City Council Meeting February 5, 2024

The Fergus Falls City Council held a regular meeting on Monday February 5, 2024 at 5:30 pm in the City Council Chambers. Pastor Jim Johnson gave the invocation and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Mayor Schierer called the meeting to order at 5:32 pm and the following council members were in attendance: Rachels, Hicks, Fish, Job, Kvamme, Rufer, Kremeier and Thompson.

Approval of Agenda

A motion and second were made by Fish and Rufer approving the agenda with the removal of two items from the consent agenda and the motion carried.

Retirement: Bob Wallington

Fish offered Resolution #29-2024 acknowledging the retirement and 29 years of service from Bob Wallington, which was seconded by Kvamme and was adopted.

Proclamation: Giving Hearts Day

Mayor Schierer read a proclamation declaring February 8, 2024 as Giving Hearts Day.

Investment Portfolio Review

Mike Hoeschen, of Advanced Capital Group presented the 2023 investment portfolio review. 2023 was a year of recovery with investments earning \$1.4 million last year. The investment yield is 4.6%, which is up from 1.1% from two years ago. Finance Director Bill Sonmor reviewed the year-end cash balances for each fund and allowed uses. The total of all funds as of December 31, 2023, was \$44,002,213.69.

Open Forum

Bob Noah spoke on decorum at council meetings and public input opportunities. Duane Cookman asked for updates on the Glacial Edge Trail and franchise fees.

Consent Agenda

The following items were approved under Resolution #30-2024 by Hicks: A motion approving the following licenses: Minnesota Lawful Gambling Permit for the Minnesota Deer Hunters Association raffle on March 23, 2024 at the VFW; Mechanical Jerry's Heating & A/C; Fireworks Sales Fleet Farm. Resolution #31-2024 certifying election judges for the March 5, 2024 Presidential Nominating Primary Election; Resolution #32-2024 agreeing to maintain the bicycle and pedestrian facility portion of the trail sections of Public Improvement 5367, MnDOT's TH 210W bridge replacement project; Motion appointing Lois Josefson to the Heritage Preservation Commission; Resolution #33-2024 accepting donations from the Fergus Falls Public Library Foundation/West Central Initiative for materials and conference travel and approve corresponding budget adjustments. Resolution #34-2024 establishing a Fergus Falls Community Fund with West Central Initiative. Resolution #35-2024 approving an increase in service benefits for retiring paid on call fire fighters. A motion adding a \$100 per application fee for grazing for vegetative management permits to the 2024 fee schedule. Resolution #36-2024 approving a final plat for a two-lot subdivision of Timber Cove Addition at 1151 and 1161 N Friberg Avenue as requested by the Housing and Redevelopment Authority of Fergus Falls. The resolution was seconded by Thompson and was adopted.

Amendment to the Minutes

Hicks referenced the January 16, 2024, council minutes reiterating the city has the authority to revoke the encroachment agreement for the medical clinic at 1205 W Lincoln Avenue and the project must adhere to all city codes and standards. Kremeier asked for an amendment to attribute Mayor Schierer's quote "he felt council members were talking out of both sides of the mouth" be directed at him, not council members. He also requested the open forum be amended to clarify Mark Leighton's information source was the State Auditor's office. Finance Director Bill Sonmor said Mr. Leighton did use the State Auditor's Report on 2023 city budgets, but his information was inaccurately based on the wrong population base. A motion and second were made by Rufer and Rachels approving the amendments to the January 16, 2024, minutes and the motion carried.

Donations to Fire Department

After clarification on the amount of funding, Hicks offered Resolution #37-2024 accepting donations from Lake Region Electric Cooperative Operation Roundup and the Fraternal Oder of Eagles 2339 towards the purchase of an inflatable ice/cold water rescue boat for the fire department and approve the corresponding budget adjustments which was seconded by Rufer and was adopted.

Ordinance 52, Temporary Grazing

Ordinance 52, Eighth Series, Adding City Code Section 91.53, Temporary Grazing for Vegetative Management was introduced by Kvamme and was declared to have its first reading. Hicks asked for several clerical amendments which will be incorporated into the second reading.

Pebble Lake Golf Course Management Lease Agreement

The lease agreement for the management of the course was extended through December 31, 2024, and the golf board is responsible for the first \$5,000 of capital maintenance each year. Hicks offered Resolution #38-2024 approving a one-year extension to the Pebble Lake Golf Course management lease agreement which was seconded by Kvamme and was adopted with Rachels voting in opposition.

Grant for Union Avenue Bridge

As a coal impacted community, the city has an opportunity for federal funding for the rehabilitation of the Union Avenue bridge. The estimated cost of rehabbing the historic structure is \$3.6 million and 50-80% of the costs could be covered with a Federal Economic Development Administration Grant. Staff are looking for funding potential funding sources to cover the required matching funds. Rachels offered Resolution #39-2024 directing staff to prepare and submit an EDA grant application for the Union Avenue Bridge rehabilitation project, which was seconded by Fish and was adopted.

TIF Consultant for Workforce Housing Project

Staff anticipate a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) request for the proposed workforce housing project at 801 W Stanton Avenue. They recommend retaining Baker Tilly's TIF consultant services for a match of funds for the MHFA grant. The developer would be responsible for the cost of the services and the city is not obligated to grant TIF funds. Hicks offered Resolution #40-2024 engaging Baker Tilly for a Tax Increment Financing analysis for a possible workforce housing project, which was seconded by Rufer and was adopted with Kremeier voting in opposition.

Resolution of Accounts

Fish offered a resolution authorizing the payments and claims in the amount of \$1,205,421.76, which was seconded by Kvamme and was adopted.



City Council Work Session February 5, 2024

The Fergus Falls City Council held a work session on February 5, 2024, at 4:00 pm in the City Council Chambers to discuss the city's long-term plans for the Pebble Lake Golf Course. Mayor Schierer called the work session to order, and the following council members were in attendance: Rachels, Hicks, Fish, Job, Kvamme, and Kremeier. Rufer and Thompson were absent.

On December 4, 2023, the Fergus Falls City Council adopted a resolution extending the lease management agreement with the Pebble Lake Golf Board through the end of 2024 and appointed a sub-committee of two council members, two members of the Pebble Lake Golf Club and staff to negotiate the terms of the extended lease agreement. The mayor appointed council members Scott Kvamme and Anthony Hicks to serve. Kvamme said the sub-committee successfully navigated a one-year extension to their management lease agreement and the purpose of tonight's meeting is to discuss the city's long-term vision for the Pebble Lake Golf Course.

Dusty Christensen and Wade Jyrkas, representing the Pebble Lake Golf Course spoke of the board's constraints to make improvements to a city asset. They need the city's approval to purchase equipment and have a limited budget. The \$40,000 the golf course receives annually from the city once covered the most expensive piece of equipment but that is no longer the case. The city budget allocation has not changed since 2008. They said if the city retains the ownership of the course, then more funding needs to be allocated. They asked if the city would consider selling the golf course to the board and getting out of the management of the course. The course could be sold over a 3–5-year period as it transitions to its membership becoming course owner/operators. Christensen did not feel the taxpayers should be paying for the golf course and said if the city removes the \$40,000 from their budget and turns it over to the golf board, he said it would remain a public course.

Hicks felt the city's half-in/half-out approach is not working well and restricts the volunteer board. He cited their recent turnaround in operations, and his belief the course should be run like a business. He encouraged the city to decide if they are willing to let another entity run the golf course without the city's control; continue to run as is or decide if the city should fully take over the management of the entire course and be responsible for the day-to-day management. It was recommended the City Attorney opine on the legality of the city being able to sell the property. If the sale is allowable, the city needs to determine a purchase price. Rachels felt the number of golf rounds generated should be factored into the cost and he advocated the city continue with an RFP process. Kremeier spoke about the community's passion for this asset and felt the golf board was the most qualified entity to run the golf course as they know the business whereas the city does not. Fish felt it would be too costly for the city to run the golf course as a city department and the need to replace aging equipment. He was concerned it be retained as a public course and Christensen explained they feel it could be member owned and operated similarly to the course in Minnewaska.

Mayor Schierer agreed everyone wants to course to remain a public course, and a tool to promote both recreational and tourism opportunities for the community. There have been significant investments made in the course and a deal needs to be structured to protect the city and its taxpayers. He felt if the course is to remain a public course in perpetuity, it should go to a non-profit organization that invests their profits back into the golf course and it is in the city's best interest to consider all options. When the city sells public land, it must be done over two meetings so the public is informed,

and other buyers can be notified. The council was in consensus the current structure is not working and a new approach needs to be taken. Kvamme reiterated the wishes of the council are to keep the course public and a valuable resource for the community and with its high value a fair price would need to be agreed up. The sub-committee would take today's discussions into consideration when they meet again, and an update will be provided this spring. The meeting was adjourned at 4:47 pm.

Committee of the Whole February 14, 2024

The Fergus Falls City Council held a Committee of the Whole meeting on February 14, 2024, at 7:00 am in the City Council Chambers. Mayor Schierer called the meeting to order, and the following council members were in attendance: Rachels, Hicks, Fish, Job, Kvamme, Kremeier and Thompson. Rufer was absent.

DeLagoon Park Improvements

The plans and specifications for City Project 9148, the DeLagoon Park Improvements are complete. The base bid for the campground site and utility improvements is \$3.6 million and the total project approved by the voters \$5.2 million. The project will be bid as a base bid plus 13 alternates to enhance flexibility in the project. The scope of the campground improvements includes 42 RV sites, 9 tent sites, a handful of primitive camp sites, a restroom structure, electrical and sanitary sewer connections, and improvements near the archery and shooting range. Utilities will also be extended towards Shoreview Drive and installed for softball and soccer complex restroom structures. Other improvements in the park including lighting and the baseball and softball fields. A motion and second were made by Fish and Thompson to recommend the council accept the project plans and specifications and to authorize the advertising of bids and the motion carried.

RAISE Grant

The city is working with Otter Tail County to submit a joint application for the federal Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant application. The grant would provide connectivity between the Glacial Edge, Central Lakes, and Heart of the Lakes Trails. Another component of the application focuses on the construction of three roundabouts on Fir Avenue. The county is determining the total cost of the grant request and final locations for the trails and roundabouts. A more defined scope would be determined once the funds have been secured. A motion and second were made by Fish and Kvamme to recommend the council offer a resolution of support for the RAISE grant application and the motion carried.

Aeronautics Grant

Last year the city applied for a MnDOT Aeronautics Equipment Grant and was successfully awarded \$74,300 to replace a tractor that pulls a bat-wing style mower for the airport property. The current tractor can be placed back into the city's fleet. A motion and second were made by Hicks and Rachels to recommend the council accept MnDOT's state grant offer for an airport tractor and the motion carried.

2024 Seal Coat Projects

Plans and specifications are substantially complete for PI 5372, the 2024 seal coat improvement project. The estimated construction cost is \$244,800 and if the bids are favorable, the city can add up to a 25% increase to the contract price. \$173,100 was budgeted this year for seal coat applications plus \$100,000 carried over from the previous year. The total project cost of \$273,100 includes engineering, contingency and construction costs. A motion and second were made by Hicks and Kremeier to recommend the council accept the project plans and specifications for PI 5372, the 2024 seal coat improvements and authorize the advertising of bids and the motion carried.

Ground Storage Reservoir Replacement Project

Tom Welle of Apex Engineering Group explained the city has five existing water storage facilities including ground storage reservoirs (GSR) and elevated tanks. The facilities range in age from 1914 to 2007 for a total water storage of 3.865 MG. The condition of the 1914 water storage facility is a concern and Apex developed a computer system model to evaluate and analyze the exiting water system and confirm the status of the 1914 GSR. The goals for a water distribution system are to maintain adequate pressure from 40 to 80 psi under all conditions, provide adequate and efficient flowrates to meet residential, commercial, and industrial customer demands, fire protection to meet ISO requirements and the water quality meets the health standards established by the Minnesota Department of Health. The 40-80 psi was maintained during maximum day demands with and without 1914 GSR in-service. No deficiencies were found for velocity or head loss in pipelines 14" or smaller and one deficiency was discovered in a critical 16" pipeline leaving the city vulnerable if a pipe were to break. The city's existing pumping facilities can meet all pumping conditions for the foreseeable future and their report showed no new storage is needed which will result in a savings of approximately \$2.7 to \$3 million since the 1914 GSR will not be replaced. A new industrial customer with high water use could change this. If the school constructs a new elementary school, the modeling will project the anticipated water usage and pressure needs.

Apex does recommend conducting a thorough evaluation of the water treatment facility as it was not included in their study. The water treatment facility was constructed in 1935 and the last major expansion was completed in 1960. Staff have done a remarkable job of maintaining and extending the life of the equipment and facility. A reduction in storage with the demolition of the 1914 GSR will lead to increased operational hours of the facility during peak demands and the equipment needs to be evaluated. Disinfection requirements and adequate contact time must be confirmed by the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) before decommissioning and demolition can occur. The next steps would be abandoning and demolition of the 1914 ground storage reservoir pending MDH approval, executing a facility plan for the evaluation of the existing water treatment facility, SCADA upgrades, unidirectional flushing program and combining high pressure zones.

The 1914 GSR must be demolished as it is in poor condition, an eyesore and on the verge of collapse. It cannot be removed completely due to the risk of it being so close to the other ground surface tank and its potential to damage that as well. The top would be removed and the walls taken below grade, top soil added and the surface cleaned up. The funds being requested for the replacement of the ground storage reservoir have been planned for in the city's budget. A motion and second were made by Hicks and Fish to recommend the council accept Interstate Engineering's (Apex) design and construction administration professional services proposal for demolition in the amount of \$125,000 and accept Apex Engineering's professional services proposal for the development of a unidirectional flushing program in the amount of \$10,000.

Minnesota Department of Health Drinking Water Revolving Fund

In 2022 the Environmental Protection Agency announced new rules for cities requiring the removal of service pipes that contain lead and copper as they have been negatively linked to long-term impacts on human health and water quality. The new rule requires communities to identify lead service lines and develop a plan to mitigate the risk of lead service lines until the lines can be replaced. Over 300 homes are be serviced by lead/galvanized service lines throughout the city. Costs associated with the service line replacements will be borne by the property owners and are estimated to be thousands of dollars at each location. The city is seeking authorization to apply for a Minnesota Department of

Health Drinking Water Revolving Fund to help fund the replacement of lead/galvanized water service lines from the private portion of the line (stop box to house). If successful, the funds would be granted to the city and individual homeowners affected by these service lines could apply to the city for reimbursement. A motion and second were made by Rachels and Thompson to recommend the council authorize staff to apply to the Minnesota Department of Health Drinking Water Revolving Fund for funds to replace the lead/galvanized water service lines and the motion carried.

Business Development for Fergus Falls Grant

Business Development for Fergus Falls (BDFF) is the body that administers and maintains the city's loan pools and there has been an increase in project costs related to business development. As of the end of 2023 they have a loan balance of \$1,557,114.09 with \$2,036,667.39 available for project funding. BDFF is seeking authorization to apply for up to \$500,000 in United States Department of Agriculture for a Rural Business Development Grant. The grant funds would be used to contribute to the economic wellbeing of the area, promote growth, expansion, and development of business concerns. A motion and second were made by Hicks and Rachels to recommend the council authorize the application for financial assistance from the USDA's Rural Business Development Grant program to grow the Revolving Loan Funds managed by Business Development for Fergus Falls and the motion carried.

Amendment to Definition of a Hotel

Two developers working on local hotels have requested the city amend City Code 154.002. The code reads a hotel must have a reception desk staffed at all hours. This language is outdated as many hotels offer online keys or apps to enter the rooms. Kremeier expressed safety concerns and wanted documentation that the flour mill developer stated their hotel would be staffed with front desk staff. Other council members commented they find this a common practice in their personal travel experiences and none of them could recollect the developer making such a claim. A motion and second were made by Hicks and Rachels to recommend the council amend City Code 154.002 and hold a first reading of the ordinance on February 20 and the motion carried.

<u>Subject:</u> Fire Department equipment purchases using Trust Account funds.

Recommendation: Council approval for the Fire Department to purchase an inflatable water/ice rescue boat, fire extinguisher training prop, and wireless in-cab communication headsets using funds from the Fire Department Trust Account.

Background/Key Points: The Fire Department Trust Account group (appointed Council Member, Firefighter Association President, and the Fire Chief) met on Thursday February 8th to discuss equipment purchases using available funds within the Trust Account. Each equipment item was discussed and a quote presented.

The purchase of the inflatable rescue boat enhances the Departments' water/ice rescue abilities as well as fire fighter safety. The extinguisher training prop, which is fueled by propane, is safer to use than the current method of a gas/diesel fuel mixture and is an education tool to be used during community outreach and internal training. The wireless headsets, currently installed in one of our apparatus, have proven to provide better communication during a response and aid in backing the apparatus – allowing direct voice contact between the driver/operator and person spotting.

<u>Budgetary Impact:</u> The total cost for the rescue boat, training prop, and headsets is \$20,838. \$18,493 will come from the Trust Account and the remainder from recent approved donations that were directed to the Fire Department operating budget.

Fergus Falls Fire Department

Trust Fund Meeting, Thursday February 8, 2024 at 16:00, Fire Station

Present: City Council Member Anthony Hicks, Firefighter Association President Tyler Armstrong, and Fire Chief Ryan Muchow

Beginning Trust Fund balance \$53,031.

The Trust Fund was established in 1997 by City Council Resolution and is a place holder for donations made to the Fire Department. The last significant equipment purchase from it was in 2019 when the Fire Department purchased battery powered extrication equipment.

3 equipment purchases were discussed.

- 1) Inflatable Rescue Boat Package. Quote from Alex Fire Apparatus of \$3,195 plus estimated \$150 for shipping. \$1,000 to come from the Trust Fund from a previous donation and \$2,600 from recently approved donations placed in the Fire Department operating budget.
- 2) Fire Extinguisher Training Prop. Quote from Industrial Safety INC, total with shipping estimate of \$6,708. Funds to come from the Trust Fund. This training prop will enhance community training events as well as internal firefighter training.
- 3) Wireless Headsets to outfit Engine 5 and Tower 4 with 4 headsets in each apparatus. Quote from SetCom, total with shipping estimate of \$10,785. Funds to come from the Trust Fund. These headsets are the same as what is in Engine 2 and have proven to be a valuable communication tool during incident responses and for the Driver/Operator operating the truck. These headsets can be transferred to another truck when a truck is replaced.

The total purchase price of the 3 purchases discussed is \$20,838 with \$18,493 coming from the Trust Fund. This will keep an ending balance of \$34,538 in the Trust Fund.

Each person present agreed to move forward with the purchases and the use of Trust Funds for them.

Background/Key Points:

Bolton & Menk, Inc. has substantially completed the project plans and specifications for the DeLagoon Park Improvements project. The project base bid Estimated Probable Construction Cost is \$3,600,000.00 for the campground site and utility improvements. The City must publicly advertise per competitive bidding requirements for the campground and utility improvements. Given the complexity of the project, I am recommending a minimum 21-day publication.

As discussed with the Project Management Team throughout design, Bolton & Menk, Inc. has developed 13 project components to be bid as alternates, providing the City flexibility in selecting the final components of the project to fit within the approved \$5.2 million dollar budget.

The project bid opening is scheduled for March 19, 2024 at 2:00pm. Once final construction costs are known, staff will prepare the final projected budget for a potential contract awarding at the April 1, 2024 City council meeting.

Budgetary Impact:

The local option sales tax to publicly finance the project bonds is the current funding mechanism. The City has the legislative authority for a \$5.2 million dollar improvement project therefore, as mentioned previously the project scope before you will be bid with alternates.



Background/Key Points:

The City of Fergus Falls in cooperation with Otter Tail County are planning to submit a joint application for the federal Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant.

The first component consists of extending trail connectivity. The Glacial Edge Trail (GET) connects to the Central Lakes State Trail to the southeast but is missing that final link that connects the City of Fergus Falls to the Heart of the Lake Trail. Both the City and County are seeking funds to complete their respective portions. City segment generally from TH 210 to CSAH 1 and OTC's from 245th Street to CSAH 24 at Maplewood State Park.

The other component of the application focuses on the construction of three (3) roundabouts on Fir Avenue (County Highway 1) at the intersections of Tower Road, Union Avenue, and Friberg Avenue. These critical intersections will be more efficient and safer for drivers and pedestrians if constructed.

Budgetary Impact:

General staff time to complete the application. We are seeking funding for the projects with no local match.



Background/Key Points:

In December, MnDOT Aeronautics announced the FY 2024 Aeronautics Equipment Grant competitive solicitation for equipment used for the maintenance and operations at publicly owned airports. MnDOT Aeronautics had up to \$2 Million available for this fiscal year. Grant applications were due December 31, 2023.

The Minnesota Department of Transportation Aeronautics Office has completed its review and prioritization of Equipment requests for State Fiscal Year 2024 funding from the recent solicitation period.

I am pleased to inform you that: The **Tractor** request, for an estimated total cost of **\$74,300.00** as identified in your State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2024 Equipment Solicitation Request, has been selected to receive a State Grant Offer. MnDOT will execute a Grant Contract under the following conditions:

- These funds have been identified for the equipment identified in this letter and cannot be applied toward another project or piece of equipment at your airport.
- The funds are available to execute the grant during State Fiscal Year 2024 (July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024). To improve the use of State Airports funds, we are requiring a complete grant request by March 31, 2024. If you are not able to make this March 31st deadline, you must work with your Regional Engineer to schedule a submittal date that works for you. If a grant request cannot be submitted by March 31st, or an extended submittal date cannot be agreed upon, you will forfeit the offer and the funds will go back into the State Airports Funds.
- If you plan to move forward with this equipment acquisition project, the following are required by email for a complete grant request:
 - o A Grant Request Letter stating the project/funding requested and on sponsor letterhead.
 - o A Cost Split detailing the costs of the project in an Excel File that can be found on the MnDOT Aero website: http://www.dot.state.mn.us/aero/airportdevelopment/forms.html
 - o A quote for the equipment with a cost breakdown of the equipment including all attachments.
 - o If you are trading in equipment previously purchased with a State Grant, please provide us the details of the trade-in.
 - o We will reach out if further explanation or documentation is needed.
- Once these documents are received and approved, MnDOT will encumber funds and a grant contract will be sent to you for signature. No reimbursement can be made until a fully executed (signed) Grant Contract has been completed.
- Reminder about equipment grants:
 - o Equipment grants will not be amended once the grant has been executed.
 - o Add-on warranties are not eligible costs for equipment grants.
 - o Administration costs (including consultant services) are not eligible for equipment grants.
 - o Equipment purchased with this funding is for airport use only.
 - o Maximum of \$200,000 state funds per piece of equipment.



Subject: Drinking Water Revolving Water Fund application

Recommendation: Authorize city staff to apply to the Minnesota Department of Health Drinking Water Revolving Fund (DWRF) for money to fund replacement of lead/galvanized water service lines (private portion of the line—stop box to house).

Background/Key Points: In 2022, the Environmental Protection Agency announced new rules that require the removal of service pipes that contain lead and copper in cities nationwide. Lead pipes, primarily used in infrastructure through the first half of the twentieth century, can have negative long-term impacts on human health and water quality. This new rule requires communities to identify lead service lines and develop a plan to mitigate the risk of using lead service lines until such time the service line can be replaced. An inventory of service lines was submitted to the MDH in January, ahead of the October deadline.

<u>Budgetary Impact:</u> Costs associated with the service line replacement, which will be done by private contractor's, will be into the thousands of dollars at each location. If the city is awarded funds from the DWRF, a property owner will then be able to apply to the city to have the costs of line replacement re-imbursed.

Business Development for Fergus Falls (BDFF) Grant Application to United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Business Development Grant.

Recommendation:

Background/Key Points:

PI No. 8232 – 750,000 gallon Ground Storage Reservoir (GSR) Replacement Project

Recommendation:

- Accept Interstate Engineering's (Apex) design and construction administration professional services proposal for demolition the amount of \$125,000.00
- Accept Apex Engineering's professional services proposal for the development of a unidirectional flushing program the amount of \$10,000.00

Background/Key Points:

The 750,000 gallon GSR tank was constructed in 1914. A report from 1993 recommended replacement of the GSR in the coming years. The continuous 2018 report recommended the demolition and replacement of this GSR. City staff has maintained this facility in working order but it is at the end of its useful life and other storage facilities have been constructed to maintain fire flow requirements.

Initially, the plan was to follow the report recommendations mentioned above however, it was decided to pursue a holistic approach to this matter based on the following questions:

- 1. Is a new ground water storage reservoir needed to replace the 750,000-gallon GSR, which is scheduled to be demolished?
- 2. Can the WTP itself be modified to accommodate storage needs without a new GSR?
- 3. If needed, should the GSR be built in the same location or moved to a new location to better serve the city's water demands?

These questions and due diligence are best answered by developing a City wide water distribution digital model. The Council accepted the proposal from Interstate Engineering and their sub-contractor Apex Engineering Group, Inc. (Apex) to evaluate the City's water distribution system. This model is now completed and calibrated. Representatives from Interstate and Apex Engineering will be in attendance to present a favorable outcome.

Another beneficial aspect by having a water system model is the ability to develop a "unidirectional flushing program". Although City Public Works conducts system flushing annually, this type of program is designed to enhance maintenance staff's efforts to improve hydraulic capacity and water quality in the distribution system by removal of accumulations inside the watermain pipe wall in a more effective and efficient manner. I recommend the Council approve this action as well.

These consultant fees will be funded thru the water enterprise fund.

SHORT FORM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN OWNER AND ENGINEER FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

This is an Agreement between **City of Fergus Falls** (Owner) and **Interstate Engineering Inc.** (Engineer). Owner's Project, of which Engineer's services under this Agreement are a part, is generally identified as **1914 GSR Demolition** (Project). Engineer's services under this Agreement (Services) are generally identified as **See Appendix No.2**.

Owner and Engineer further agree as follows:

1.01 Services of Engineer

A. Engineer shall provide or furnish the Services set forth in this Agreement, and any Additional Services authorized by Owner and consented to by Engineer.

2.01 Owner's Responsibilities

- A. Owner shall provide Engineer with existing Project-related information and data in Owner's possession and needed by Engineer for performance of Engineer's Services. Owner will advise the Engineer of Project-related information and data known to Owner but not in Owner's possession. Engineer may use and rely upon Owner-furnished information and data in performing its Services, subject to any express limitations applicable to the furnished items.
 - Following Engineer's assessment of initially-available Project information and data, and upon Engineer's request, Owner shall obtain, furnish, or otherwise make available (if necessary through retention of specialists or consultants) such additional Projectrelated information and data as is reasonably required to enable Engineer to complete its Services; or, with consent of Engineer, Owner may authorize the Engineer to obtain or provide all or part of such additional information and data as Additional Services.
- B. Owner shall provide necessary direction and make decisions, including prompt review of Engineer's submittals, and carry out its other responsibilities in a timely manner so as not to delay Engineer's performance. Owner shall give prompt notice to Engineer whenever Owner observes or otherwise becomes aware of (1) any relevant, material defect or nonconformance in Engineer's Services, or (2) any development that affects the scope or time of performance of Engineer's Services.

3.01 Schedule for Rendering Services

- A. Engineer shall complete its Services within the following specific time period: **See Appendix No. 2**. If no specific time period is indicated, Engineer shall complete its Services within a reasonable period of time.
- 3. If, through no fault of Engineer, such periods of time or dates are changed, or the orderly and continuous progress of Engineer's Services is impaired, or Engineer's Services are delayed or suspended, then the time for completion of Engineer's Services, and the rates and amounts of Engineer's compensation, shall be adjusted equitably.

4.01 Invoices and Payments

- A. Invoices: Engineer shall prepare invoices in accordance with its standard invoicing practices and submit the invoices to Owner on a monthly basis. Invoices are due and payable within 30 days of receipt.
- B. Payment: As compensation for Engineer providing or furnishing Services and Additional Services, Owner shall pay Engineer as set forth in this Paragraph 4.01, Invoices and Payments. If Owner disputes an invoice, either as to amount or entitlement, then Owner shall promptly advise Engineer in writing of the specific basis for doing so, may withhold only that portion so disputed, and must pay the undisputed portion.
- C. Failure to Pay: If Owner fails to make any payment due Engineer for Services, Additional Services, and expenses within 30 days after receipt of Engineer's invoice, then (1) the amounts due Engineer will be increased at the rate of 1.0% per month (or the maximum rate of interest permitted by law, if less) from said thirtieth day; (2) in addition Engineer may, after giving 7 days' written notice to Owner, suspend Services under this Agreement until Engineer has been paid in full all amounts due for Services, Additional Services, expenses, and other related charges, and in such case Owner waives any and all claims against Engineer for any such suspension; and (3) if any payment due Engineer remains unpaid after 90 days, Engineer may terminate the Agreement for cause pursuant to Paragraph 5.01.A.2.
- D. Reimbursable Expenses: Engineer is entitled to reimbursement of expenses only if so indicated in Paragraph 4.01.E or 4.01.F. If so entitled, and unless expressly specified otherwise, the amounts payable to Engineer for reimbursement of expenses will be the Project-related internal expenses actually incurred or allocated by Engineer, plus all invoiced external expenses allocable to the Project, including Engineer's subcontractor and subconsultant charges, with the external expenses multiplied by a factor of 1.1.

E. Basis of Payment

- 1. Hourly Rates. Owner shall pay Engineer for Services as follows:
 - a. An amount equal to the cumulative hours charged to the Project by Engineer's employees times standard hourly rates for each applicable billing class, plus reimbursement of expenses incurred in connection with providing the Services.
 - b. Engineer's Standard Hourly Rates are attached as Appendix 1.
 - c. The total compensation for Services and reimbursement of expenses shall not exceed \$125,000.
- F. Additional Services: For Additional Services, Owner shall pay Engineer an amount equal to the cumulative hours charged in providing the Additional Services by Engineer's employees, times standard hourly rates for each applicable billing class; plus reimbursement of expenses incurred in connection with providing the Additional Services. Engineer's standard hourly rates are attached as Appendix 1.

5.01 Termination

A. Termination for Cause

- Either party may terminate the Agreement for cause upon 30 days' written notice in the
 event of substantial failure by the other party to perform in accordance with the terms
 of the Agreement, through no fault of the terminating party.
 - a. Notwithstanding the foregoing, this Agreement will not terminate under Paragraph 5.01.A.1 if the party receiving such notice begins, within 7 days of receipt of such notice, to correct its substantial failure to perform and proceeds diligently to cure such failure within no more than 30 days of receipt thereof; provided, however, that if and to the extent such substantial failure cannot be reasonably cured within such 30-day period, and if such party has diligently attempted to cure the same and thereafter continues diligently to cure the same, then the cure period provided for herein will extend up to, but in no case more than, 60 days after the date of receipt of the notice.
- 2. In addition to its termination rights in Paragraph 5.01.A.1, Engineer may terminate this Agreement for cause upon 7 days' written notice (a) if Owner demands that Engineer furnish or perform services contrary to Engineer's responsibilities as a licensed professional, (b) if Engineer's services for the Project are delayed or suspended for more than 90 days for reasons beyond Engineer's control, (c) if payment due Engineer remains unpaid for 90 days, as set forth in Paragraph 4.01.C, or (d) as the result of the presence at the Site of undisclosed Constituents of Concern as set forth in Paragraph 6.01.I.
- 3. Engineer will have no liability to Owner on account of any termination by Engineer for cause.
- B. Termination for Convenience: Owner may terminate this Agreement for convenience, effective upon Engineer's receipt of notice from Owner.
- C. Payments Upon Termination: In the event of any termination under Paragraph 5.01, Engineer will be entitled to invoice Owner and to receive full payment for all services performed or furnished in accordance with this Agreement, and to reimbursement of expenses incurred through the effective date of termination. Upon making such payment, Owner will have the limited right to the use of all deliverable documents, whether completed or under preparation, subject to the provisions of Paragraph 6.01.F, at Owner's sole risk.
 - If Owner has terminated the Agreement for cause and disputes Engineer's entitlement
 to compensation for services and reimbursement of expenses, then Engineer's
 entitlement to payment and Owner's rights to the use of the deliverable documents will
 be resolved in accordance with the dispute resolution provisions of this Agreement or
 as otherwise agreed in writing.
 - 2. If Owner has terminated the Agreement for convenience, or if Engineer has terminated the Agreement for cause, then Engineer will be entitled, in addition to the payments identified above, to invoice Owner and receive payment of a reasonable amount for services and expenses directly attributable to termination, both before and after the effective date of termination, such as reassignment of personnel, costs of terminating contracts with Engineer's subcontractors or subconsultants, and other related close-out costs, using methods and rates for Additional Services as set forth in Paragraph 4.01.F.

6.01 General Considerations

- A. The standard of care for all professional engineering and related services performed or furnished by Engineer under this Agreement will be the care and skill ordinarily used by members of the subject profession practicing under similar circumstances at the same time and in the same locality. Engineer makes no warranties, express or implied, under this Agreement or otherwise, in connection with any services performed or furnished by Engineer. Subject to the foregoing standard of care, Engineer may use or rely upon design elements and information ordinarily or customarily furnished by others, including, but not limited to, specialty contractors, manufacturers, suppliers, and the publishers of technical standards.
- B. Engineer shall not at any time supervise, direct, control, or have authority over any Constructor's work, nor will Engineer have authority over or be responsible for the means, methods, techniques, sequences, or procedures of construction selected or used by any Constructor, or the safety precautions and programs incident thereto, for security or safety at the Project site, nor for any failure of a Constructor to comply with laws and regulations applicable to that Constructor's furnishing and performing of its work. Engineer shall not be responsible for the acts or omissions of any Constructor.
- C. Engineer neither guarantees the performance of any Constructor nor assumes responsibility for any Constructor's failure to furnish and perform its work.
- D. Engineer's opinions of probable construction cost (if any) are to be made on the basis of Engineer's experience, qualifications, and general familiarity with the construction industry. However, because Engineer has no control over the cost of labor, materials, equipment, or services furnished by others, or over contractors' methods of determining prices, or over competitive bidding or market conditions, Engineer cannot and does not guarantee that proposals, bids, or actual construction cost will not vary from opinions of probable construction cost prepared by Engineer. If Owner requires greater assurance as to probable construction cost, then Owner agrees to obtain an independent cost estimate.
- E. Engineer shall not be responsible for any decision made regarding the construction contract requirements, or any application, interpretation, clarification, or modification of the construction contract documents, other than those made by Engineer.
- F. All documents prepared or furnished by Engineer are instruments of service, and Engineer retains an ownership and property interest (including the copyright and the right of reuse) in such documents, whether or not the Project is completed. Engineer grants to Owner a limited license to use the deliverable documents on the Project, extensions of the Project, and for related uses of the Owner, subject to receipt by Engineer of full payment due and owing for all Services and Additional Services relating to preparation of the deliverable documents, and subject to the following limitations:
 - 1. Owner acknowledges that such documents are not intended or represented to be suitable for use on the Project unless completed by Engineer, or for use or reuse by Owner or others on extensions of the Project, on any other project, or for any other use or purpose, without written verification or adaptation by Engineer;
 - 2. any such use or reuse, or any modification of the documents, without written verification, completion, or adaptation by Engineer, as appropriate for the specific

- purpose intended, will be at Owner's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to Engineer or to its officers, directors, members, partners, agents, employees, and subconsultants:
- 3. Owner shall indemnify and hold harmless Engineer and its officers, directors, members, partners, agents, employees, and subconsultants from all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including attorneys' fees, arising out of or resulting from any use, reuse, or modification of the documents without written verification, completion, or adaptation by Engineer; and
- 4. such limited license to Owner shall not create any rights in third parties.
- G. Owner and Engineer agree to transmit, and accept, Project-related correspondence, documents, text, data, drawings, information, and graphics, in electronic media or digital format, either directly, or through access to a secure Project website, in accordance with a mutually agreeable protocol.
- H. Waiver of Damages; Limitation of Liability: To the fullest extent permitted by law, Owner and Engineer (1) waive against each other, and the other's officers, directors, members, partners, agents, employees, subconsultants, and insurers, any and all claims for or entitlement to special, incidental, indirect, or consequential damages arising out of, resulting from, or in any way related to this Agreement or the Project, from any cause or causes, and (2) agree that Engineer's total liability to Owner under this Agreement shall be limited to \$100,000 or the total amount of compensation received by Engineer, whichever is greater.
- I. The parties acknowledge that Engineer's Services do not include any services related to unknown or undisclosed Constituents of Concern. If Engineer or any other party encounters, uncovers, or reveals an unknown or undisclosed Constituent of Concern, then Engineer may, at its option and without liability for consequential or any other damages, suspend performance of Services on the portion of the Project affected thereby until such portion of the Project is no longer affected, or terminate this Agreement for cause if it is not practical to continue providing Services.
- J. Owner and Engineer agree to negotiate each dispute between them in good faith during the 30 days after notice of dispute. If negotiations are unsuccessful in resolving the dispute, then the dispute will be mediated. If mediation is unsuccessful, then the parties may exercise their rights at law.
- K. This Agreement is to be governed by the laws of the state in which the Project is located.
- L. Engineer's Services do not include: (1) serving as a "municipal advisor" for purposes of the registration requirements of Section 975 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act (2010) or the municipal advisor registration rules issued by the Securities and Exchange Commission; (2) advising Owner, or any municipal entity or other person or entity, regarding municipal financial products or the issuance of municipal securities, including advice with respect to the structure, timing, terms, or other similar matters concerning such products or issuances; (3) providing surety bonding or insurance-related advice, recommendations, counseling, or research, or enforcement of construction insurance or surety bonding requirements; or (4) providing legal advice or representation.

7.01 Definitions

- A. Constructor—Any person or entity (not including the Engineer, its employees, agents, representatives, subcontractors, and subconsultants), performing or supporting construction activities relating to the Project, including but not limited to contractors, subcontractors, suppliers, Owner's work forces, utility companies, construction managers, testing firms, shippers, and truckers, and the employees, agents, and representatives of any or all of them.
- B. Constituent of Concern—Asbestos, petroleum, radioactive material, polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs), lead based paint (as defined by the HUD/EPA standard), hazardous waste, and any substance, product, waste, or other material of any nature whatsoever that is or becomes listed, regulated, or addressed pursuant to laws and regulations regulating, relating to, or imposing liability or standards of conduct concerning, any hazardous, toxic, or dangerous waste, substance, or material.

8.01 Successors, Assigns, and Beneficiaries

A. Successors and Assigns

- Owner and Engineer are hereby bound and the successors, executors, administrators, and legal representatives of Owner and Engineer (and to the extent permitted by Paragraph 8.01.A.2 the assigns of Owner and Engineer) are hereby bound to the other party to this Agreement and to the successors, executors, administrators, and legal representatives (and said assigns) of such other party, in respect of all covenants, agreements, and obligations of this Agreement.
- 2. Neither Owner nor Engineer may assign, sublet, or transfer any rights under or interest (including, but without limitation, money that is due or may become due) in this Agreement without the written consent of the other party, except to the extent that any assignment, subletting, or transfer is mandated by law. Unless specifically stated to the contrary in any written consent to an assignment, no assignment will release or discharge the assignor from any duty or responsibility under this Agreement.
- B. Beneficiaries: Unless expressly provided otherwise, nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to create, impose, or give rise to any duty owed by Owner or Engineer to any Constructor, other third-party individual or entity, or to any surety for or employee of any of them. All duties and responsibilities undertaken pursuant to this Agreement will be for the sole and exclusive benefit of Owner and Engineer and not for the benefit of any other party.

9.01 Total Agreement

A. This Agreement (including any expressly incorporated attachments), constitutes the entire agreement between Owner and Engineer and supersedes all prior written or oral understandings. This Agreement may only be amended, supplemented, modified, or canceled by a duly executed written instrument.

Project Background

On June 22nd, 2022, the City of Fergus Falls retained the services of Interstate Engineering (Interstate) and their sub-consultant, Apex Engineering Group, Inc. (Apex), to evaluate the City's water distribution system and water storage facilities. Previous studies had concluded that the existing 1914 Ground Storage Reservoir (GSR), located just Northeast of the Water Treatment Facility (WTF), should be removed, and replaced. Initially, the plan was to follow those recommendations, but it was decided to take a step back and determine whether a new GSR was truly needed and whether it should be replaced at the current site or moved to a more optimum location.



On September 6th, 2023, a final report titled, "Water Distribution System and Storage Assessment" was completed and submitted to City Staff by Interstate Engineering and Apex Engineering Group. The study recommended that the 1914 Ground Storage Reservoir be decommissioned and demolished, and furthermore, no new storage facilities be constructed at this time unless a new, large water user, dictate the need for a significant water supply in the future. An evaluation of disinfection requirements and adequate contact time (CT) were also provided as part of this report.

The following scope of services is for engineering and surveying services related to the decommissioning and demolition of the existing 1914 Ground Storage Reservoir.

ORDINANCE NO. 52, EIGHTH SERIES

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FERGUS FALLS, MINNESOTA, ADDING CHAPTER 91.53, TEMPORARY GOAT GRAZING FOR VEGETATION MANAGEMENT, TO THE CITY CODE.

THE CITY OF FERGUS FALLS DOES ORDAIN:

<u>Section 1.</u> Chapter 91.53 entitled Temporary Goat Grazing for Vegetation Management is hereby added as follows:

- A. *Purpose and need for policy.* The purpose of this policy is to allow prescribed grazing of approved grazing animals on certain property in the City of Fergus Falls for a specific period and for the express purpose of controlling invasive, noxious, or unwanted vegetation. Invasive species and/or noxious vegetation pose a significant environmental risk to the environment. Prescribed grazing is intended to provide an alternative to the use of chemicals to control undesired vegetation, as well as an alternative to other land management techniques like mowing, brush cutting and prescribed burning. It is also intended to provide an alternative means to control undesirable vegetation on steep slopes or other challenging terrain where it is difficult for humans to access. Prescribed grazing is not intended to allow the raising or keeping of goats as pets or livestock on property where it is not currently allowed under zoning requirements.
- B. *Policy*. Property owners intending to use prescribed grazing must have a property that meets all criteria laid out within this policy. Property owners must hire a contractor who has received a prescribed grazing permit from the Public Works Director. Contractors must obtain an annual permit prior to working in the city, meet all city requirements and agree to follow all guidelines laid out within the policy. The specific policy requirements are as follows:
 - 1. Goats are the only animals approved for prescribed grazing.
 - 2. Significant invasive, noxious, or unwanted vegetation must exist on the site and removal of it will clearly benefit the property receiving the prescribed grazing.
 - 3. Prescribed grazing is allowed in any zoning district.
 - 4. Grazing services will be provided by a permitted contractor. Contractors must obtain an annual permit from the Public Works Director and must provide all requested documentation. Permits may be revoked if contractors do not follow ordinance and policy requirements, or if repeat issues arise regarding grazing activities causing public nuisances or other unwanted situations. The contractor will need to specifically provide the following information within the city's permit form and adhere to the following contractor guidelines:

- (a) No permit shall be granted, nor be effective, until the applicant files with the Public Works Director proof of a public liability insurance policy covering all operations of such applicant under this section for the maximum liability amounts pursuant to Minnesota Statute 466.04. The policy shall provide that it may not be cancelled by the insurer except after ten (10) calendar days written notice to the Public Works Director, and if such insurance is so cancelled and the permittee fails to replace the same with another policy conforming to the provisions of this section, the permit shall be automatically suspended until such insurance is provided.
- (b) No permit shall be granted, nor be effective, until the applicant files with the Public Works Director acceptable evidence of compliance with the worker's compensation insurance coverage requirements by providing the name of the insurance company, the policy number, and date of coverage, if applicable.
- (c) All contractors permitted under the provisions of this section must abide by all ANSI (American National Standards Institute) and OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Administration) regulations while operating as a business within the city limits.
- (d) Upon issue, the applicant must be able to produce their permit upon request when operating with the city limits.
- (e) Applicant must have staff available to respond to any emergency complaints or concerns at all times of day or night. Applicant will furnish emergency contact information when applying for a permit.
- (f) All contractors must notify the Public Works Director at least ten (10) business or calendar days in advance of any prescribed grazing projects that are to occur within the city limits.
- 5. Prescribed grazing will be allowed on a parcel or lot that is one-half (1/2) acre or greater in size. Prescribed grazing will also be allowed on more than one (1) parcel or lot provided that the grazing areas on each parcel or lot are contiguous and aggregate of one-half (1/2) acre or more in size. All property owners in the grazing area must grant permission to the contractor.
- 6. Prescribed grazing cannot occur on a parcel or lot more than two (2) times in a given calendar year. Each grazing event must be thirty (30) consecutive days or less in duration from the time the goats arrive to the time the goats are removed from the site. Grazing events must be separated by at least thirty (30) calendar days.
- 7. Goat herd size cannot exceed two (2) goats per every one-tenth (1/10) acre of enclosed grazing area.

- 8. If exceptions to the standard grazing duration, stocking rates or fencing requirements are desired, the permitted contractor must submit a written request to the Public Works Director. Factors, such as proximity to adjacent properties, will be assessed when evaluating extension requests. Extensions will be approved or denied in writing by the Public Works Director or their designee.
- 9. Prescribed grazing must occur in an area that is properly enclosed through temporary or permanent fencing. Fencing must be designed to prevent escape by goats and prevent access by other animals and cannot be constructed of barbed wire and follow all requirements outlined below.
 - (a) Energized fence is allowed, but if used within thirty (30) feet of an adjacent property boundary, it must be a part of a double fence system where the outer line of fencing is non-energized and separated from the inner line of energized fence by at least three (3) feet or written approval must be obtained from the adjacent property owner. This protects the public from encountering the energized fence. The fence must be powered by a low impedance energizer.
 - (i) Low impedance energizers use a short duration pulse that minimizes risk to people. The Public Works Director reserves the right to require that the prescribed grazing contractor install a double fence system in any situation if determined that a single energized fence line would present a significant risk to the public.
 - (b) Energized fencing must be clearly identified with warning signs no more than ten (10) feet apart and signed on every enclosure boundary. Energized fence must be installed by the prescribed grazing contractor. Temporary fencing must be removed within seven (7) calendar days of the date the goats are removed from the project site. Permanent fencing must follow all other applicable city ordinances.
 - (c) The fence, including the wires, shall not exceed the height limitations in City Code Section 154.086.
- 10. Where the project area is visible to the public, a sign must notify the public that prescribed grazing is occurring and list twenty-four (24) hour contact information for any emergency situations that may arise, such as a goat outside the fenced enclosure. The sign must follow ordinance requirements for the appropriate zoning district as described beginning in City Code Section 154.170.
- 11. Shelters, if provided, must follow all city structure and setback requirements.
- 12. Only females, neutered male goats or unneutered male goats less than six months old that accompany female goats are allowed.
- 13. Grazing areas must be monitored to prevent overgrazing, erosion and damage to natural resources, including but not limited to:

- (a) Complying with requirements and best management practices established by Minnesota Department of Agriculture, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, Natural Resources Conservation Service, the local watershed district, and all other pertinent agencies.
- (b) Preventing impairment of water quality as defined by the Federal Clean Water Act.
- (c) Avoiding adversely impacting threatened or endangered plant or animal species.

C. Procedure.

- 1. Contractors wishing to provide prescribed grazing services within city limits must obtain a permit application from the Public Works Director. Contractors must submit their permit request together with the required consents or notices in Section C.2 below, and insurance documentation, at least fifteen (15) business days in advance of any work proposed within city limits.
- 2. The permit application shall include written consents to the prescribed grazing of goats including how many goats will be used for this purpose on the subject property from all abutting property owners, or shall provide proof of the certified mailing of a notice to all abutting property owner(s) which advises the abutting property owner(s) the applicant is applying for a permit from the Public Works Director to allow prescribed grazing of goats on their premises and advising how many goats will be used for this purpose. The abutting property owner may object to the applicants permit application, any objection must be received by the Public Works Director within fourteen (14) days of the mailing date of the notice, and failure to provide written objections to the Public Works Director within ten (10) days of the mailing of the notice may authorize the Public Works Director to issue a permit to allow prescribed grazing of goats on the applicant's property.
- 3. The Public Works Director will review permit requests and respond within ten (10) business days. A written permit will be issued if the request is approved. The contractor cannot start work until the permit has been received.
- 4. If a permit is issued, it will be valid for the remainder of the year assuming the contractor follows all requirements. Permits are issued for each specific project.
- 5. Contractor will inform the Public Works Director or their designee of planned project locations at least ten (10) business days prior to arriving to start work.
- 6. Contractor will notify the Public Works Director or their designee on the day that goats arrive on any project site within city limits.

- 7. If policy requirements or other city ordinances are not followed, contractor permits can be revoked by the Public Works Director or their designee or the City Administrator. Violations of policy may include but are not limited to:
 - (a) Providing any false or inaccurate information on permit application.
 - (b) Failure to notify the Public Works Director of impending projects in a timely fashion.
 - (c) Failure to respond in a timely fashion to or failing to correct issues or concerns raised by the Public Works Director or residents.
 - (d) Failure to prevent grazing services from resulting in a public nuisance, including repeated issues with animals escaping from fenced areas.
 - (e) Failure to maintain appropriate insurance coverage throughout the duration of the permit.
 - (f) Failure to adhere to parcel size, stocking rate, stocking duration or fencing requirements.
- D. *Authority*. Administrative implementation of state statutes, city ordinances and city policies.

TREE DISEASES

§96.01 DECLARATION OF POLICY.

The City Council determines that the health of the elm, oak and ash trees within the city is threatened by fatal disease known as Dutch Elm, Oak Wilt and Emerald Ash bore diseases, and other trees may be threatened by other epidemic diseases of shade trees. The City Council further determines that the loss of elm, oak and other trees growing upon public and private property would substantially depreciate the value of property within the city and impair the safety, good order, general welfare and convenience of the public. It is declared to be the intention of the City Council to control and prevent the spread of those diseases and this subchapter is enacted for that purpose.

§96.02 DESIGNATED ENFORCEMENT OFFICER.

It shall be the duty of the officer designated by the City Council to coordinate, under the direction and control of the City Council, all activities of the city relating to the control and prevention of Dutch Elm disease, Oak Wilt disease, Emerald Ash bore and other epidemic diseases of shade trees. The officer shall recommend to the City Council the details of a program for the control of diseases, and perform the duties incident to a program adopted by the City Council.

§96.03 TREES CONSTITUTING NUISANCE.

The following are public nuisances whenever they may be found within the city:

- (A) Any living or standing elm tree or part thereof infected to any degree with the Dutch Elm disease fungus Ceratocystis Ulmi (Buisman) Moreau or which harbors any of the elm bark beetles Scolytus Multistriatus (Eichh.) or Hylungopinus Rufipes (Marsh);
- (B) Any dead elm tree or part thereof, including branches, stumps, firewood or other elm material from which the bark has not been removed and burned or sprayed with an effective elm bark beetle insecticide;
- (C) Any living or standing oak tree or part thereof infected to any degree with the Oak Wilt fungus Ceratocystis fagacearum;
- (D) Any living or standing ash tree or part thereof infected to any degree with Emerald Ash bore, Agrilus planipennis, must be disposed of in accordance with Department of Natural Resources' procedures;
- (E) Any dead oak tree or part thereof which, in the opinion of the designated officer, constitutes a hazard, including, but not limited to, logs, branches, stumps, roots, firewood or other oak material which has not been stripped of its bark and burned or sprayed with an effective fungicide; and,
 - (F) Any other shade tree with an epidemic disease.

§96.04 INSPECTION AND INVESTIGATION.

(A) As often as practical, the designated officer shall inspect all public and private premises within the city which might harbor any plant pest, as defined in state statutes as they may be amended from time to time, to determine whether any condition described in 96.03 of this Chapter exists thereon.

(B) The designated officer shall investigate all reported incidents of infestation of Dutch Elm fungus, Emerald Ash bore, elm bark beetles, Oak Wilt fungus or any other epidemic disease of shade trees.

§96.05 ENTRY ON PRIVATE PREMISES.

The designated officer or his or her duly authorized agents may enter upon private premises at any reasonable time for the purpose of carrying out any of the duties assigned under this subchapter.

§96.06 ABATEMENT OF NUISANCE.

It is unlawful for any person to permit any public nuisance, as defined in 96.03 of this chapter, to remain on any premises the person owns or controls within the city. The nuisances may be abated in the manner prescribed by this subchapter. In abating a nuisance defined in 96.03 of this chapter, the designated officer shall cause the infected tree or wood to be sprayed, removed, burned or otherwise effectively treated so as to destroy and prevent as fully as possible the spread of epidemic diseases such as Dutch Elm disease, Emerald Ash bore and Oak Wilt disease. The designated officer shall also take other steps as are necessary to prevent root graft transmission of the diseases. The abatement procedures shall be carried out in accordance with current technical and expert opinions and plans as may be designated by the state's Department of Natural Resources.

§96.07 REMOVAL OF INFECTED TREES AND WOOD.

- (A) Action by the designated officer. Whenever the designated officer finds, with reasonable certainty, that the infestation defined in 96.03 of this chapter exists in any trees or wood in any public or private place in the city, the designated officer shall, in writing, notify the owner of the existence of a nuisance, which notice shall state the owner has 60 days to abate the nuisance and avoid city action. However, the owner must respond to the notice within 14 days of receipt of the notice to what will be the disposition of the nuisance. If, within the 60 day period, the property owner has not abated the nuisance, the designated officer shall take action to remove and dispose of the nuisance at the owner's expense. (See division (C) below.)
- (B) *Record*. The designated officer shall keep a record of the costs of abatement done under this chapter and shall report to the appropriate officer all work done for which assessments are to be made, stating and certifying the description of the land, lots, parcels involved and the amount chargeable to each.
- (C) Assessment. On or before September 1 of each year, the City Administrator shall list the total unpaid charges for each abatement against each separate lot or parcel to which they are attributable under this subchapter. The City Council may then spread the charges or any portion

thereof against the property involved as a special assessment under M.S. §429.101, as it may be amended from time to time, and other pertinent statutes for certification to the County Auditor and collection the following year along with the current taxes.

§96.08 TREES IN RIGHT OF WAYS.

- (A) City to control trees. The city shall have control and supervision over all shrubs and trees upon or overhanging all streets or other public property. The supervision of all trees and shrubs may include ordering trimming or removal.
- (B) Permission to plant, remove and trim trees. No person shall trim, cut or remove any of any tree which is under the supervision of the city without first procuring written permission from the city to do so, nor shall the authority conferred by written permission be exceeded. No person shall plant a tree or trees in a right of way or upon other public property under the supervision of the city without first procuring permission from the City Forester.

"Transient" shall mean the hotel is not the sole residence of the guest(s) and occupancy shall be limited to less than three hundred sixty-five (365) consecutive days. Hotels must conduct regular housekeeping services of guest rooms. A hotel may also include "extended stay" guest rooms which must contain a complete kitchen equipped with a full-sized refrigerator, built-in cooking facilities, microwave, sink, cooking utensils, dishes and cutlery. Hotels are therefore distinct from apartment buildings, boarding houses, or lodging houses as defined in this Chapter.

Section 2. Summary Publication. Pursuant to Minn. Stat. §412.191, in the case of a lengthy ordinance, a summary may be published. While a copy of the entire ordinance is available without cost at the office of the City Clerk, the following summary is approved by the City Council and shall be published in lieu of publishing the entire ordinance.
