storm sewer system including a stormwater detention pond and inlet/outlet control structures, and a new street running through the site connecting North Union Avenue to Park Street. The infrastructure additions are a necessary and cost-effective method to provide access and city utilities to the Campus View Estates Development.

The total project cost is estimated at \$1,795,000. That includes a 25% contingency and a 20% allowance for engineering and administration. The project is proposed to be 100% funded through special assessments.

II. INTRODUCTION

A. Project Scope

The reason for this report is a request from the City of Fergus Falls to evaluate the feasibility of infrastructure additions necessary to serve the proposed Campus View Estates Development the location of which is shown in Figure 2.

The added infrastructure necessary for this site includes watermain and services, storm sewer, sanitary sewer main and services, and a new road connecting Park Street to North Union Avenue.

B. Project Data

For the purpose of preparing the Conceptual Design Report information was collected and utilized from the following available sources:

- City Maps and Records of the sewer and water mains surrounding the site.
- Plat of the subdivided property showing the new lot lines.
- Topographic survey.
- Aerial photography.
- Meetings with City of Fergus Falls staff.

III. EXISTING CONDITIONS

A. Utilities

The only utilities existing on the site are on Park Street. Park Street currently has an 6" watermain, an 8" sanitary sewer main and 18" and 30" storm sewers all of which are accessible to connect new utilities to serve the site.

B. Topography

The existing topography and an aerial photograph of the site along with the general surface flow directions of the existing topography are shown in Figure 3. The site is currently a grass field with a section of trees on the southern portion of the property. The site largely flows to the east to the storm sewer system on and along Park Street.

IV. <u>ALTERNATIVES</u>

The main focus of this Preliminary Engineering Report is to present a solution for providing road and utility infrastructure for the Campus View Estates Development. Described below is a list of alternates which can be considered by the City.

A. Do Nothing

Doing nothing is always an alternative and therefore, is mentioned here. Without installing additional infrastructure, the Campus View Estates Development would not have access or city utilities and therefor would not be a feasible project. The only locations that would be available for development would be the fourteen lots along Park Street.

B. Infrastructure Additions

1. Street

A new 36-foot-wide bituminous street is proposed to be built as shown in Figure 2. The street will have curb and gutter on both sides and sidewalk on one side. The street is needed to provide access to the lots that do not have frontage on Park Street.

2. Watermain

A new 8" PVC watermain would connect to the existing 6" watermain that is on the East side of Park Street. The new watermain will run along the new street and be capped at the Southwest corner of the site as there is no existing watermain on North Union Avenue. Three hydrants will need to be installed to meet Minnesota Fire Code spacing requirements.

The watermain work will also include providing services from the main to the edge of the Right of Way point for each lot.

3. Sanitary Sewer

Similar to watermain, sanitary sewer will connect to an existing 8" sanitary sewer main on Park Street. The proposed 8" sewer main will flow from the Southwest corner of the site to the Northeast corner along the new street where it connects to Park Street. Five manholes will also be required.

The sanitary sewer work will also include providing services from the main to the edge of the Right of Way point for each lot.

4. Storm Sewer

A stormwater pond will be constructed to control drainage and the site will be graded to flow to the pond or the new street. At least two inlet structures will be needed to collect the stormwater from the new street and a 12-18" storm sewer main will connect those inlets to the pond. An outlet control structure and 30" main line will be installed to connect the pond to the existing storm sewer running along Park Street.

V. <u>FINANCING/FUNDING</u>

A. Financing

The proposed method of financing for the Campus View Estates Development project is through General Obligation Tax Increment Bonds while using special assessments to pay the debt service on the bonds.

The total estimated project cost is \$1,795,000. That includes a 25% allowance for contingencies and an estimated cost for engineering, administration, and legal fees. The detailed cost estimate is shown in attachment 2.

B. Funding

Special assessments are planned to cover 100% of the project cost. Proposed special assessment roles are included in this report as Figure 4. Special Assessments were calculated in accordance with the City policy for funding new construction projects. This policy allows as an extension of the water, sewer, and street to assess the full cost of the construction to the affected properties based on adjusted frontage, lot square footage or per unit.

For this project the assessments will be applied in the following manner:

- 1. Watermains, sanitary sewer mains, and street construction will be assessed to the properties on Campus View Drive with the cost divided equally on a per unit basis as each unit will see similar benefit.
 - a. Lot 1 Block 1 will be assessed based on the 10 units proposed for that lot.

- 2. The water and sanitary sewer services along with sidewalk and driveways will be assessed to all the units in the entire development on a per unit basis as each unit will be connected to services, driveways and sidewalks of similar length.
 - a. Lot 1 Block 1 will be assessed based on the 10 units proposed for that lot.
 - b. All the units on Park Street will have their assessments for this project reduced by an equal share of the existing deferred special assessments. This is to account for the existing services and deferred assessments on these lots.
- 3. All storm water and turf establishment will be assessed to all lots in the development on a per square foot basis to account for the storm water attributed to the system by each lot.

VI. <u>SUMMARY</u>

Interstate Engineering, Inc. identified necessary infrastructure additions for the completion of the Campus View Estates Development. There is currently no infrastructure at the site. The project would include street, storm sewer, sanitary sewer, watermain, and services. The total project cost is estimated at \$1,795,000 and it is proposed to be funded through special assessments.

After reviewing the details of this project Interstate Engineering determined that this project is a necessary, cost effective, and feasible method to provide the access and city utilities required for the Campus View Estates Development.

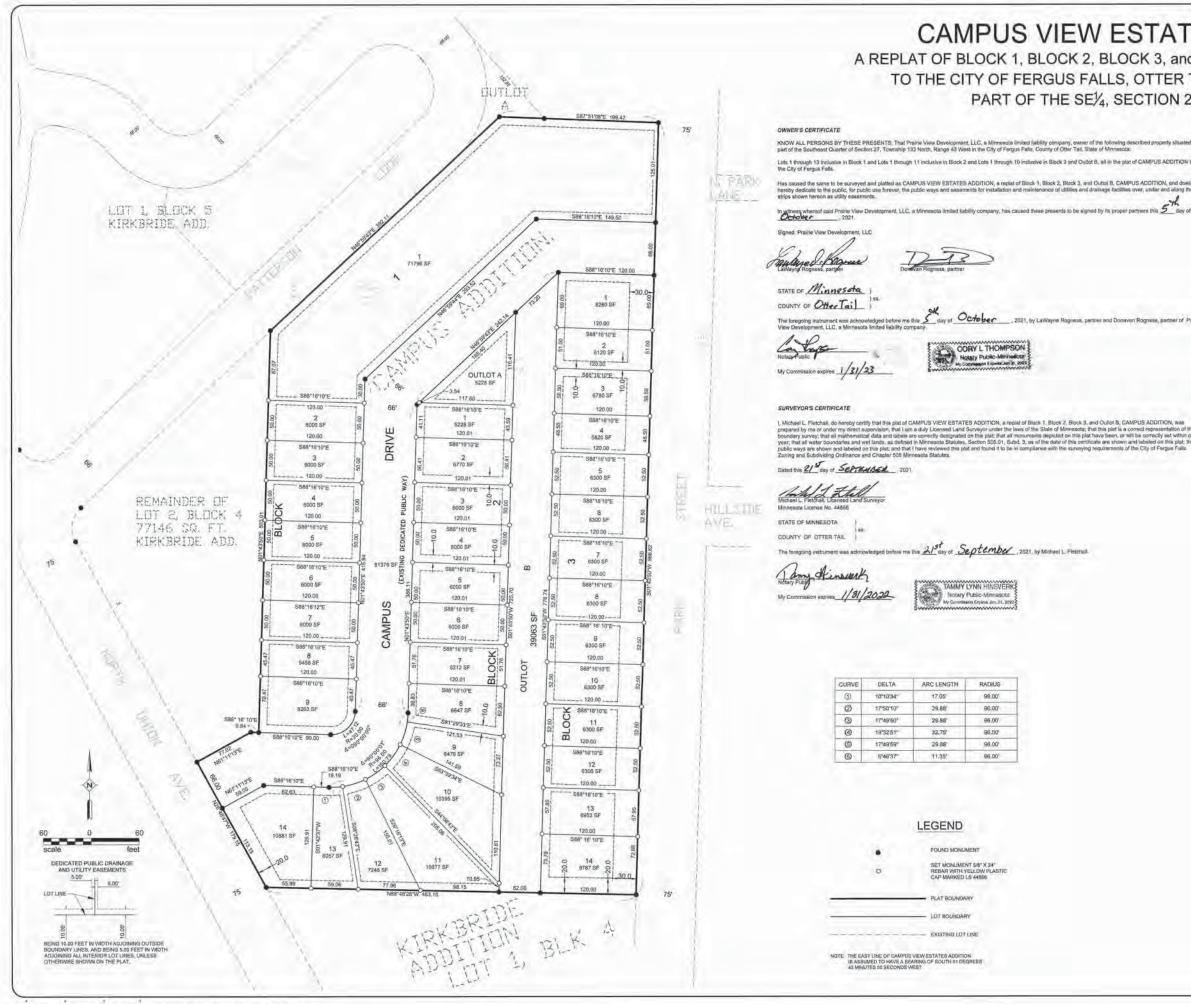

LOCATION AND LAYOUT

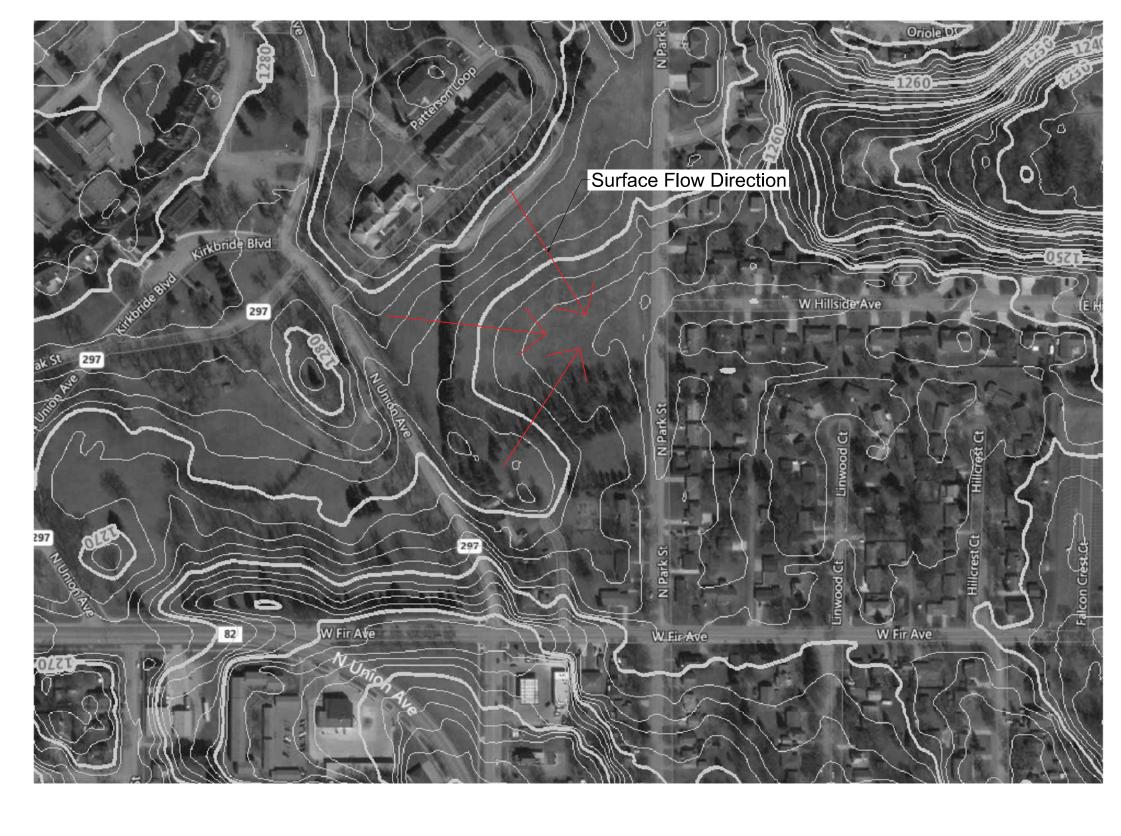


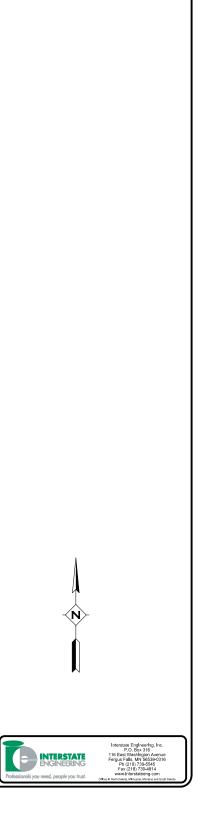

Background/Key Points:

In addition to the State of Minnesota and Federal Grant programs utilized for Airport capital improvement projects at the Fergus Falls Municipal Airport, the State of also provides funding to supplement annual airport operations thru the State of Minnesota Airport Maintenance & Operation (M&O) Grant Contract.

The attached grant terms are for State Fiscal Years (SFY) 2022 and 2023. The State is offering **75-percent** reimbursement for eligible items, not to exceed **\$71,453.00** for each fiscal year. Eligible items include city employee wages, heating, electricity, parts, supplies, pavement repairs, etc.

The State requires operational safety standards be adhered to and maintained as a recipient sponsor for these funds. These standards are similar to the Grant Assurance program associated with the Airport capital improvement projects; to operate and maintain the Airport a safe and serviceable manner for aeronautical purposes only for the use and benefit of the public.

This amount supplements and accounts for approximately 32-percent the annual Airport operating budget revenue.

This contract is between the State of Minnesota, acting through its Commissioner of Transportation ("State") and City of Fergus Falls acting through its City Council ("Recipient").

RECITALS

- 1. Minnesota Statutes §§360.015 and 360.305 authorize State to provide financial assistance to airports for maintenance and operation activities.
- 2. Recipient owns, operates, or controls an airport ("Airport") in the state system, and Recipient desires financial assistance from the State for maintenance and operation activities for State Fiscal Year 2022 and State Fiscal Year 2023.
- 3. Recipient represents that it is duly qualified and agrees to perform all services described in this contract to the satisfaction of the State.

CONTRACT TERMS

1. Term of Contract and Survival of Terms

1.1.	Effective Date:	This contract will be effective on July 1, 2021, or the date State obtains all required signatures under Minnesota Statutes §16B.98, subdivision 5, whichever is later. As required by Minnesota Statutes §16B.98 Subd. 7, no payments will be made to Recipient until this contract is fully executed.
1.2.	Expiration Date:	This contract will expire on June 30, 2023.
1.3.	Survival of Terms:	All clauses which impose obligations continuing in their nature and which must survive in order to give effect to their meaning will survive the expiration or termination of this contract, including, but not limited to, the following clauses: 9. Indemnification; 10. State Audits; 11. Government Data Practices; 13. Governing Law, Jurisdiction and Venue; and 14. Data Disclosure.

2. Recipient's Duties

- 2.1. Recipient will operate and maintain the Airport in a safe, serviceable manner for aeronautical purposes only for the use and benefit of the public.
- 2.2. The Recipient will keep the runway and the area around the lights mowed at the Airport. The grass must be mowed at least 7 feet beyond the lights, and the grass must not exceed 6 inches in height on the landing area. The areas around any navigational aids will be mowed and plowed to keep the area clear for access by a vehicle.
- 2.3. If the Airport remains operational during the winter months, the Recipient will keep at least one runway, associated taxiway, and apron area cleared of snow and ice to the same priority as arterial roads. Snow banks must be limited in height so that aircraft wings, engines, and propellers will clear them. Landing strip markers and/or lights must remain visible.

- 2.4. If the State contracts for the periodic paint striping of the Airport's runways and taxiways during the term of this Contract, the Recipient will cooperate with the marking operation. The Recipient must coordinate seal coat pavement maintenance projects with the State to maximize the pavement marking life.
- 2.5. The Recipient will allow a representative of the State's Office of Aeronautics access to any area of the Airport necessary for the purpose of periodic inspections.
- 2.6. The Recipient will promptly pay all utility bills, including those required for navigational aids.

3. Recipient's Assurances

- 3.1. In accordance with Minnesota Statutes § 360.305, subdivision 4, Recipient assures the State that Recipient will operate and maintain the Airport in a safe, serviceable manner for public aeronautical purposes only for a period of one year from the date the Recipient receives final reimbursement under this contract.
- 3.2. Recipient represents and warrants that Recipient has established a zoning authority for the Airport, and such authority has completed, or is in the process of and will complete, with due diligence, an airport zoning ordinance in accordance with Minnesota Statutes §§ 360.061 to 360.074.
- 3.3. Recipient will comply with all required grants management policies and procedures set forth through Minnesota Statutes §16B.97, Subd. 4 (a) (1).

4. Third-Party Contracting

4.1. Recipient will comply with all applicable local, state, or federal laws, regulations, policies and procedures in the procurement of goods and services funded in whole or in part under this Contract.

5. Consideration and Payment

- 5.1. **Consideration.** State will pay for all eligible telecommunication, maintenance, and operation costs incurred by Recipient under this Contract as follows:
 - 5.1.1. **Basis.** Recipient will be reimbursed for 100% of telecommunication costs associated with the operation of state-owned navigational aids. Recipient will be paid for 75% of all other eligible maintenance and operation costs not reimbursed by any other source. Eligible maintenance and operations costs will be determined at the sole discretion of State's Authorized Representative.
 - 5.1.2. **Telecommunication Amount.** State has currently obligated \$0.00 in each State fiscal year to reimburse eligible telecommunication costs at 100%.
 - 5.1.3. **Maintenance and Operation Amount.** State has currently obligated \$71,453.00 in each State fiscal year to reimburse other eligible costs at 75%.
 - 5.1.4. Total Obligation. The total obligation of State for all compensation and reimbursements to Recipient under this contract will not exceed \$142,906.00 (State fiscal years 2022 and 2023).

5.2. Payment.

- 5.2.1. Invoices. The Recipient must submit a reimbursement request of its eligible costs to the Director of the Office of Aeronautics on a quarterly basis or as directed by State's Authorized Representative. The State's Office of Aeronautics will supply the reimbursement request forms which Recipient must submit. Reimbursement requests must be submitted according to the following schedule:
 - On or after October 1, and no later than November 15, for the period July 1 through September 30.
 - On or after January 1, and no later than February 15, for the period October 1 through December 31.
 - On or after April 1, and no later than May 15, for the period January 1 through March 31.
 - On or after July 1, and no later than August 15, for the period April 1 through June 30.

The State may reject costs that the State determines are not eligible maintenance and operations expenses.

5.2.2. All Invoices Subject to Audit. All invoices are subject to audit, at State's discretion.

- 5.2.3. **State's Payment Requirements.** State will promptly pay all valid obligations under this contract as required by Minnesota Statutes §16A.124. State will make undisputed payments no later than 30 days after receiving Recipient's invoices and progress reports for services performed. If an invoice is incorrect, defective or otherwise improper, State will notify Recipient within ten days of discovering the error. After State receives the corrected invoice, State will pay Recipient within 30 days of receipt of such invoice.
- 5.2.4. Grant Monitoring Visit and Financial Reconciliation. If State's total obligation is greater than \$50,000 in section 5.1.4, above, during the period of performance the State will make at least one monitoring visit and conduct annual financial reconciliations of Recipient's expenditures. The State's Authorized Representative will notify Recipient's Authorized Representative where and when any monitoring visit and financial reconciliation will take place, which State employees and/or contractors will participate, and which Recipient staff members should be present. Recipient will be provided notice prior to any monitoring visit or financial reconciliation. Following a monitoring visit or financial reconciliation. Recipient will take timely and appropriate action on all deficiencies identified by State. At least one monitoring visit and one financial reconciliation must be completed prior to final payment being made to Recipient.
- 5.2.5. **Closeout.** The State will determine, at its sole discretion, whether a closeout audit is required prior to final payment approval. If a closeout audit is required, final payment will be held until the audit has been completed. Monitoring of any capital assets acquired with grant funds will continue following grant closeout.

6. Conditions of Payment

6.1. All services provided by Recipient under this contract must be performed to State's satisfaction, as determined at the sole discretion of State's Authorized Representative and in accordance with all applicable federal, state and local laws, ordinances, rules and regulations, including business registration requirements of the Office of the Secretary of State. Recipient will not receive payment for work found by State to be unsatisfactory or performed in violation of federal, state or local law. In addition to the foregoing, Recipient will not receive payment for Airport's failure to pass periodic inspections by a representative of the State's Office of Aeronautics.

7. Authorized Representatives

If the Recipient's duties are performed in a satisfactory manner, the State's Authorized Representative will accept each reimbursement request submitted for payment.

If Recipient's Authorized Representative changes at any time during this contract, Recipient must immediately notify State.

8. Assignment, Amendments, Waiver and Contract Complete

- 8.1. Assignment. Recipient may neither assign nor transfer any rights or obligations under this contract without the prior consent of State and a fully executed Assignment Contract, executed and approved by the same parties who executed and approved this contract, or their successors in office.
- 8.2. Amendments. An amendment to this contract must be in writing and will not be effective until it has been executed and approved by the same parties who executed and approved the original contract, or their successors in office.
- 8.3. **Waiver.** If State fails to enforce any provision of this contract that failure does not waive the provision or State's right to subsequently enforce it.
- 8.4. **Contract Complete.** This contract contains all prior negotiations and agreements between State and Recipient. No other prior understanding regarding this contract, whether written or oral, may be used to bind either party.
- 8.5. Electronic Records and Signatures. The parties agree to contract by electronic means. This includes using electronic signatures and converting original documents to electronic records.

9. Indemnification

9.1. In the performance of this contract by Recipient, or Recipient's agents or employees, and to the extent permitted by law, Recipient must indemnify, save and hold State, its agents, and employees harmless from any and all claims or causes of action, including reasonable attorney's fees incurred by State, to the extent caused by Recipient's: 1) intentional, willful or negligent acts or omissions; 2) breach of contract or warranty; or 3) breach of the applicable standard of care. The indemnification obligations of this section do not apply if the claim or cause of action is the result of State's sole negligence. This clause will not be construed to bar any legal remedies Recipient may have for State's failure to fulfill its obligation pursuant to this contract.

10. State Audits

10.1. Under Minnesota Statutes § 16B.98, Subd.8, the Recipient's books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices of Recipient, or other party relevant to this grant contract or transaction, are subject to examination by the State and/or the State Auditor or Legislative Auditor, as appropriate, for a minimum of six years from the end of this contract or receipt and approval of all final reports, whichever is later. Recipient will take timely and appropriate action on all deficiencies identified by an audit.

11. Government Data Practices

11.1. Recipient and State must comply with the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes Chapter 13, as it applies to all data provided by State under this contract, and as it applies to all data created, collected, received, stored, used, maintained or disseminated by Recipient under this contract. The civil remedies of Minnesota Statutes §13.08 apply to the release of the data referred to in this clause by either Recipient or State. If Recipient receives a request to release the data referred to in this Clause, Recipient must immediately notify State and consult with State as to how Recipient should respond to the request. Recipient's response to the request must comply with applicable law.

12. Workers' Compensation

12.1. Recipient certifies that it is in compliance with Minnesota Statutes §176.181, subdivision 2, pertaining to workers' compensation insurance coverage. Recipient's employees and agents will not be considered State employees. Any claims that may arise under the Minnesota Workers' Compensation Act on behalf of these employees and any claims made by any third party as a consequence of any act or omission on the part of these employees are in no way the State's obligation or responsibility.

13. Governing Law, Jurisdiction and Venue

13.1. Minnesota law, without regard to its choice-of-law provisions, governs this contract. Venue for all legal proceedings arising out of this contract, or its breach, must be in the appropriate state or federal court with competent jurisdiction in Ramsey County, Minnesota.

14. Data Disclosure

14.1. Under Minnesota Statutes §270C.65, and other applicable law, Recipient consents to disclosure of its social security number, federal employer tax identification number and Minnesota tax identification number, already provided to State, to federal and state agencies and state personnel involved in the payment of state obligations. These identification numbers may be used in the enforcement of federal and state laws which could result in action requiring Recipient to file state tax returns and pay delinquent state tax liabilities, if any, or pay other state liabilities.

15. Termination and Suspension

- 15.1. **Termination by the State.** The State may terminate this contract with or without cause, upon 30 days written notice to the Recipient. Upon termination, the Recipient will be entitled to payment, determined on a pro rata basis, for services satisfactorily performed.
- 15.2. **Termination for Cause.** The State may immediately terminate this grant contract if the State finds that there has been a failure to comply with the provisions of this contract, that reasonable progress has not been made, that fraudulent or wasteful activity has occurred, that Recipient has been convicted of a criminal offense relating to a state grant agreement, or that the purposes for which the funds were granted have not been or will not be fulfilled. The State may take action to protect the interests of the State of Minnesota, including the refusal to disburse additional funds and requiring the return of all or part of the funds already disbursed.
- 15.3. **Termination for Insufficient Funding.** The State may immediately terminate this contract if: It does not obtain funding from the Minnesota Legislature; or If funding cannot be continued at a level sufficient to allow for the payment of the services covered here. Termination must be by written or fax notice to the Recipient. The State is not obligated to pay for any services that are provided after notice and effective date of termination. However, the Recipient will be entitled to payment, determined on a pro rata basis, for services satisfactorily performed to the extent that funds are available. The State will not be assessed any penalty if the contract is terminated because of the decision of the Minnesota Legislature, or other funding source, not to appropriate funds. The State will provide the Recipient notice of the lack of funding within a reasonable time of the State's receiving that notice.
- 15.4. **Suspension.** The State may immediately suspend this contract in the event of a total or partial government shutdown due to the failure to have an approved budget by the legal deadline. Work performed by the Recipient during a period of suspension will be deemed unauthorized and undertaken at risk of non-payment.

<u>Subject</u>: Glacial Edge Trail Amendment & Cooperative Agreement

<u>Recommendation</u>: Recommendation to the council to accept the amendment to the Glacial Edge Trail master plan and enter into a cooperative agreement with Otter Tail County for the Glacial Edge Trail.

Background/Key Points: The Glacial Edge Trail is a proposed 14-mile trail mostly located within the City of Fergus Falls. City Council adopted the Glacial Edge Trail (GET) Master Plan on June 19, 2017. An amendment is proposed and summarized below.

Since July 2019, Otter Tail County has engaged in a regional trail planning effort. The proposed trail would begin in Maplewood State Park and connect to the proposed 2017 GET. This means the County's proposed north-south regional trail would connect Fergus Falls and the Central Lakes Trail with the Perham to Pelican Rapids Trail.

These planning efforts have been incorporated as an amendment to the City's Glacial Edge Trail Master Plan. Otter Tail County Board of Commissioners adopted the amended master plan at their November 23, 2021 meeting. Staff are recommending that the City Council adopt the amended master plan as well. GMRPTC and HKgi propose the County and City enter into a cooperative agreement that states funding, construction, and maintenance are the responsibility of the appropriate jurisdiction. Trail segments within the City of Fergus Falls and adjacent townships are the responsibility of the City. All other portions of the trail are the responsibility of Otter Tail County. Otter Tail County staff were authorized to enter into this agreement by the Otter Tail County Board of Commissioners at their November 23, 2021 meeting. The City Administrator, Community Development Manager, and City Attorney have reviewed the cooperative agreement and request City Council approval to enter into it.

Subject: Glacial Edge Trail Master Plan Adoption

Background/Key Points:

The adopted Otter Tail County Master Trail Plan identifies two high priority trail spines. The east/west spine connects the communities of Pelican Rapids to Perham and eventually the existing Heartland Trail. The north/south spine connects the City of Fergus Falls and the existing Central Lakes Trail to Maplewood State Park and the east/west spine.

While the County has no immediate plans to begin the north/south spine, the Greater MN Regional Parks and Trails Commission (GMRPTC) recommended the County partner with the City of Fergus Falls to amend the city's existing Glacial Edge Trail master plan. The City of Fergus Falls has an existing master trail plan that has been designated as "regionally significant" by GMRPTC. GMRPTC suggested an amendment would be easier and more cost effective than the County initiating a new master plan.

Based on the recommendation from GMRPTC, the County, City and several other stakeholders have spent considerable time updating and amending the Glacial Edge Trail Master Plan. It can be reviewed here:

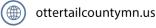

GLACIAL EDGE TRAIL

This cooperative agreement is entered into by and between Otter Tail County and the City of Fergus Falls, hereinafter collectively, "The Partners".

I. STATEMENT OF MUTUAL BENEFIT AND INTEREST

The Partners enter into this agreement to support the development of the Glacial Edge Trail (the "Trail"). The Partners agree the Trail offers mutual benefit by providing a recreational experience to area residents and visitors, connecting the City of Fergus Falls and Maplewood State Park, and expanding regional trail networks by connecting the Central Lakes Trail and Perham to Pelican Rapids Regional Trail.

II. AUTHORITIES

Otter Tail County is authorized to enter into this agreement pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Section 373.01. The City of Fergus Falls is authorized to enter into this agreement pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Section 412.491. Individually, The Partners have policies governing the use of their rights-of way for trail purposes.

III. PURPOSES AND PRINCIPLES

This cooperative agreement encourages long-term interagency coordination and cooperation to enhance recreational experiences for residents and visitors, to coordinate trail wide administration and site-specific management, to protect resources, to share expertise, and to seek sources of funding for trail planning.

IV. SPECIFIC TASKS

To the extent appropriate and feasible, the Partners will work cooperatively on the following tasks:

- A. The Partners will meet as necessary to determine feasibility, determine trail alignments, develop policy, develop budgets, and seek funding. The Partners may seek available technical assistance to achieve these tasks.
- B. The Partners will inform owners and managers of land along the trail system and the public about trail plans.

C. Execute supplemental and trail-specific agreements to implement this agreement.

V. TERMS OF AGREEMENT

- A. Effective Date. This agreement is executed as of the date of the last signature shown below and shall be in effect for a period not to exceed 3 years, at which time it will be subject to review, renewal, revision, or expiration. However, at the end of each year, the Partners will conduct an interim review of its language, tasks, and direction and make any necessary corrections as mutually agreeable.
- B. Modifications. Modifications to this agreement must be made in writing and signed and dated by the Partners.
- C. Terminations. Any Partner may withdraw from this agreement after 60 days written notice to the other Partner.

VI. SPECIAL PROVISIONS

- A. <u>Non-Fund Obligating Document</u>. This agreement shall not be construed as a fiscal or funds obligation document. All agreements involving reimbursement or contribution of funds between the Partners shall be by separate agreements.
- B. <u>Responsibilities to the Act</u>. This agreement does not relieve either Partner of their responsibility to manage the Trail according to local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations.
- C. <u>Conduct of Activities</u>. Unless otherwise agreed in writing, each Partner shall conduct and manage their own activities and use their resources, including the expenditure of their own funds, in pursuing the objectives enumerated in this agreement and shall operate under its own laws, regulations, and policies, subject to the appropriated funds.
- D. <u>Existing Authority</u>. Nothing in this agreement is intended to alter, limit, or expand either Partners' statutory and regulatory authority.
- E. <u>No Enforceable Rights</u>. This agreement does not create any substantive or procedural right that is enforceable at law or equity against the Partners or their officers, agents and employees.
- F. <u>Indemnification</u>. The Partners agree to indemnify, save, and hold each other, its agents and employees harmless from any claims or causes of action, including attorney's fees incurred, arising from the performance of this agreement pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 471.59, Subd.1a. Furthermore, Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 471.59 shall govern this agreement.

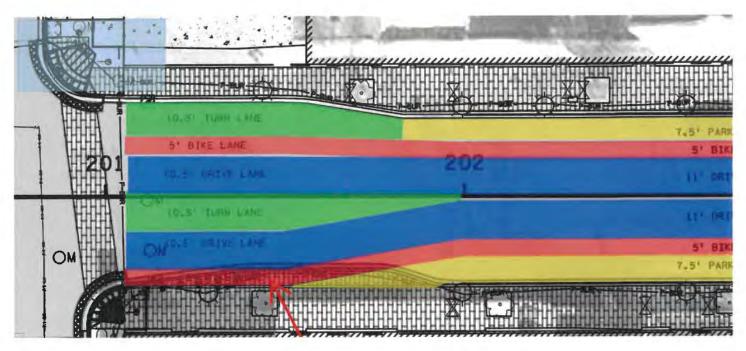

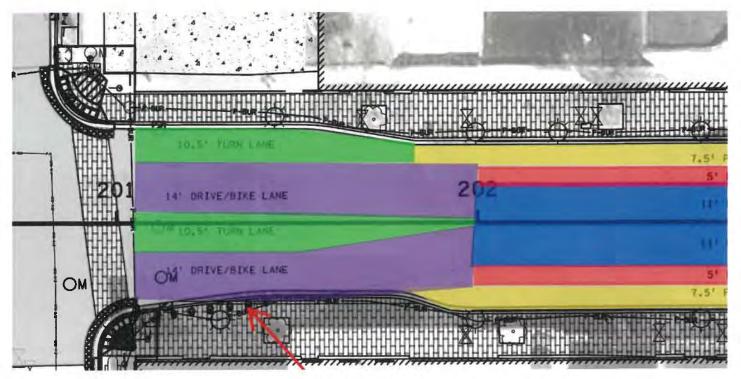

Subject: FEMA Assistance to Fire Fighters Grant (AFG)

<u>Recommendation</u>: Council to approve the Fire Department to apply for the Fiscal Year 2021 AFG for a new Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) station compressor and a fixed and mobile fill station.

Background/Key Points: The current compressor and fill station was purchased and installed in 1996. The Fire Department was successful in securing an AFG Fiscal Year 2015 grant to replace all 30 SCBA. Our current SCBA operate at twice the psi pressure compared to our previous ones, which is a tremendous benefit to the safety of our fire fighters, however a challenge in that our fill compressor rated psi does not have the capacity to fill our storage bottles to 6,000 psi. We have also been trying to defer some non- critical maintenance items with intent of saving funds to replace the compressor.

The Fire Department has submitted fiscal year 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020 AFG and thus far has been unsuccessful. In the FY 2021 AFG Notice of Funding Opportunity that an estimated \$90,000,000 in additional funding has been made available through the American Rescue Plan Act.

Budgetary Impact: The AFG requires a 5% local match. The requested grant amount will not exceed \$60,000. Funds for the matching amount may be available through the American Rescue Plan Funds.
